

Context

Since the beginning of the rainy season in September 2023 to May 2024, more than 298,000 people (54% are women) were affected by torrential rains, floods, landslides and the overflowing of Lake Tanganyika due to the El Niño phenomenon. These disasters destroyed or partially damaged homes, classrooms, health facilities, roads, crops, water networks and electrical installations.

Actions taken

- UNHCR facilitated the transport of 1,938 persons from Gatumba flooded area to find refuge at the Mubimbi site in Bujumbura and Issuance of national identity cards to 200 IDPs in Mubimbi site.
- UNHCR, in collaboration with protection actors, supported 114 urban refugee households in Bujumbura with a cash transfer for rent and multi-purpose assistance.
- Food assistance, mainly in the form of cash transfers, has been provided to 20,000 a ected people and is expected to reach an additional 22,000 people.
- The Ministry of National Solidarity distributed food and cash to 509 households.
- The Shelter/Non-Food Items (NFI) sector provided assistance to more than 7,200 people, including NFI kits and rental assistance.
