

Jamam Monthly Updates

Protection

Jamam Transit Centre continued receiving more new arrivals brought from the Old Gufa Waystation 11 km north of Doro as the population increased to over 2'000 and is approaching full capacity. With the relocation the Transit Centre will close and new arrivals will directly be transported to Kaya. The main protection concern came from high numbers of complaints from refugees that they had not been verified during the biometric verification (13-21 March) despite a stable presence in the camp. On 26 and 27 April, UNHCR conducted litigation and verification of these refugees as well as those who had recently arrived in the Transit Centre. The objective is to have genuine figures of refugees ahead of the relocation to Kaya.

66 Latrines (30 for boys, 30 for girls and 6 for teachers) were constructed/renovated by the wash partners. Preparations for relocation is ongoing. Pupils will continue learning during the relocation exercise and those relocated would be received in temporary set up schools in Kaya camp.

PAE drilled one productive borehole. Failure of the pumping system caused shortage of water for three days. Quick emergency response has been put in place to supply refugees with water trucking, now the generator has been repaired and the supply is back to normal. 48 latrines in school have been completed by Oxfam.

The crude and under five mortality kept below the emergency threshold.

UNHCR in partnership with MSF-B and SIM provided primary health services to refugees and access improved to health posts.

The most common cause of OPD consultations are LRTI, URTI, AWD and malaria.

HepE outbreak is on-going since May 2012 and as of April 28, 2013, a total of 2127 HepE cases and 25 deaths recorded since start of outbreak. Attack rate for symptomatic jaundice was 13.5% for epidemiological week 17.

No other outbreak reported.

Active case finding for malnourished cases on-going at community level through outreach workers. This is to increase admission into the OTP and TSFP programmes as one strategy to reduce malnutrition in the camp.
