- 30,000 registered per month



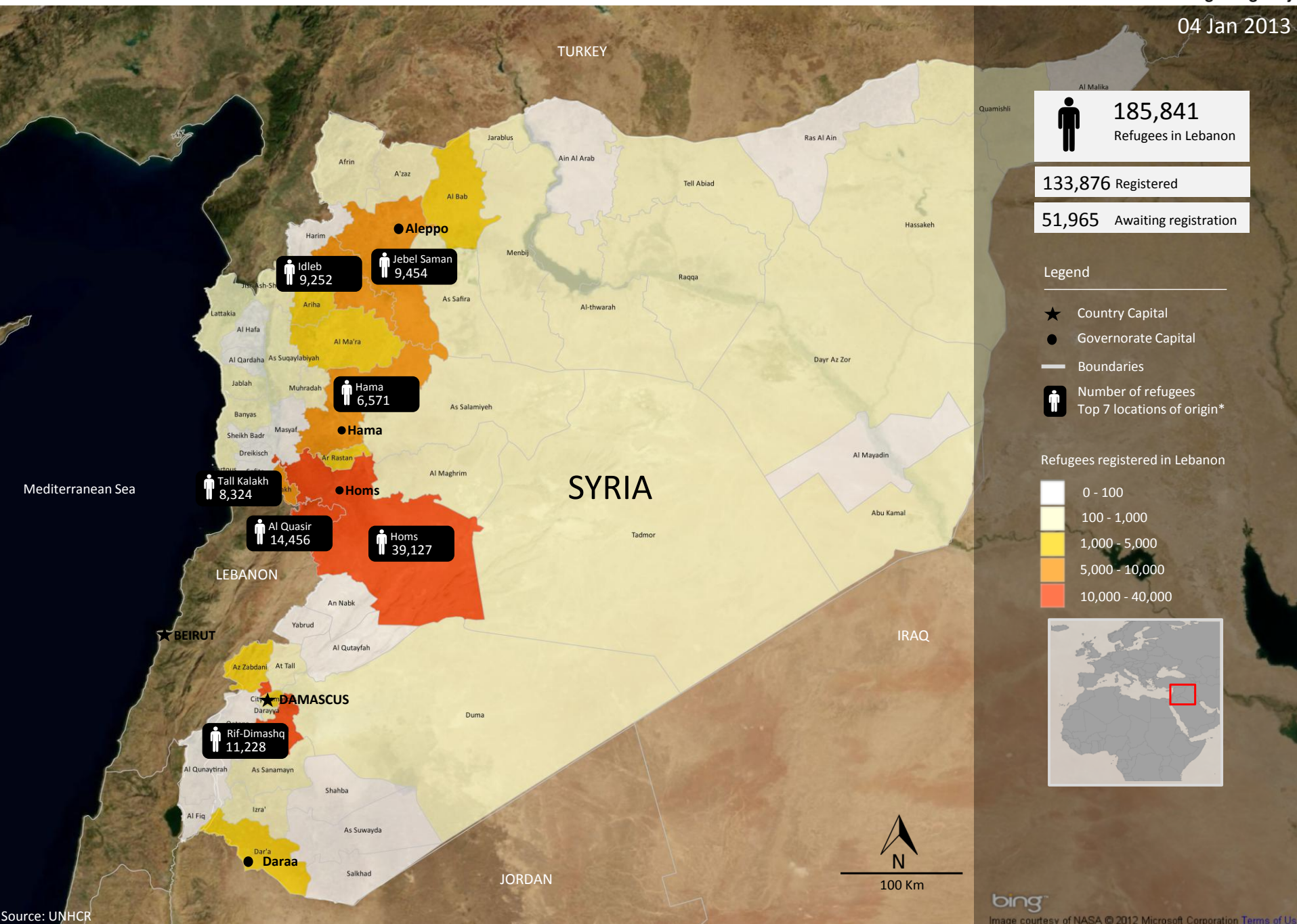
- A cold wave hit Lebanon affecting Saida, North and Bekaa

