## 1. PURPOSE OF THE RESEARCH

1	To gather and analyze the experiences of Ukrainian Roma refugees in accessing governmental and non-governmental assistance and services in Poland with a dynamic perspective documenting systemic and societal changes over the past two years.
2	To understand the institutional-legal-political environment in Poland and the changes in the last two years under which humanitarian assistance is provided to refugees including Ukrainian Roma refugees.
3	To Identify potential shortcomings and areas for improvement in the provision of assistance, as well as identifying best practices at the local level for supporting Ukrainian Roma refugees.
4	To understand the short- and long-term needs and challenges of providing assistance to Ukrainian Roma refugees.

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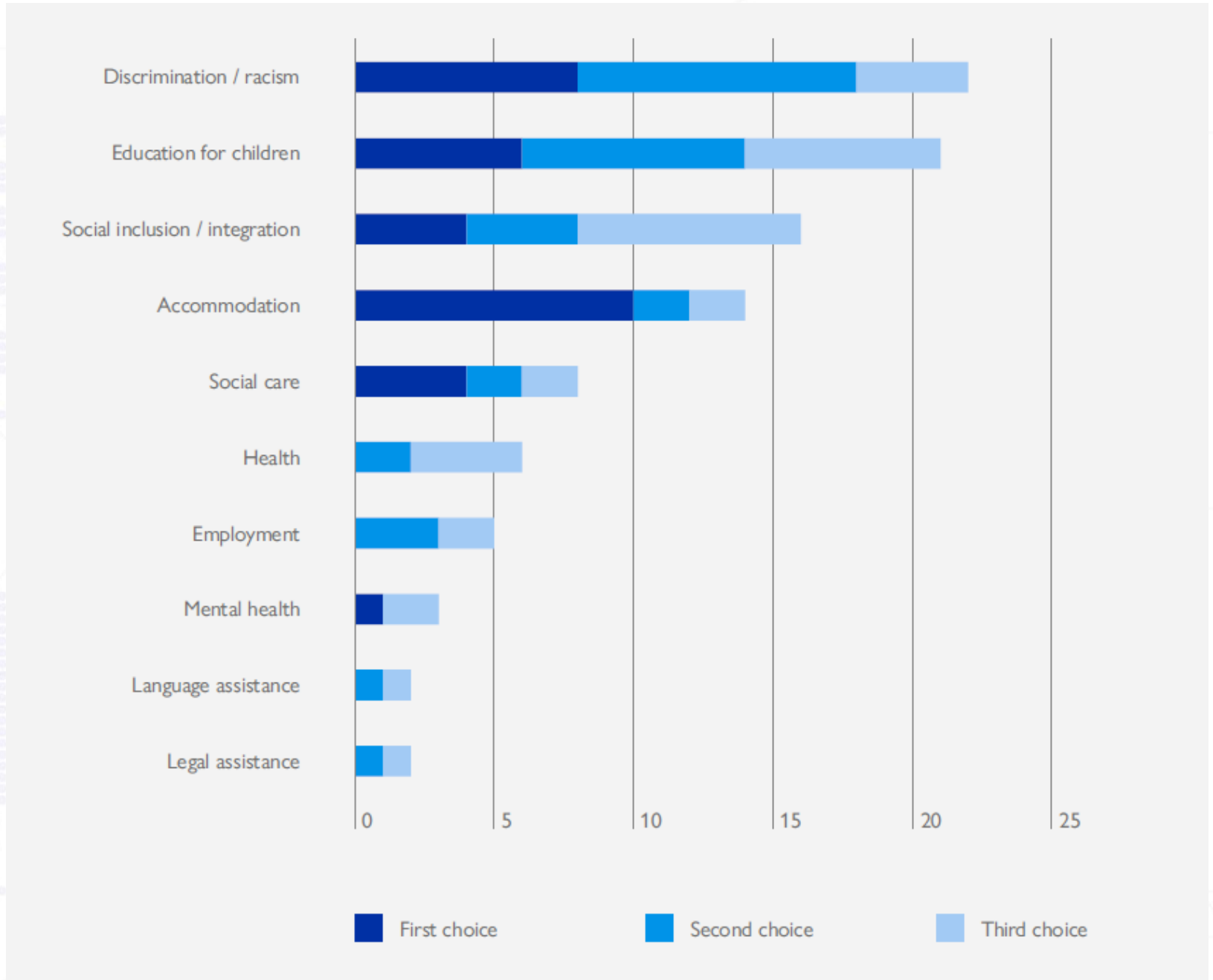
## METHODOLOGY

