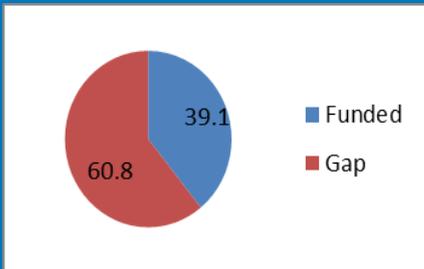

PRIORITIES

- Monitor trends of daily new arrivals
- Maintenance of water network to ensure improved supply
- Close monitoring of malaria and watery diarrhea trends
- Roll out of electronic food vouchers to heads of households
- Preliminary surveys of new site and beaconing.

- As at 29 July 2015, Kakuma had received 46,315 asylum seekers from South Sudan. The transit centre has been temporary closed due to insecurity at the border.
- Formation of Zonal Management Committees has been completed for Kakuma 4 where the block leaders elected on 27th June were sensitized on the need to elect 5 representatives per zone for the positions of Chairman/Chairlady, V.Chairman/V. Chairlady and Secretary. These leaders will join others during monthly interagency coordination meetings to present issues affecting the new arrivals. They will also support blocks in the formation of sectorial committees.

UPDATE ON ACHIEVEMENTS

Operational Context

- The trend of daily new arrivals has remained low and currently the center has been temporary closed due to insecurity. Monitoring of the security situation continues in collaboration with UNDSS. No new arrivals were received during the week.

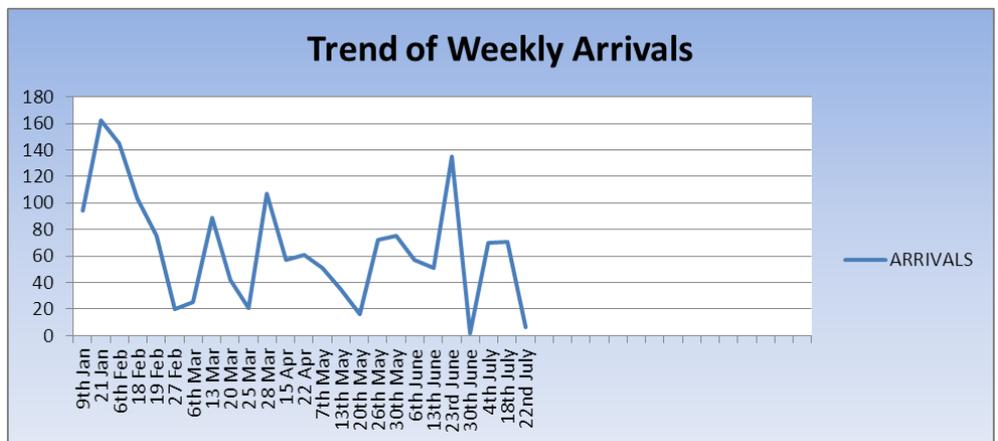


Fig 1: Trend of weekly arrivals

 Protection

Child Protection

1.0 Child protection data

Every week, the child protection data change as new arrivals come in, some children are reunified with their family hence changing status leading to reduction/ increase in number of UASC.

1.1 Unaccompanied Minors:

As of 28 July 2015 there were **1316** UAMs including **912** (174 F & 738 M) South Sudanese UAMs who have been registered in ProGres since December 2013 influx bringing the cumulative number of registered UAMs in Kakuma to **2836**. The breakdown of the registered South Sudanese by area of origin is reflected in the graph below:

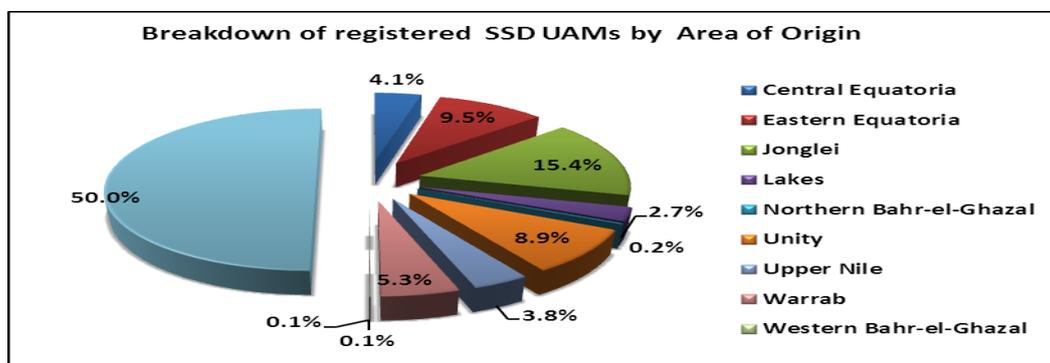


Fig 2: Breakdown of registered South Sudanese UAMs by area of origin

1.2 Separated Children:

As of 21 July 2015 there were **5856** separated children including **5131** (1845 F & 3286 M) South Sudanese separated children who have been registered in ProGres since December 2013 influx bringing the cumulative number of registered SC in Kakuma to **12799**. The breakdown of the registered South Sudanese by area of origin is reflected in the graph below:

