

The past two years have seen the refugee population in Ethiopia nearly double. This is due to the influx of more than 100,000 Somalis into the Dollo Ado region, and a stream of Sudanese entering the country in the region around Assosa. A steady, but significant, number of Eritreans have also entered Ethiopia's Afar and Tigray regions. Ethiopia is now host to some 388,805 refugees: the largest groups are Somalis (60 per cent), Sudanese and South Sudanese (23 per cent) and Eritreans (17 per cent). In addition, there are a number of displaced people of concern from Kenya in the Moyale region, as well as urban refugees from several other countries, including Burundi, the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC), Djibouti, Rwanda, Uganda and Yemen.



➔ **5,834 new arrivals** mainly Somali registered in Dollo Ado sub office (4,657 ind.), Eritrean in Sub office Shire (925 ind.) and Sudanese in Western Ethiopia (252 ind.).

➔ **252 refugees** were resettled mainly **117** from Kebribeyah, **63** from Urban locations and **42** from Shimelba.

Dispersed Refugees population and its relative weight compared to total population