The analysis is based on **first-hand accounts**, **focus group discussions (FGDs)** with Ukrainian Roma refugees, and an **online survey** directed at individuals involved in providing assistance at various levels within humanitarian and civil society organizations, as well as the Polish government.

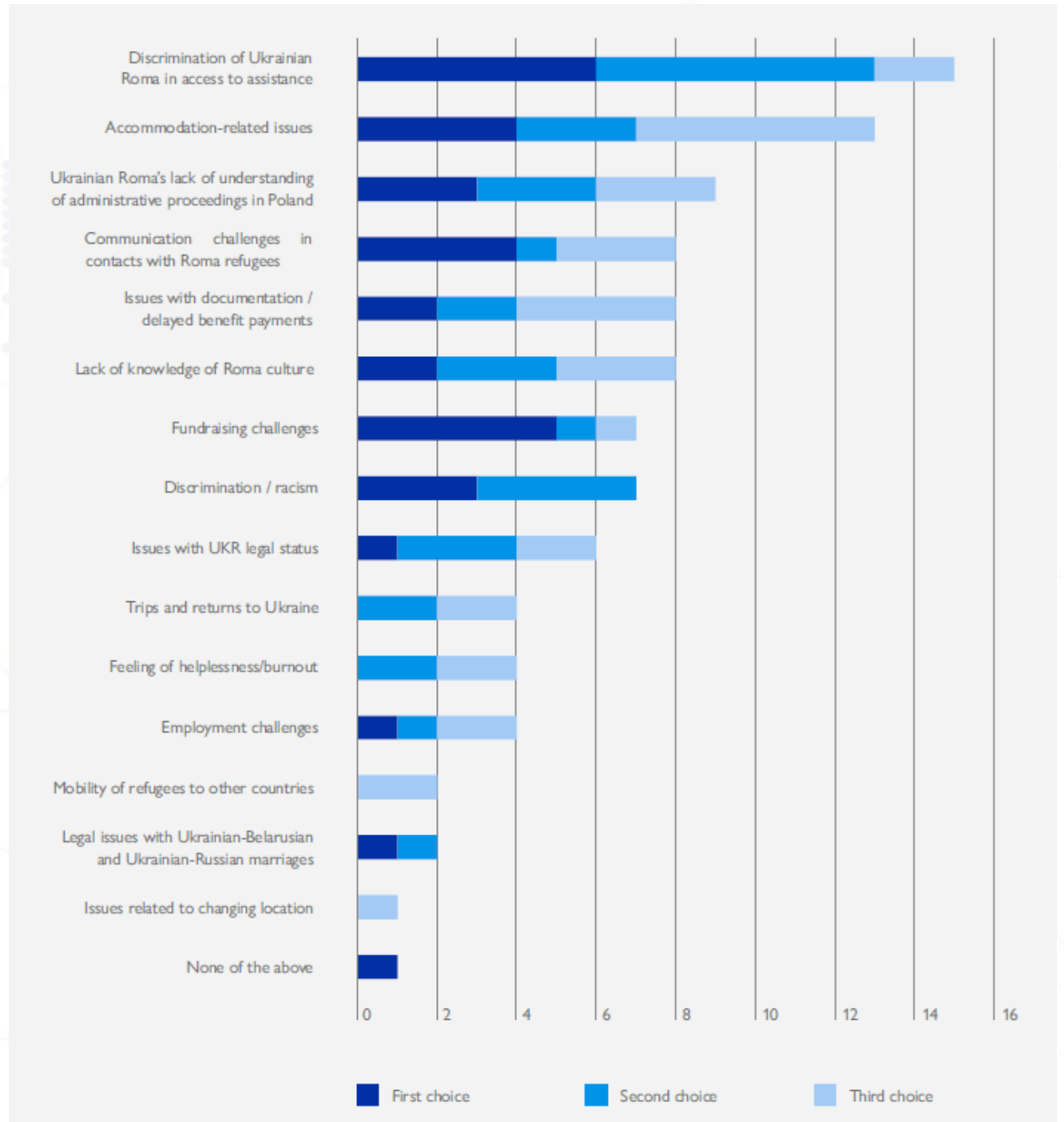
Data was collected between **February and May of 2024** by a team of researchers led by **Dr. Elżbieta Mirga-Wójtowicz** (in cooperation with **Monika Szewczyk, Karolina Kwiatkowska**).

