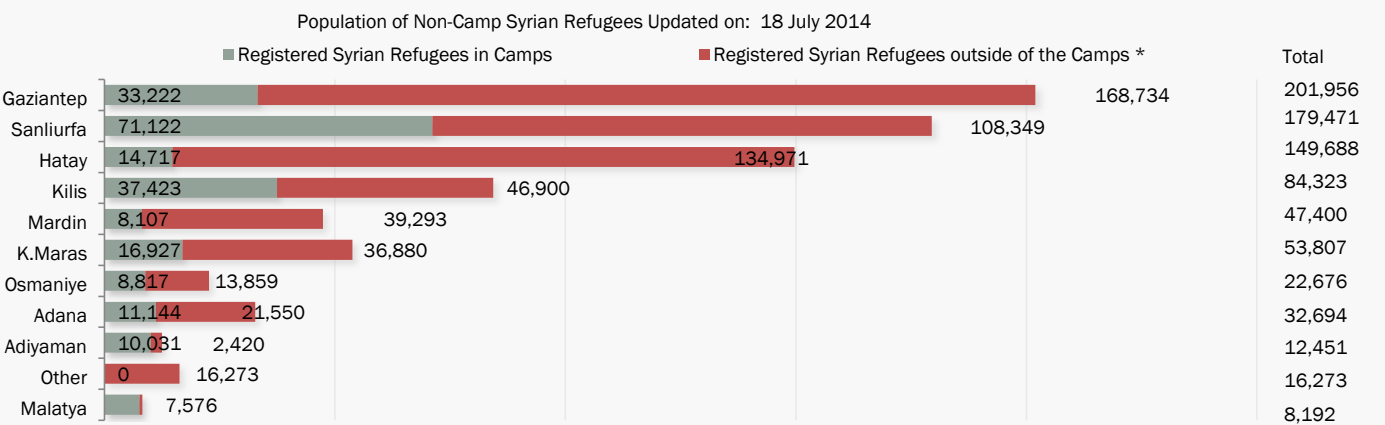
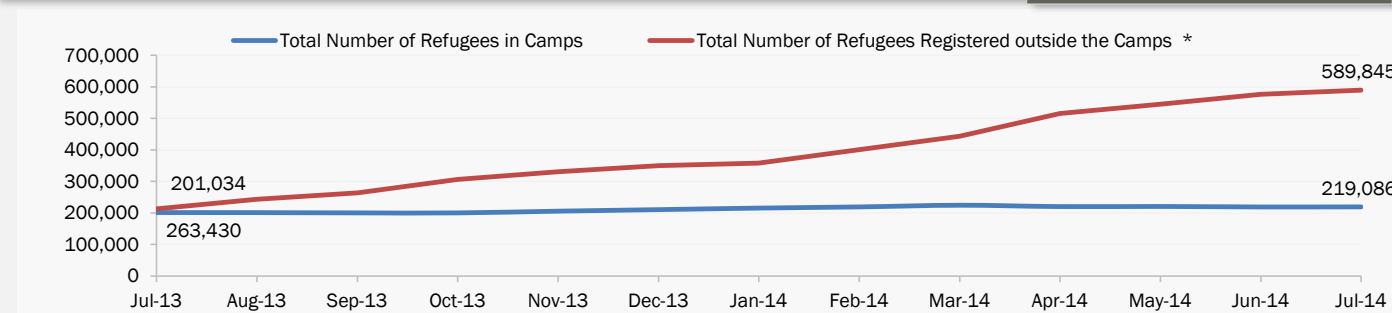
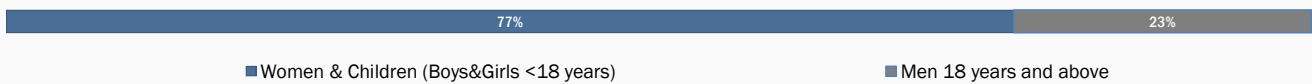


Total Number of Refugees Registered and with Registration Appointments	808,931

Highlights

- On 20 July 2014, AFAD - the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Government of Turkey - announced that the total number of Syrians registered and assisted in 22 camps located in 10 provinces was 219,086. AFAD reported that during the period of 18-20 July 2014, a total of 761 Syrians were admitted and registered in the camps and 733 Syrians voluntarily returned to Syria.
- The World Food Programme (WFP) is in the process of establishing price monitoring committees in all camps. The committees serve as a tool to improve the programme by empowering all actors, including beneficiaries, to monitor, discuss and find solutions to the challenges faced by the different parties. Committees are currently operational and/or in progress in 17 and usually include WFP and Turkish Red Crescent (TRC) staff, representative beneficiaries and market managers. The participation of women in the committees is highly encouraged by WFP. WFP monitoring results show that Syrians in WFP/TRC-supported camps are generally food secure, with 96 percent having acceptable food consumption scores.
- After a meeting held in Adana last week among provincial officials, in which UNHCR also participated, the Adana governorate sent a mission composed of representatives from provincial directorates of AFAD, foreigners police, child police, the Provincial Directorate of Family and Social Policies, and the Provincial Directorate Education to Gaziantep to meet with the local authorities there and to visit the IMC/ASAM Multi Service Center to observe a best practice of the community center sample for possible implementation in Adana.
- In Gaziantep, a Syrian NGO supported by a Syrian doctor rented facilities in the city center to provide accommodation to Syrian patients who are obtaining cancer treatment in the hospitals nearby. A UNHCR team visited the center and reported that they have about 30 patients who are being provided with temporary accommodation during their treatment phases. In the center, the patients are provided with two meals (breakfast and dinner). Refugees staying in the center informed UNHCR that some of them are coming from other provinces and that one of their main challenges is the transportation to and from Gaziantep, as they have to cover their own travel expenses.
