


Protection Risks and Needs of Refugees from Ukraine

Data as of Thursday, March 16, 2023



To strengthen and promote an evidence-based protection response, UNHCR and its partners in Hungary, Republic of Moldova, Poland, Romania and Slovakia have been implementing a Protection Profiling and Monitoring exercise to regularly collect and analyze data about the profiles, protection risks and needs of refugees from Ukraine and monitor changes over time. In October 2022 a revised questionnaire was rolled out. This dashboard presents the main findings based on 3,104 interviews conducted between October 2022 and mid-March 2023.

Methodology

Individual interviews are carried out in different locations, including border and transit locations, reception and transit centres, collective sites, assistance points and community centers. Trained enumerators digitally collect the data through Kobo Toolbox, which is safely stored in UNHCR server.

While respondents are randomly selected to reduce bias, non-probability sampling is used and results cannot necessarily be extrapolated to the population of refugees from Ukraine as a whole.






HOUSEHOLD CHARACTERISTICS











Date of arrival to the current host country**




Education level**




Main activity in Ukraine**

Top oblasts of origin**





Respondents by oblast of origin







Main reasons for temporary visit








