

UNHCR CAMEROON MONTHLY UPDATES

KEY HIGHLIGHTS November 2024

UNHCR Cameroon needs to support refugees, asylum seekers, and internally displaced persons (IDPs) in the country. This update provides detailed demographic, socio-economic, and educational data, as well as information on persons with specific needs, underscoring the complex and multifaceted nature of the refugee and IDP crisis in Cameroon. The monthly update highlights the demographic diversity, educational and occupational challenges, and specific needs of the displaced populations. The data emphasizes the importance of targeting interventions and creating support mechanisms to address the varied and pressing needs of these vulnerable groups. The Cameroonian government and international organizations must collaborate to provide necessary aid and ensure the well-being of these populations.



01 10 Population Overview:

Refugees and Asylum Seekers: Cameroon hosts 411,298 refugees and 16,070 asylum seekers. Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs): The country has 1,036,775 IDPs, with an additional 658,544 returnees. Major Countries of Origin: Refugees primarily come from the Central African Republic 288,111 , Nigeria 125.792 , Chad 4,436 , and Niger 6,407 .



Demographic Distribution:

A significant portion of the refugees are women and children. Specifically, 53% of the refugee population are women and girls, and 56% are children.

Age Groups: Refugees are categorized into various age groups, with notable populations in the 0-4, 5-11, 12-17, 18-59, and 60+ age ranges.



Education Levels:

The educational attainment of refugees varies, with 47% having no education, 27% having primary education, and smaller percentages having informal, secondary, university, or technical/vocational education.



46% of refugees are engaged in various occupations such as homemakers, traders, drivers, pensioners, maneuvers, and breeders. 18% are students, 15% are unemployed, and 10% are farmers.



Ethnicity and Religion:

Ethnicity: The majority of ethnicities are Peulh 42%, Kanuri 12%.

Religion: The religious makeup includes 74% Muslims, 24% Christians, and 2% others.



Persons with Specific Needs:

calegories: There are several categories of persons with specific needs including children at risk, women at risk, single parents, older persons, unaccompanied or separated children, and persons with disabilities. Top Concerns: The highest numbers are children at risk of not attending school 30,249, individuals with vision disabilities 5,008, and older persons with children 2,761.



Legal and Marital Status:

Legal Status: Refugees and asylum seekers are categorized based o their arrival years, with significant influxes noted in 2014 and subsequent years. Marital Status: The majority of the refugee population is single 67%, followed by married individuals 25%.




Regional distribution:

The distribution of refugees and IDPs across various regions in Cameroon shows significant numbers in different regions. The East region hosts the largest refugee population with 165,163 individuals. The Far-North has 121,457 refugees, while Adamaoua has 57,111. The North region accommodates 38,449 refugees, and the Centre has 26,241. The Littoral region has 17,524 refugees.



Challenges and Needs:

UNHCR MCO in Cameroon grapples with significant challenges in managing and supporting its large refugee and internally displaced populations. Due to increasing global crises, UNHCR Cameroon faces immense strain, with regions like the East and Extreme-Nord hosting 165,163 and 121,457 refugees respectively, the strain on resources is immense. These populations include a high percentage of children and women, requiring specialized services such as education, healthcare, and protection. The diverse educational levels among refugees, ranging from no education to university, indicate a need for comprehensive educational programs. Additionally, significant numbers of refugees are unemployed or engaged in low-income occupations, highlighting the necessity for vocational training and employment opportunities. The presence of vulnerable groups, such as unaccompanied children, single parents, and individuals with disabilities, further underscores the urgent need for targeted humanitarian aid and robust social support systems to address their specific needs and ensure their well-being.






DEMOGRAPHIC POPULATION IN CAMEROON




