


Highlights

- On 15 July 2013, AFAD - the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Government of Turkey - announced that the total number of Syrians registered and assisted in 20 camps in 10 provinces increased to 201,045, including 532 Syrians receiving medical treatment in hospitals. AFAD reported that during the last 24 hrs. of 14-15 July 2013 that 284 Syrians were admitted and registered in the camps while 256 Syrians voluntarily returned to Syria.
- AFAD reported that since the beginning of the crisis, almost 1,3 million doctor consultations were provided to the Syrians in the Field Hospitals in the camps, more than 225,000 referrals to hospitals, of which about 30,000 cases were hospitalized in the state hospitals. Reportedly some 24,000 medical surgeries were conducted and 4,883 new borns in Turkey were recorded. As of 15 July 2013, 27,640 Syrian children are studying in the schools established in the camps and 5,866 adults are attending various vocational courses in the camps.
- During the meetings with the local authorities, all reported to UNHCR that the number of non-camp Syrians is increasing and as the security situation gets worse in Syria more and more people are coming to Turkey. The majority of the non-camp Syrians are living in Gaziantep, Kilis, Hatay and Sanliurfa provinces. Reportedly those who can afford it are moving to other parts of Turkey - Istanbul or elsewhere - while several thousands are living with their relatives in the villages of Sanliurfa and Mardin provinces.
- Local officials in Gaziantep informed UNHCR that the situation of non-camp Syrians continues to grow more challenging. Some NGOs provide basic humanitarian assistance (food packages, and medical assistance), in some provinces through the Social Assistance and Solidarity Foundation offices, while the Government of Turkey also provides some assistance including cash and food packs to most vulnerable and needy families identified through local community and the AFAD Coordination Centres.
- In cooperation with AFAD, UNHCR is advancing initiatives to provide assistance to the most vulnerable Syrians living outside of the camps in South East Turkey. Subject to funding, appropriate support mechanisms will be implemented in the coming months.