## HOUSING AND GEOGRAPHIC ISOLATION

- Ukrainian Roma refugees largely live in substandard conditions in reception centres and other collective accommodations. Issues include **segregation**, **overcrowding**, and **poor sanitation**.
- Placement in housing that is far from city centers and in **remote locations**, where schools, services, employment opportunities and transportation are limited.
- According to most interviewees, this **state of limbo**, where individuals cannot afford private rentals and are forced to remain in collective shelters without access to the labor market, is the primary challenge for the support system moving forward.
- One issue outlined is the **size of their kinship groups** and **persistent anti-Roma sentiment** from potential Polish hosts, landlords, collective site coordinators, and other refugees



## HOUSING AND GEOGRAPHIC ISOLATION: RECOMMENDATIONS

- Develop long-term housing strategies that move **beyond temporary shelters** to provide stable, secure, and affordable housing that would **accommodate the communal and family-centric nature** of Roma communities.
- Prioritize **connectivity and accessibility to urban** or semi-urban areas.
- Implement and enforce **regulations against discriminatory practices** by landlords and housing agencies.
- Consider regular visits by social services and health departments to **ensure living conditions in collective shelters meet basic standards**.
- Authorities should regularly provide detailed **maps of accommodation facilities** (both private and state-owned) and contingency plans to humanitarian actors in case of increased refugee influx.
- State authorities should **promote the development of general guidelines for managing centers that are non-discriminatory** and meet safety, reception, and protection standards according to Polish, EU, and international law.
- **Admission criteria** for shelters and the principles of their operation **should be non-discriminatory and promote peaceful coexistence** of all residents, regardless of their ethnic origin.


## EDUCATIONAL CHALLENGES

- Ukrainian Roma children face significant challenges in integrating into the Polish education system. Issues include **geographic isolation and distance from schools, language barriers, lack of documentation, and discrimination within schools.**
- Many Ukrainian Roma children are **not enrolled in formal education**, impacting their social and mental well-being. **Schools often lack the resources and expertise** to support Roma children adequately.

## EDUCATIONAL CHALLENGES: RECOMMENDATIONS

- Put more emphasis on including **pre-school education** of Roma children. **Awareness-raising, antidiscrimination and anti-Romani sentiment prevention activities** should be expanded and continued.
- Implement robust **language training and cultural integration programs** to facilitate smoother integration into local schools. Special emphasis should be on **reducing language barriers**, which are major obstacle to education for Roma children.
- Schools should adopt and enforce **anti-discrimination policies**. **Training sessions** on cultural sensitivity and anti-bullying should be mandatory for both staff and students.
- Establish dedicated **additional support classes** to help Roma children catch up academically. Schools should also provide **psychological support and counseling services** to address trauma and enhance resilience.
- It is critical that schools hold open sessions and cooperate closely with parents, caretakers and family decision-makers to ensure access to education pathways for children and youth.
- Ensure that Ministry of National Education (MEN) actively oversee the educational experiences of refugee students, beyond just creating frameworks for their presence in schools.
- Launch a coordinated information campaign targeting Ukrainian parents, Polish schools (teachers and principals), and Polish parents about the upcoming changes.
- Ensure the presence of intercultural assistants and Roma assistants in schools with Ukrainian Roma students to facilitate integration and support students in activities related to education.
- Intensive support for schools in enhancing teacher competencies in teaching children with refugee experience and improving directors' skills in managing cultural diversity in schools.
- Create a support system for families whose children have been denied school placement, ensuring they do not lose access to the 800+ benefit.

