



Emergency tents and individual shelters

3,500 tents and individual shelters constructed to host the newly arrived refugees. More shelters under construction.



Emergency 4-unit shelters

About 600 emergency 4-unit shelters constructed so far. Each shelter hosts 4 families in individual units separated by plastic sheeting.



Existing buildings

Schools, churches, youth centres and other buildings are used to temporarily accommodate refugees.



Emergency mass shelters


About 120 mass shelters built to accommodate the rapidly growing number of Burundian refugees. Each shelter hosts between 150 -200 individuals.