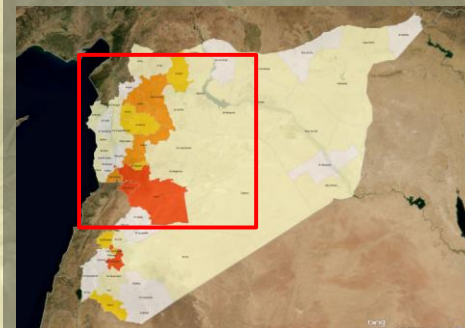

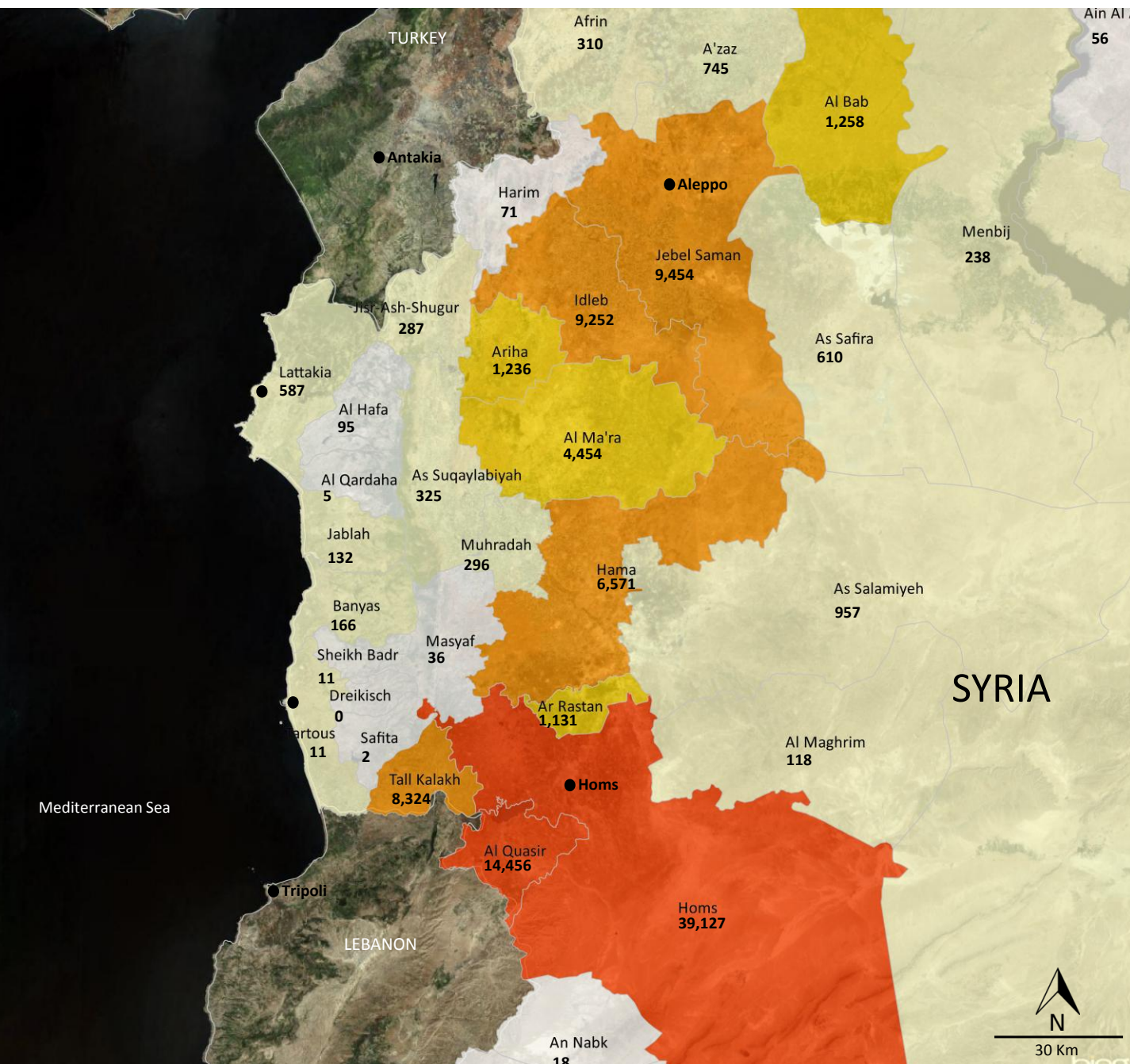

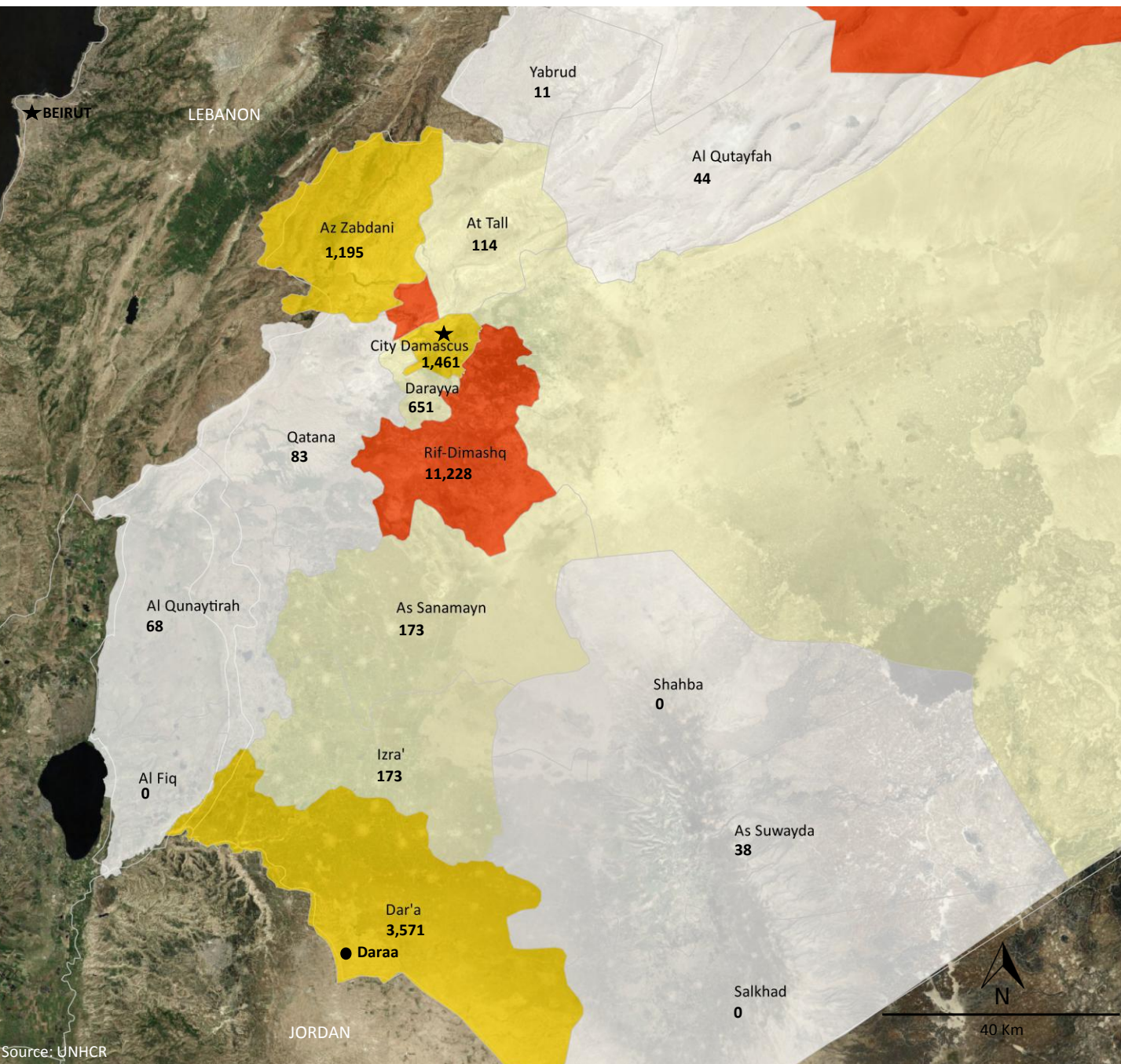

Places of origin

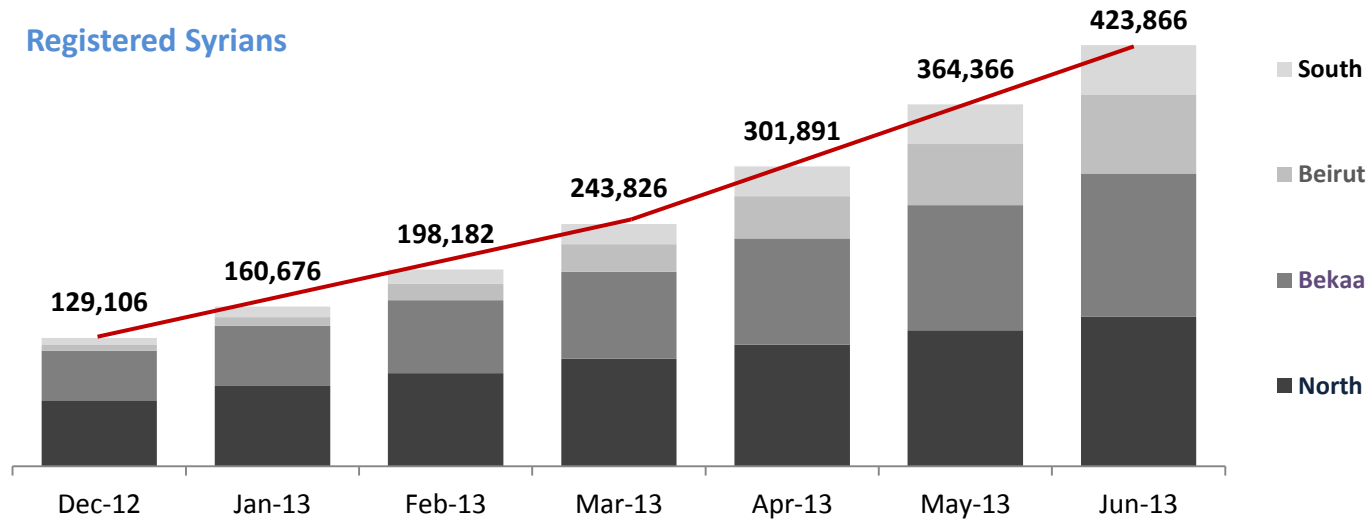


Increased capacity

- Target: Less than one month waiting period
- Monthly capacity will increase to 30,000 in January to 60,000 by May
- An emergency registration database developed for mass influx capacity of 6,000 persons day.

Access

- Permitted to enter
- No refoulement

- Fees and regularization under discussion

Safety and security

- Over 600 families in Tripoli in high to medium risk zones (due to intermittent clashes)
- UNHCR provides counselling, and assistance to those wishing to relocate



CHILD PROTECTION

- Case management training for child protection on-going
- Inter-agency country wide child protection assessment scheduled for January
- Assessment will cover the whole country and will focus on SGBV

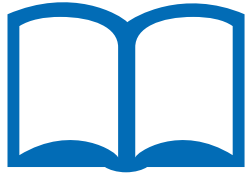

- UNHCR SGBV coordinator soon on board

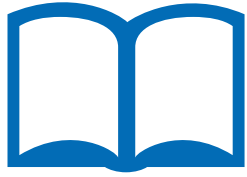


EDUCATION

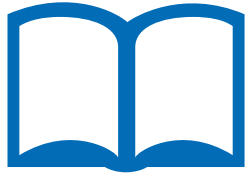

Received awareness campaigns	10,000

- The **Back to School campaign** ensured that **31,000 new children** were enrolled in school (MEHE statistics) in addition to the 19,900 Syrian children who were already enrolled in the Lebanese public school.