## EMPLOYMENT: RECOMMENDATIONS

- 
- Offer vocational training tailored to the skills and interests of Roma individuals, coupled with job placement services that actively work to overcome employment barriers.
  - Encourage local businesses to hire Roma individuals through incentives such as tax breaks or subsidies, particularly for those offering stable, contract-based employment.
  - Strengthen and enforce anti-discrimination laws in the workplace, providing clear channels for reporting and addressing discrimination.


## HEALTH AND MENTAL HEALTH

- Barriers to accessing healthcare services include lack of documentation, language barriers, and discrimination by healthcare providers.
- The psychological impact of the war and displacement is compounded by the historical and ongoing discrimination of Ukrainian Roma.
- Need for mental health support is often stigmatized.


## HEALTH AND MENTAL HEALTH: RECOMMENDATIONS

- 
- Ensure healthcare services are accessible to Ukrainian Roma communities, including mobile health clinics in areas where they are housed. Health services should also be culturally sensitive and staffed by individuals trained in the specific health needs and challenges of the Ukrainian Roma population.
  - Comprehensive mental health services within refugee assistance programs to address the trauma and stress experienced by Roma refugees. This includes providing PTSD and CPTSD support programs, with services offered in the preferred language where possible.
  - Addressing the mental health needs of Ukrainian Roma refugees is crucial for their successful integration and overall well-being. Providing **comprehensive psychosocial services and de-stigmatizing the need for mental support** are essential for delivering effective care.

## LEGAL ISSUES

- 
- Ukrainian Roma refugees often face significant **challenges in obtaining legal status** due to **lack of documentation and bureaucratic obstacles**.
  - **Lack of legal recognition** prevents them from receiving necessary support.
  - There is a **lack of adequate legal support** tailored to the specific needs of Ukrainian Roma refugees. This deficiency leaves them vulnerable and unable to navigate the complex legal landscape effectively.

## LEGAL ISSUES: RECOMMENDATIONS

- 
- Advocate for the **acceptance of alternative identification forms** to help Ukrainian Roma refugees overcome challenges related to missing paperwork.
  - **Simplify and expedite bureaucratic procedures** to facilitate easier and quicker access to legal status for Ukrainian Roma refugees.
  - Develop **legal aid programs** specifically designed to address the unique needs of Ukrainian Roma refugees, helping them navigate complex legal systems.



## DISCRIMINATION

- Reports of **discrimination and mistreatment at the Ukrainian-Polish border** and issues with the border crossing due to **lack of documentation**.
- Reports of **denial of placement at collective sites**, inadequate conditions and **segregated living arrangements** are common, further exacerbating the vulnerabilities, exclusion and marginalization of Ukrainian Roma refugees.
- Challenges in **accessing social and health services** are common, due to barriers including mistrust in government systems, a lack of understanding of procedures, language barriers, and the cultural practice of remaining in family groups during day-to-day movements.
- Reports of discrimination from Ukrainian non-Roma refugees.

## DISCRIMINATION: RECOMMENDATIONS

- Implement **specialized training for border officials** to prevent discrimination and develop protocols to assist refugees lacking proper documentation.
- **Enforce non-discriminatory placement policies** and **improve living conditions** at collective sites to prevent segregation and ensure safe accommodations.
- **Promote initiatives that encourage the integration of Ukrainian Roma refugees** within broader communities to reduce exclusion and marginalization.
- **Introduce cultural mediators** to help refugees navigate social and health services, addressing language barriers and mistrust.
- **Deploy mobile units to provide essential services directly to Ukrainian Roma communities**, respecting their cultural practices and improving access.