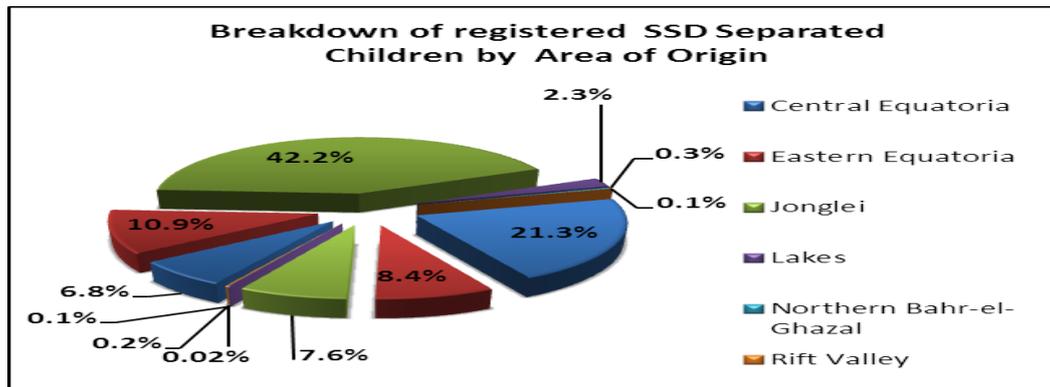


Fig 3: Breakdown of registered South Sudanese Separated Children by area of origin

2.1 Family reunification and foster care arrangement:

During the week, 12 UAMS including 9 (boys) South Sudanese UAMs were reunified with their relatives.

3.0 SGBV

- 4 SGBV cases were reported and assisted to access specialized services including psychosocial counseling and medical treatment to address immediate needs. Out of the reported cases, 1 was sexual violence related and 3 were physical assault.
- A women group meeting was held at Women Centre, Kakuma 4 targeting 160 women, who besides being reached with SGBV messages, they were clustered so as to start income generating activities as a protection tool through economic empowerment. These groups will start meeting in the course of the month for specific training on economic empowerment and later on roll out IGA's based on their skills and material/financial support from UNHCR/UNFPA.
- A partnership meeting between GIZ, UNHCR and SGBV working group was held to deliberate more on the proposed solar lighting project. The project seeks to help prevent SGBV through lighting areas prone with incidents and other strategic locations such as the safe haven. A detailed note will be shared to GIZ highlighting proposed areas, justification and impact, if the solar security lights are installed.

Education

- One day review and update session of the 2013-2016 Kakuma Education Strategy was undertaken with broad participation from various stakeholders including the Ministry of Education, UNICEF, UNFPA, NGO partners(LWF, WTK, DON BOSCO, NRC, JRS, Friends of Waldorf, AAR Japan), Community Representatives and lecturers from Masinde Muliro University of Science and Technology(MMUST). The review was aimed at appraising progress in achieving targets, constraints and proposed steps to fast track implementation.
- A 4 day induction training for 46 (9f) newly recruited teachers was conducted at TRC from 21st July to 24th July. The training was on the following areas: preparation and management of professional documents, teaching and learning methods, teaching and learning recourses, classroom management, teachers integrity and ethics and handling learners with special needs

Shelter and NFIs

Achievements and Impact

- 30 plots were demarcated in KK4 Zn 3 Bl 6. This is for the purposes of construction of T-Shelters.
- 782 durable shelters were constructed for new arrivals in Kak 4 and assessment of shelter needs is ongoing.

Working in partnership

- UNHCR continues to work closely with the Central and County Governments, DRA and other partners to ensure protection and wellbeing of refugees and asylum seekers. Bi-monthly Inter-Agency meetings continue to be held as well as meetings with refugee leaders in the camp.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Total recorded contributions for the emergency operation amount to **US\$ 14.3 million** representing **39.1%** of the requested funding.
