Transit center one (TC1) was set up in April 25, 2023, to host the first new arrivals. It serves as a temporary center for refugees and returnees. The transit center, with a capacity of 1,453 individuals, but now accommodating average of 3,147 refugees and returnees, which puts it at over 217% of its intended capacity while the population continued to increase throughout the month.

While most services are relatively consolidated, however, mainly linked with the protracted situation of the site, associated protection risks are noted due to the overcrowded tap stands, lack of food assistance and lack of dignified spaces/overcrowded shelters for both men and women. However, while there is still insufficient lighting in WASH facilities (showers, latrines).

Existing gaps

- **Safety & Security:** There is still lack of internal lighting in shelters and latrines, but there was increased outdoor lighting, however, latrines and showers still in darkness. Four (04) newly recruited police officers were deployed this month, increasing the total to 16 to strengthen the center's
- **Hazard:** The risk of fire is imminent as dry season started with densely packed, flammable shelters and the absence of fire breaks/extinguishers, however, fire warden were trained, assembly point mapped and safety unit, however, Upper Nile planned to reclaim the premise, no further investment will be put in place but CCCM continue awareness fire safety and measures.
- **Health:** The two centers have two ambulances that cater for a population of roughly 15,000 refugees and returnees with an average of one ambulance serving approximately 7,500 individuals which meet a minimum standard.
- **WASH:** The ratio of access to functional sanitation and Hygiene facilities is below the minimum standards.
- **Disability inclusion:** There is a limited availability of mobility aids and equipment for people with disabilities.
