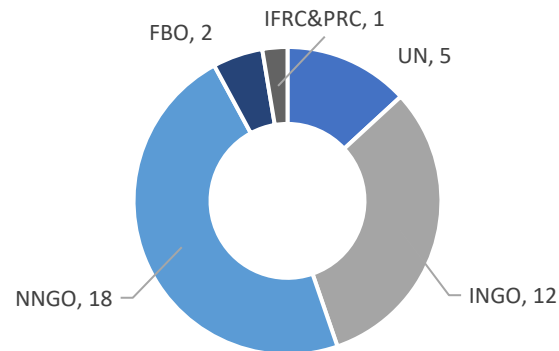


Regional Refugee Response Plan – reporting update

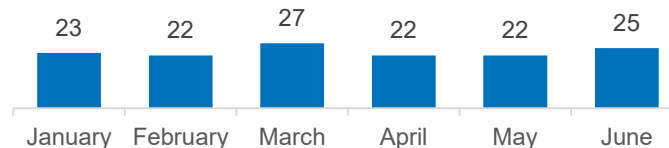
- The 2023 RRP for Ukraine Situation in Poland outlines the multisectoral response strategy and financial requirements of inter-agency partners supporting the host government;
- In the middle of July Q2 activities and financial reporting in Poland was closed;
- **38 RRP partners** and **5 non-RRP partners** have reported;

Partners reporting by months

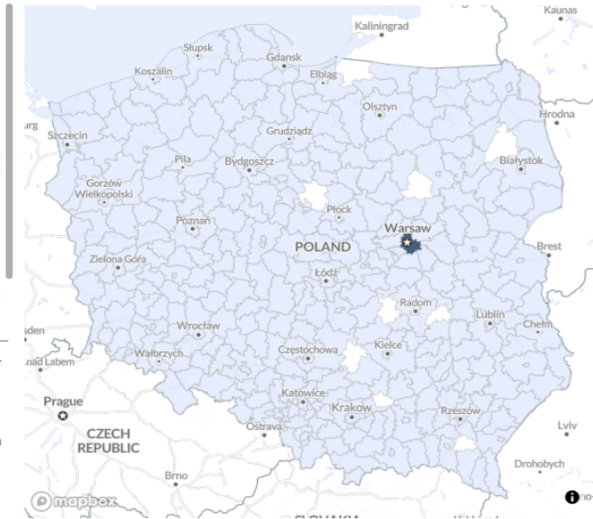

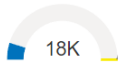

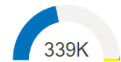

Funding Tracker

- 141\$ M out of 709\$ M was reported by partners as recieved funding;
- 19.9% of target has been reached in Poland;
- 21 our of 83 partners reporting;
- 55 % of funds came from Internal allocation of funds;
- 30% came from companies, foundations or private individuals
- 15% came from government or intergovernmental entities

To ensure that the humanitarian assistance is coordinated in a coherent and complementary way amongst the different humanitarian actors, UNHCR leads the development of Refugee Response Plans (RRPs). These plans support host governments to protect refugees in large and complex refugee situations through international solidarity. The Government of Poland leads the refugee response, complemented by activities of humanitarian organizations. The work of the humanitarian organizations which are part of the refugee response is coordinated through the Refugee Coordination Model (RCM).

The 2023 Regional Refugee Response Plan (RRP) for the Ukraine Situation outlines the multisector response strategy and financial requirements of inter-agency partners supporting the host governments of Bulgaria, Czech Republic, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Republic of Moldova, Poland, Romania and Slovakia in providing assistance and protection to refugees from Ukraine.* The 2023 RRP aims at ensuring refugees' access to protection and assistance on a non-discriminatory basis, including the rights associated with temporary protection or similar legal statuses in host countries. Special attention is given to those refugees who are already or risk becoming vulnerable. The RRP also places an emphasis on refugees' socio-economic inclusion in recognition of the challenges faced by refugees as their displacement becomes more protracted, and to supporting social cohesion and support to host communities.

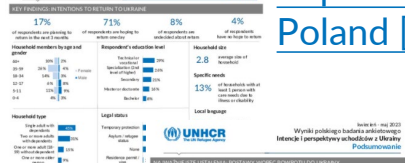


* The RRP also includes financial requirements related to activities in Belarus as well as technical support provided by the partners to ensure regional coherence and coordination.

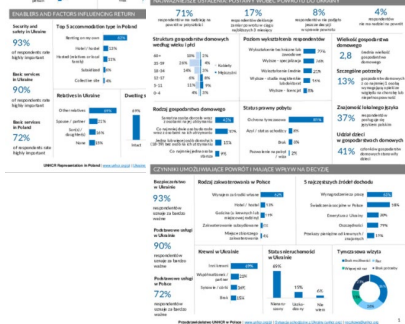

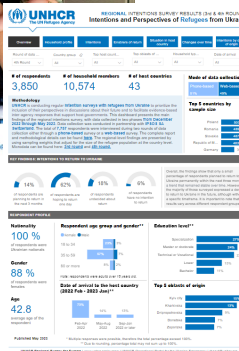
Intentions of refugees, in Poland

Temporary visit to Ukraine

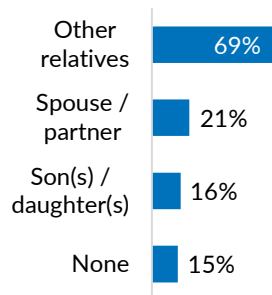
41% of respondents visited Ukraine at least once since their initial departure

Main reasons to return to Ukraine in next 3 months (among 17% planning to)

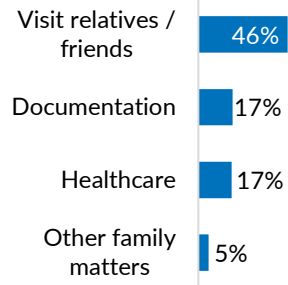
66% wish to return to own country / live in own cultural environment

31% wish to reunite with family in Ukraine

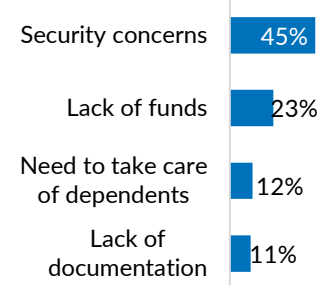
Relatives who are currently residing in Ukraine*



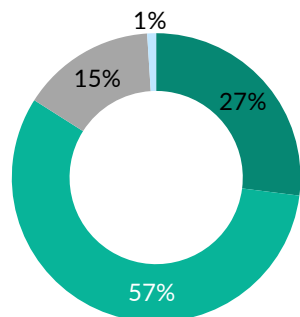
Reasons for temporary visit*
