Since late February, political instability and rising hostilities between armed groups in South Sudan have led to fresh clashes, particularly in Upper Nile State. This has caused a large influx of people to flee South Sudan to Sudan. More than 205,000 people have entered Sudan during this period. This includes an estimated 73,400 South Sudanese, most of whom (44%) are in White Nile state, followed by Blue Nile (21%), South Kordofan (15%), West Kordofan (12%), East Darfur (6%) and the arrivals in North Darfur and South Darfur by small percentages.

Adding to this complexity is the arrival of an estimated 89,300 Sudanese returnees to Blue Nile State and more than 42,600 Sudanese returnees to White Nile State. Due to the inaccessibility of the routes from Maban to Renk and movement restrictions, refugees have started moving on foot via alternative roads toward Blue Nile. Although formal border monitoring activities remain suspended, small numbers of South Sudanese arrivals and Sudanese returns were recorded during the reporting period. All services provided by humanitarian actors including WASH, health, protection, food assistance, education, and Emergency Shelter/NFIs, are running smoothly in Al Karama sectors 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9. Through UNHCR funding, BMDO continues to conduct registration and verification for new arrivals and is also carrying out a border monitoring household survey.
