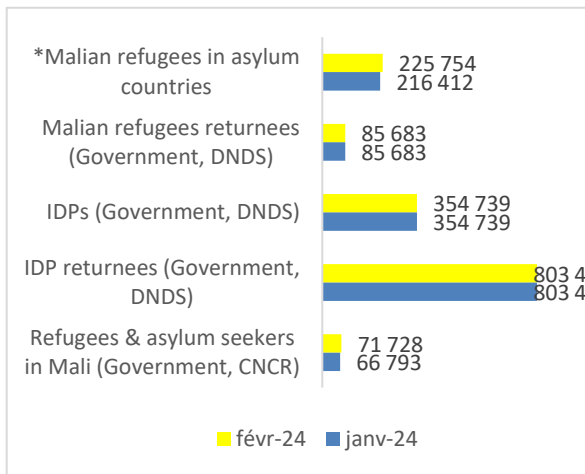

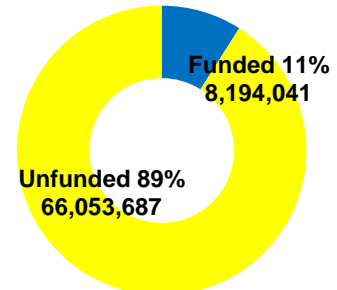

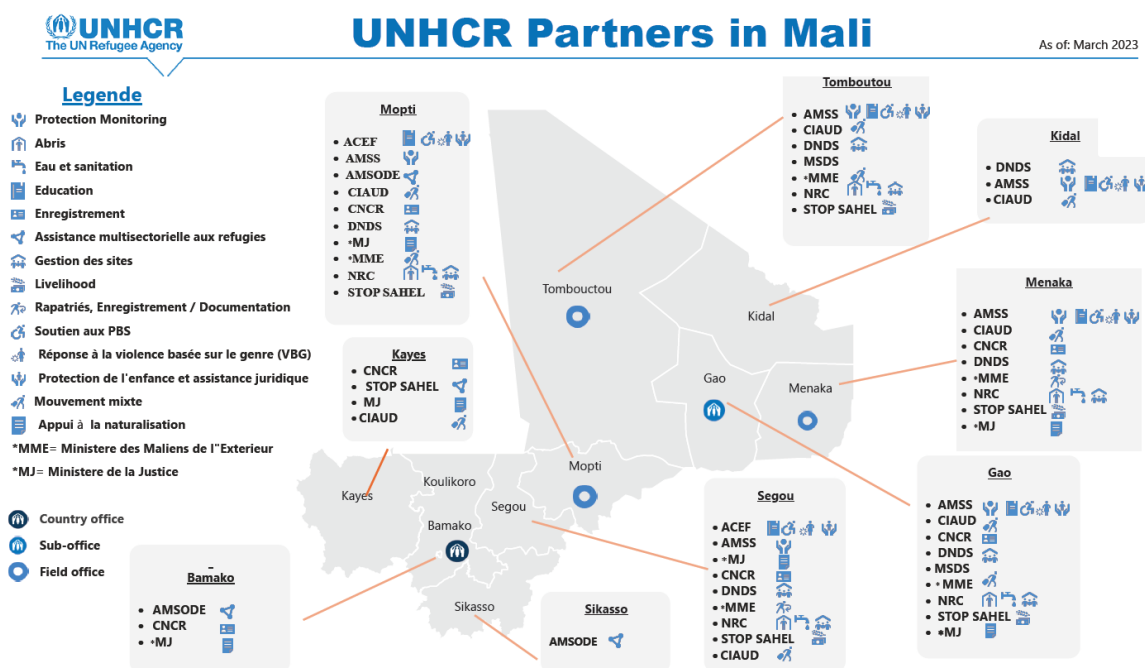

MAIN ACTIVITIES

PROTECTION

Legal protection

- In February, UNHCR trained 10 registration officers from government partner, the National Commission for Refugees (CNCR), on International Refugee Protection as a prelude to their deployment in the field.

Community Mobilization

- UNHCR's toll-free blue line handled 262 calls in February. 192 cases were resolved. 70% of requests concern food assistance, 20% are linked to income-generating activities while 10 concern health and education.

Education

- 78 learners including 41 girls in accelerated schooling centers (SSAP) in Koro, in the Mopti region, benefited from educational support facilitated by UNHCR in reading, writing, calculation, and language.