EDUCATION - Challenges

- Lack of space and capacity
- Curriculum: Language of instruction (French and English)
- Teachers unable to deal with large classes
- Children with trauma and special needs
- Bullying in schools
- Increased drop-out or non-enrolment
- Lack of meaningful initiatives and programs for youth



EDUCATION – Plan 2013

- Strengthen the MEHE capacity to deal with the crisis
- Expansion of learning spaces and rehabilitation of schools
- Special attention for children with disabilities
- Second shift to be opened in the afternoon for accelerated learning programmes
- Increase monitoring and follow-up of cases of bullying and discrimination
- Youth programmes - vocational, life skills
- Secondary and tertiary education through the provision of scholarships
- BtS campaign for 2013/14 school year

- Referral criteria and committee established for secondary and tertiary care
- A network of 22 contracted hospitals has been established across Lebanon
- Hospital costs for secondary health care covered to 85%
- 100% coverage for pregnant and lactating women and children under 5



HEALTH - Challenges

- Rapidly increasing number of patients
- Referrals to hospital (secondary and tertiary health care) are extremely costly
- Growing number of mental health needs
- Weak data collection and reporting mechanisms
- Health awareness



HEALTH – Plan 2013

- Ensure continuity of comprehensive PHC and address specific areas of concern
- Strengthening Ministry of Public Health structures at ER, PHC and even secondary/ tertiary level
- Expanding programmes to address mental health needs
- Health Information System (HIS) for Lebanon being implemented
- Strengthen outreach and health education activities



SHELTER

2012 achievements

SHELTER

Challenges

- To renovate shelters fast enough and find alternatives
- Inability to keep up with weekly demand
- 100 families a week whose needs cannot be appropriately addressed
- Need to plan for transit sites as contingency

Action

- Approval for two transit sites in north and Bekaa received
- Additional local capacity – perhaps army
- UNHCR site planner arrives today
- Technical inter-ministerial meeting gaining traction



SHELTER – Budget

- UNHCR and partners are cash strapped
- Additional funds needed for present shelter needs and contingencies including for:
 - Weather-proofing and basic rehabilitation and wash
 - Identification and rehabilitation of collective shelters
 - Emergency sanitation units for mass influx
 - Construction and implementation of two transit sites - 5,000 persons each
 - Additional stockpiles and 16 rub halls to store much needed relief items

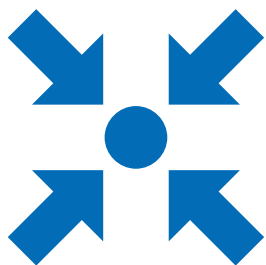

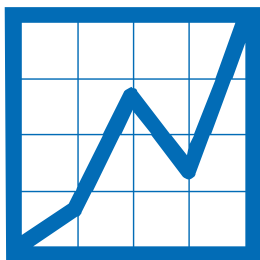

INTER-AGENCY COORDINATION

- Enhanced inter-agency coordination
- Increased technical capacity
- Standardised meetings, schedules, notes, action plans
- Need for decision-making at field level
- Donors and partners to identify priorities/activities to be funded based on the work plans / strategy provided by the sector leads

Revised Syrian Refugee Response

New Trends

- Targeting (vs. blanket assistance)
- Cash assistance (vs. in-kind distribution)
- Repair of social infrastructure
- Expanded outreach efforts
- Services also to Palestinian refugees from Syria
- Collaboration with organisations outside formal coordination mechanism
- Shelter contingency planning for massive influx
