Durable solutions for refugees from Syria are based on a comprehensive protection and solutions strategy which seeks to: 1) support host country and community resilience; 2) enable refugee self-reliance, including access to services, legal work opportunities and livelihoods; 3) expand access to resettlement in third countries and other complementary pathways, and; 4) plan for the return of refugees to Syria, on a voluntary basis, when conditions for a safe, dignified and sustainable return are in place.












### Registered Syrian Refugees (in-camp)

**48%** of the registered Syrian refugees are children under the age of 18.



**95%** of Syrian refugees across the region reside within the host community, mainly in urban areas; **5%** reside in camps.



Syrian refugee youth aged between 15 and 24 years old constitute around **20%** of the total registered Syrian population in the five countries.



In Jordan, **34%** of refugee families were found to have at least one member with one or more disabilities. In Lebanon, **30%** of Syrian refugee households were found to have at least one member with a disability.








## Regional Return Development




## Return by Governorate of Origin (so far in 2023)