Gender-based violence

- In February, UNHCR provided medical and psychosocial care to 16 survivors of GBV including 8 women and 8 girls in the regions of Kayes, Mopti, Douentza, Koro, and Menaka. Of the 16 cases, 7 are cases of rape, 3 cases of physical assault, 4 cases of child marriage, and 2 cases of denial of resources, opportunities and services. Among these people supported are refugees, internally displaced persons, and people from host communities.
- UNHCR provided 23 dignity kits to women and girls at risk and survivors of gender-based violence (GBV) in the localities of Kayes, Mopti, Koro, and Douentza.
- Capacity-building sessions on the concepts of GBV and sexual abuse and exploitation benefited 19 staff belonging to partners CNCR and the NGO CIAUD CANADA.

Mixed Movements

- In February 2024, monitoring activities for mixed movements made it possible to register 1,288 persons (849 men, 299 women, 82 boys, and 58 girls), i.e. 646 more people compared to January 2024, but only 321 more people compared to the same period (month of February) in 2023.
- During this period, 79 awareness sessions, on several themes including those relating to refugee status, irregular migration, and civil documentation, were carried out in the regions of Gao, Kidal, Mopti, Bandiagara, Douentza, San, Ségou, Ménaka, Timbuktu, Kayes, Nioro, Nara, Sikasso and Koutiala. These sessions reached a total of 1,096 individuals including people involved in mixed movements, forced displacement, and members of host communities.

SHELTER & NON-FOOD-ITEMS (NFIs) & WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE (WASH)

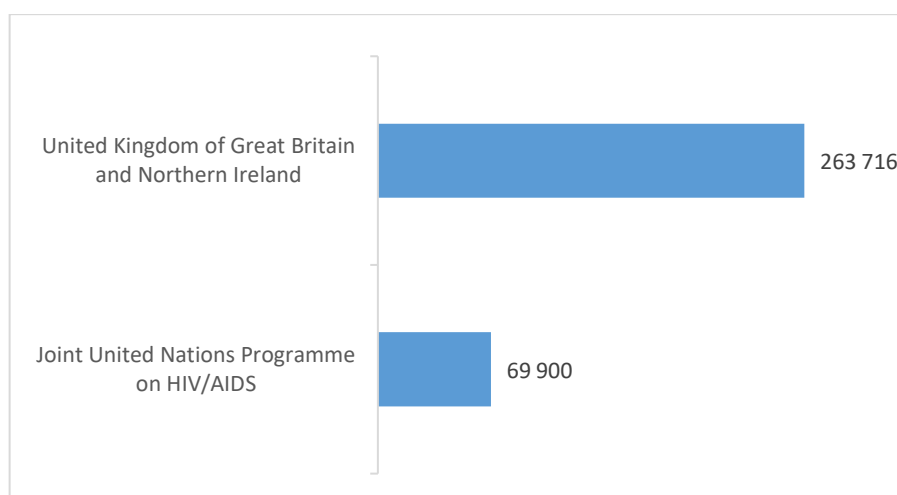
- In terms of support for access to basic services, the achievements made during February concern, among other things, the finalization of school infrastructure consisting of two blocks of three classrooms, 4 blocks of three latrines, and premises of school administrative management in the commune of Gossi, Timbuktu region. The construction of these infrastructures aims to strengthen educational services and the integration of refugee children into formal state programs.
- In February 2024, UNHCR, through the support of its partners, delivered assistance in non-food items to 1,329 families of 4,311 people made up of refugees, internally displaced persons, and host communities in the communes of Bandiagara, Gao, Gounzoureye and Anchawadi. This assistance in Bandiagara reached 89 families of 280 new Burkinabè refugees, including 54 girls, 100 boys, 51 women, and 75 men registered at the beginning of the month. That which was carried out in the urban communes of Gao, Anchawadi, and Gounzoureye was one-off assistance to 790 households of 1642 former refugees who were unable to benefit from any help and targeted 300 households of 1384 internally displaced persons, affected by forced displacements then 150 households of 1005 people from host communities. This series of assistance consisted of guaranteeing a functional domestic and protection by offering essential goods for survival to these forcibly displaced people living in precarious conditions and indigenous communities who are under pressure linked to insufficient resources.
