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Transit center one (TC1) was set up in April 25, 2023, to host the first new arrivals. It serves as a temporary center for refugees and returnees. The transit center, with a current capacity of 1,453 individuals, is accommodating 2,356 refugees and returnees, which puts it at over 160% of its intended capacity. The situation has on any note improved substantially from the previous month.

While most services are relatively consolidated, however, mainly linked with the protracted situation of the site, associated protection risks are noted due to the overcrowded tap stands, limited food assistance and lack of dignified spaces/overcrowded shelters for both men and women. However, while there is still insufficient lighting in WASH facilities (showers, latrines), the installation of seven (7) solar street lights along the WASH corridors improved the overall sense of security.

Existing gaps

- **Safety & Security:** There is still lack of internal lighting in shelters and latrines, with 40% of outdoor areas experiencing darkness.
- **Health:** The two centers have only one ambulance to cater to a population of roughly 12,000 refugees and returnees.
- **Hazard:** The risk of fire is increased due to densely packed, flammable shelters and the absence of fire breaks/extinguishers. Similarly, the transit
- **WASH:** The ratio of access to latrines and showers is 44:1 and
- **Disability inclusion:** There is a limited availability of mobility aids and equipment for people with disabilities.