## SUPPORT SYSTEM AND COORDINATION

- While Polish society and state institutions initially provided support for the basic needs of all refugees, including Ukrainian Roma, two years on there are notable **gaps in the accessibility and quality** of services for Ukrainian Roma refugees.
- **Civil society and grassroots organizations** have played a critical role in providing support to Roma refugees, and the strong role of Roma organizations has led to an **increase in awareness** and a **greater drive to support the needs of Ukrainian Roma refugees**.

## **SUPPORT SYSTEM AND COORDINATION: RECOMMENDATIONS**

- Recommendations include **increasing financial and logistical support, providing capacity-building initiatives, improving communication and collaboration** between grassroots organizations and larger NGOs or governmental bodies.

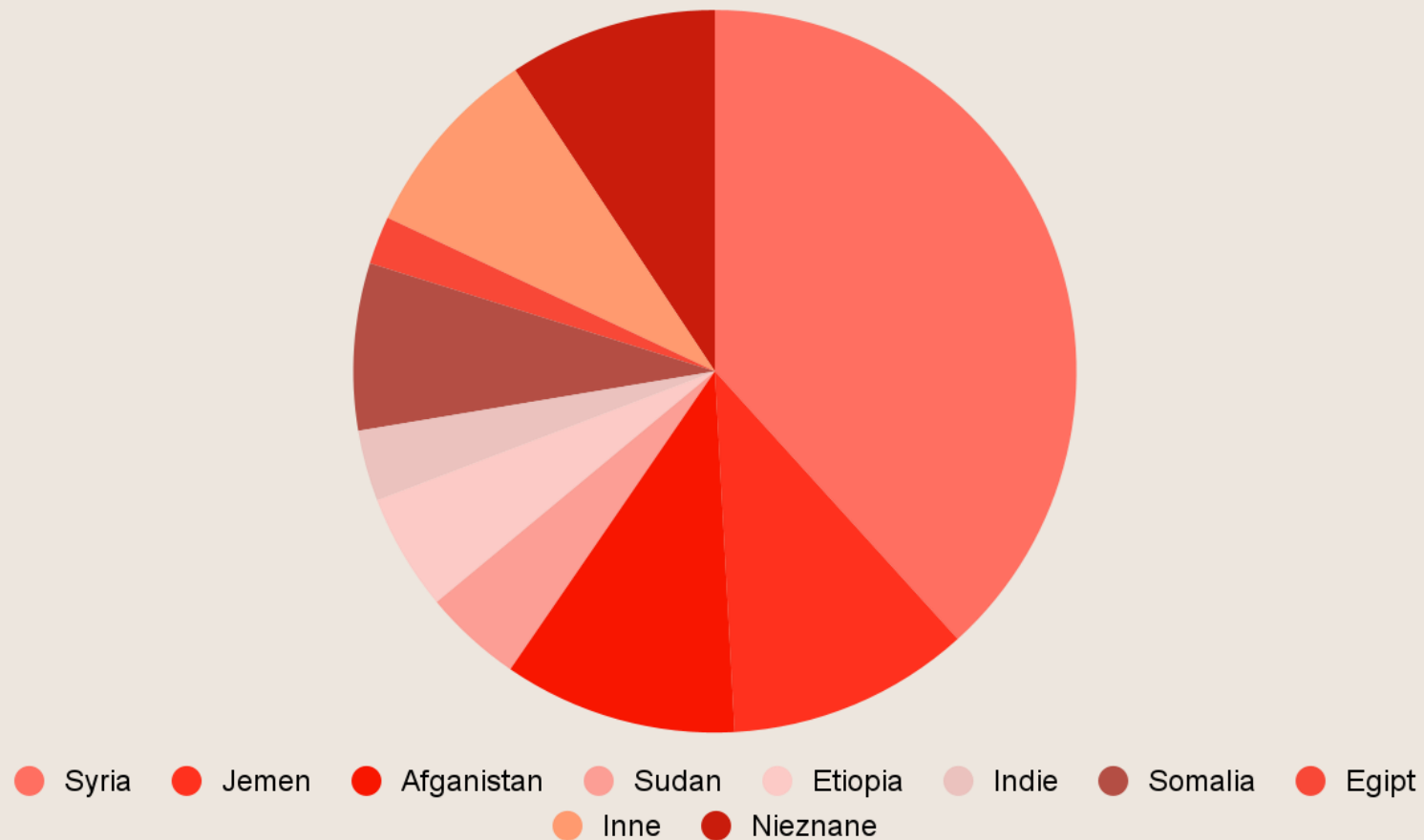

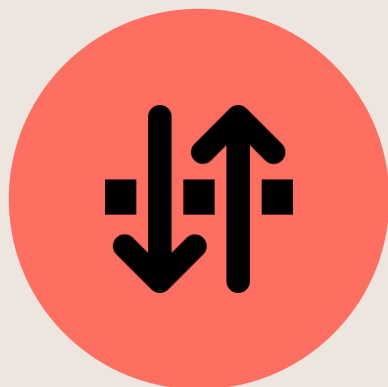

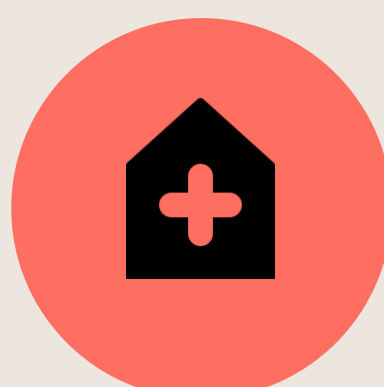

# Pomoc na granicy

Od sierpnia 2021 r. granica polsko-białoruska stała się nową drogą migracji do Unii Europejskiej dla osób dotkniętych wojnami, kryzysem klimatycznymi i ubóstwem. Osoby zmuszone do przekraczania granicy przez płot, przepawy przez rzekę lub liczne bagna potrzebują pilnej pomocy ze względu na niezwykle duże ryzyko odmrożeń kończyn, wychłodzenia, a nawet śmierci.



# Pomoc na granicy

Nasz zespół dociera bezpośrednio do osób w drodze, zapewniając niezbędną pomoc humanitarną:

