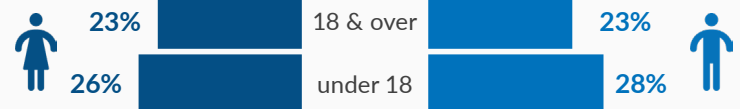
* Due to the 24 December 2022 directive on the ban on Women NGO workers to come to the office and go on mission in many cases, IASC Principals initiated "operational pause" on 27 December 2022, followed by "operational trial" on 31 January 2023. This impacted our outreach in January 2023. On 4 April, this ban was extended to Afghan women working for the UN. This latest ban remains in place and continues to impact the delivery of much needed assistance.

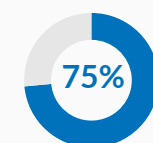
