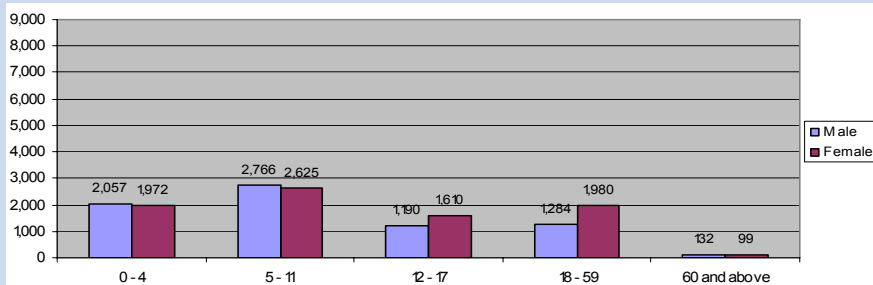

## Contextual Background

- Pattern in Population Change**
  - Organized large-scale relocation from the Transit Centre began 5 August 2011 and will complete early September 2011, during which time Hilaweyn Camp has grown rapidly.
- Areas of Origin**
  - 50% of residents are from Bay; 29% are from Geddo; remaining are from various areas
- Cultural Background**
  - Sunni Muslim
  - 76% May May speakers from Rahanweyn clan, 15% Mahatiri speakers from Maheren clan; remaining are from various other Somali clans
- Main Occupations**
  - Pastoralists (livestock herding: goats, camels, cows, sheep and donkeys)

## Tips for Humanitarians

- UNHCR provides protection and monitors delivery of services to all refugees in Hilaweyn Camp.
- Camp Management is done **by ARRA with support from UNHCR**.
- Camp Coordination Meetings**, co-chaired by ARRA and UNHCR, are held weekly in Hilaweyn Camp with humanitarian actors.
- All refugees in Hilaweyn Camp are **individually registered** in UNHCR's proGres database and hold **ration cards**. Ration card numbers are useful for referral between partners and for distribution events. Refugees have been given a **Proof of Registration** document showing family-related and individual details, including **each person's photo**.
- Biometrics (fingerprinting)** has been used for registering refugees living in Hilaweyn. Biometrics assists in preventing double registration. No refugee household should have more than one ration card.
- Thousands of children with severe acute malnutrition (SAM) under 5 have been enrolled in nutrition programmes. **Each malnourished child has a unique Out-patient Therapeutic Programme card**.

## Administrative Structure

### Role of Ethiopian Government in Hilaweyn

- ARRA is active in the following sectors:**
  - ▶ Camp Management
  - ▶ Registration
  - ▶ Food & CRI Distribution
  - ▶ Protection & Camp Security
- ARRA staff posted inside the camp include:**
  - ▶ Camp Coordinator
  - ▶ Protection Officer
  - ▶ Site Planner
  - ▶ Distribution Staff

### Role of Camp Residents in Self-Management


- Refugee Central Committee (RCC)** – a Refugee Chairperson and four other refugees are acting in a coordination role until the RCC can be elected. The RCC will be a resident coordination and leadership body that is consulted on multi-sectoral issues pertaining to camp life. It will be made up of a Chairman, a Deputy, Zone Leaders and women representatives. Zone Leaders gather information on each zone in the camp, provide information to people living in each zone and advocate on behalf of their respective zone residents.
- Women's Association** - the Women's Association, made up of 35 women elected by camp residents, runs a grinding mill (income generation project), mobilizes women's groups and represents women's interests in camp coordination.
- Food Distribution Committee** – provide information about food distribution to the community, monitoring scooping and provide feedback on the quality and quantity of food.
- Plans are underway to establish the following resident self-governance associations:
  - ▶ **Youth Committee**
  - ▶ **Neighbourhood Watch Programme**
  - ▶ **Disability Committee**
  - ▶ **Refugee / Host Community Committee**


### Local Administration


- ❖ The Kebele Chairman is responsible for local (non-refugee) administration on behalf of Dollo Ado Woreda, Somali Regional State, Ethiopia. The Kebele Chairman and his administrative committee are consulted about refugee-host community relationship, natural resource use and managing conflicts between the refugee and host communities, with the help of local elders.
