

### OVERVIEW

This weekly report is produced by the International Organization for Migration (IOM) as part of its crisis reporting on the drought in the Horn of Africa countries. The report covers the period from 8 to 14 November 2011. The next report will be issued on 22 November 2011.

### Highlights

- KENYA & ETHIOPIA – IOM has transported **81,705** refugees in Ethiopia and Kenya as of 13 November 2011.
- KENYA – IOM exploring ways to assist amidst waterborne diseases outbreak in Dadaab Refugee Camps.
- KENYA – IOM successfully completes first phase of transportation of refugees to collect food rations.
- ETHIOPIA – IOM to transport first refugees to new Dollo Ado camp this week.

### ANALYSIS & TRENDS

**IOM Successfully Completes First Phase of Transportation for Refugees to Collect Food Rations** – On 11 November IOM successfully completed the first phase of transporting refugees to and from Hagadera to Kambioos Camps to collect food rations provided by the World Food Programme (WFP). The first round of transportation kicked off on 1 November and benefited **2,188** families or **10,236** refugees who make up the total population of Kambioos Camp. IOM is planning to begin the second phase on 23 or 25 November to reach the same number of refugees. IOM’s transportation services are being offered in tandem with WFP’s second food distribution this month after the organization announced it could not deliver food rations to the camp due to insecurity.

# IOM Response to the Horn of Africa Crisis

## EXTERNAL SITUATION REPORT

15 November 2011

### Kenya Operations

**IOM Exploring Ways to Help Amidst Outbreak of Waterborne Diseases in Dadaab Camps** – IOM is looking at various options to assist health partners in curtailing the number of waterborne diseases reported in Dadaab Refugee Camps. UNOCHA recently stated that waterborne diseases have been reported at the Dadaab Refugee Camps, with 11 laboratory-confirmed cases. At a 9 November inter-agency health and nutrition coordination meeting, it was also reported that Kambioos and Ifo 2 West and East Camps do not have proper health facilities, and that the several health posts inside the camps cannot deal with the influx. Overall waterborne diseases fatalities stand at 1.7 percent or one death out of 60, according to UNHCR.

**Movements** – There have been no movements in Dadaab since 14 October following security concerns in the region.

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## EXTERNAL SITUATION REPORT

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### Ethiopia Operations

**IOM to Transport First Refugees to New Dollo Ado Camp This Week** – On 16 November, IOM will begin transporting approximately 700 refugees from the Dollo Ado Transit Centre to the newly completed emergency shelters in Buramino Camp, located approximately 23 kms north of Dollo Ado. This is expected to ease the pressure on services from the large number of refugees staying in the Transit Centre which is currently accommodating close to 7,000 people. Meanwhile, IOM is continuing to transport refugees from the Dollo Ado Reception Centre to the Transit Centre.

**Movements** - As of 13 November 2011, IOM has provided transportation assistance to 36,755 refugees from the Dollo Ado Reception Centre to the Transit Centre and from the Transit Centre to Hilaweyn Camp. According to UNHCR, more than 200 refugees arrive daily at the Reception Centre in Dollo Ado. There has been a slight decrease in the number of new arrivals registered at the Reception Centre this week from 1,085 refugees in the last reporting period to 882 this week. There were 1,018 refugees provided with pre-departure medical screening for movement and 155 individuals reunited with their families after having been separated due to health concerns. The overall population in the Dollo Ado camps stands at 136,576 refugees as of 11 November 2011.

IOM is also working with stakeholders to fill gaps identified in needs assessments related to shelter (with UNHCR); livelihood programmes; and medical assistance, capacity-building and primary care services (in support of ARRA, the Ethiopian government refugee agency.)*