- wodę, jedzenie, suche ubrania, artykuły higieniczne oraz pierwszą pomoc medyczną;
- oferujemy także wsparcie społeczno-psychologiczne, pomagając ludziom w drodze w radzeniu sobie ze stresem i traumą;
- udzielamy podstawowych informacji o systemie prawnym w Polsce i możliwościach ubiegania się o ochronę międzynarodową.



# Pomoc w ośrodkach dla cudzoziemców

Nasze działania skupione są m.in. na zapewnieniu odpowiedniej opieki prawnej, psychologicznej oraz wsparcia rzeczowego.

Osobom, które trafiają do placówek tłumaczymy sytuację, w której się znalazły oraz ich prawa i obowiązki w procedurze o ochronę międzynarodową w Polsce. Stanowimy także wsparcie po opuszczeniu SOC: organizujemy transport do ośrodka recepcyjnego (otwartego), pomagamy kupić bilet, czy zaopatrujemy w jedzenie na najbliższe dni.



# Pomoc w szpitalach

Jednym z obszarów naszej działalności jest pomoc osobom w drodze, które znalazły się w podlaskich szpitalach. Jesteśmy ich pełnomocnikami, tłumaczymy im sytuację, w jakiej się znalazły, oraz ich prawa i obowiązki w procedurze o ochronę międzynarodową w Polsce. Szukamy również prawników i przesyłamy do właściwych placówek Straży Granicznej niezbędne dokumenty, takie jak pełnomocnictwa, certyfikaty, zaświadczenia potwierdzające tożsamość lub inne dokumenty świadczące o prześladowaniach w krajach pochodzenia. Umożliwiamy również dostęp do wsparcia psychologicznego.







