Transit Center two (TC2), also known as the extension Site, was opened in January 2, 2024 to ease congestion in Transit Center one (TC1) in Renk. The transit center, with a current capacity of 2,200 individuals, is now accommodating 8,065 refugees and returnees, which puts it at 367% of its intended capacity. This situation requires the substantial increase on No of communal shelters.

While most services are relatively consolidated, however mainly linked with the protracted situation of the site, associated protection risks are noted due to the overcrowded tap stands, insufficient lighting in WASH facilities (showers, latrines), lack of lighting along partial sections of TC2, limited food assistance and lack of dignified spaces/overcrowded shelters for both men and women. Concurrently, the nutrition overall situation is judged to deteriorate.

**Existing Gaps**

- **Safety & Security:** while it has been noticed an increase in shelters with internal lighting, most latrines and showers are completely dark.
- **Health:** The two centers have now two ambulances to cater to a population of roughly 14,000 refugees and returnees.
- **Food Scarcity:** There is a shortage of food, posing a threat to the refugees and returnees staying in the transit center for extended period of time. Despite available nutrition service capacity, the malnutrition rate among children remains at 25%.
- **WASH:** The ratio of access to latrines and showers is 62:1, exceeding the minimum standards of 50 persons per facility. This includes urgent need for proper drainage system.
- **Disability Inclusion:** There is a limited availability of mobility aids and equipment for people with disabilities.