# MIESZKANIE TRENINGOWE

Mieszkanie Treningowe w Białymstoku jest odpowiedzią na wyzwania, z jakimi mierzą się osoby uchodźcze. Projekt opiera się na holistycznym podejściu do wsparcia, co oznacza stworzenie **bezpiecznego i przyjaznego miejsca zamieszkania** oraz **wsparcie przez pierwsze miesiące** dla osób opuszczających ośrodki dla cudzoziemców.

We have a training apartment for male refugees in a difficult housing situation.

### **Basic information:**

- Location: Białystok (the largest city in northeastern Poland and the capital of the Podlaskie Voivodeship, 200 km from Warsaw), not far from the city center
- Length of stay: two months
- The stay is free of charge, but food and personal expenses are not included.
- The house can accommodate a maximum of 4 people at the same time and two people share one room. Additionally, there is also a common space: kitchen, living room, toilet, bathroom and balcony.
- Each person signs an agreement with the Egala Association on basic rules of the house.

### **We offer support in:**

- searching for employment and writing CV
- dealing with official matters, filling out documents
- finding the right doctor/arranging an appointment
- accompanying you during important visits and meetings
- legal advice on legalization of stay
- searching for accommodation after completing the training
- other daily challenges

# Mieszkanie Treningowe

**Grupa docelowa** to mężczyźni, którzy opuszczają ośrodki dla cudzoziemców z pozwoleniem na pracę, przede wszystkim dla osób z grup mających trudności w procesie adaptacji w Polsce

- 4 miejsca
- Maksymalny czas przebywania: 2 do 3 miesięcy
- Długość możliwości pobytu jest poprzedzona analizą zasobów danej jednostki
- Tworzenie społeczności i relacji



# Mieszkanie Treningowe

**Indywidualne Wsparcie:** Każdy uczestnik programu pracuje z dedykowanym asystentem wsparcia (caseworkerem), który pomaga w tworzeniu indywidualnego planu działania. Obejmuje to pomoc w szukaniu pracy, przygotowaniu CV, załatwianiu spraw urzędowych i medycznych.

**Bezpłatne Mieszkanie:** Uczestnik programu na okres 2-3 miesięcy ma zapewnione bezpłatne mieszkanie współdzielone z innymi osobami uchodźczymi. Dzięki temu może skupić się na wdrożeniu się w nową rzeczywistość, znalezieniu pracy i uzyskaniu stabilnych dochodów, bez konieczności martwienia się o podstawowe potrzeby życiowe.

# Mieszkanie Treningowe

**Intensywna Nauka Języka Polskiego:** Znajomość języka jest ważnym, składowym elementem w drodze do integracji i samodzielności. Dlatego intensywny kurs językowy jest nieodłącznym elementem programu. Umożliwia zdobycie niezbędnych kompetencji komunikacyjnych i społecznych, co sprzyja poczuciu przynależności do społeczności i sprawczości.

**Wsparcie Psychologiczne:** Zdrowie psychiczne jest fundamentem budowania tożsamości w nowym miejscu. Nasz program obejmuje również wsparcie psychospołeczne, aby uczestnicy mogli lepiej radzić sobie z trudnościami adaptacyjnymi i traumami.

# Mieszkanie Treningowe

## Budowanie Społeczności:

Mieszkanie Treningowe to nie tylko miejsce do życia - to przestrzeń, w której osoby uchodźcze mogą budować nową społeczność. Wspólne doświadczenia, wzajemne wsparcie i codzienne interakcje pomagają uczestnikom lepiej odnaleźć się w nowym środowisku.

Regularne spotkania wszystkich mieszkańców, budowanie potencjału grupy, rozmowy o trudnościach, wyzwaniach, potrzebach i radościach to wykorzystanie samo-wspierających zasobów grupy.

# Mieszkanie Treningowe

Tworząc założenia, cele i metody pracy korzystaliśmy z wiedzy i doświadczenia naszych kolegów i koleżanek z fundacji **Kuchnia Konfliktu**, którzy już od prawie roku prowadzą mieszkanie interwencyjne pod Warszawą o podobnym charakterze.
