Camp management will approve requests supported by the relevant sector and if they are cost effective, focused, constructive and have the greatest possible impact. All activities in the camp have an effect on overall security, so it is imperative to go through the correct procedures before commencing any activity in the camp. Any organisation that does not respect this condition will have their permission to operate in the camp revoked by camp management.

Parking Area near the main entrance to the BC

Several staff reported that there is no protection in the new parking area out of the base camp, for white plate cars use only. The issue was that Syrian refugee children will try anything to get any amount of money from

each owner of the cars. They threat to break the car, scratch, flat Tyre, or throw themselves under the car. SRAD Liaison Officer emphasised that they are ready to respond to any incident reported in this concern. After the meeting, UNHCR FSA appointed one G4S guard to be posted at the parking gate on daily basis from 08:00hrs till 16:00hrs.

Recent incidents

19 July Early morning there was shortage of bread item at the Saudi bakery.

20 July A sewerage tanker hit the south east gate of the B.C at 0900 hrs.

21 July Short circuits in the wash room in BC, ventilation fan burnt, fire-fighters responded. No injuries.

24 July Police brought a refugee after he had escaped from camp long time ago.

25 July A fight erupted in street 29 in district # 6 over water distribution, one female was injured and incident was reported to police.

25 July A Syrian worker found five Narcotic pills while he was cleaning the rub hall in the at reception area, AFSA informed the police and they came and confiscated the tablets and take statement from the worker.

26 July A fight erupted between two families in district # 7, one refugee was stabbed.

28 July A minor female escaped from IRC compound. According to IRC staff on duty, the girl jumped over the latrine fence towards the camp. FSA advised IRC staff to follow up with UNHCR protection. NRC team leader was advised to enhance the fence.

31 July A water tanker ran over a six years old girl on the ring road at district # 7 at 0830hrs; unfortunately the girl passed away, the driver handed himself over to the police station, UNICEF and Acted follow up with girl's family.

WASH: Water related complaints are less now, in 2 weeks only 10 complaints. Water trucks are going through water point and data is recorded on the white board. Everyone can see how much water is delivered. 2 shifts from UNICEF, DFAs present at the boreholes and the eastern gate. Contact UNICEF in case of any complaints regarding water. For the 3rd borehole in D7 work will start this week depending on the site clearance. 1700 sewerage water desludged. UNICEF is hoping to have the water treatment unit to start operating in September. We will invite the refugees involve them in the discussions. Group of households connected to a sewerage system (UNHCR got some money) Amin Bhai of UNHCR will prepare/present a presentation.

NFI: Blanket distribution of diapers and now planned distribution of wash kits. Moving on to the Vouchers, will try to test the system at a smaller scale with hygiene items.

Food: E-vouchers (master card) planning in mid-September. It has been delayed due to internet and phone connection. August cycle of voucher distribution started 3rd of August. Distribution of super cereals continues. Bread reduced to 16.9 MT last few days. For summer school classes, 1102 students were provided with biscuits.

Health: Notable decrease in consultations during Ramadan. No threshold of diseases right now. Health water and sanitation committee by ministry of health visited the camp as they have been requested to report on all camps. JEN, Oxfam and ACTED continue working on hygiene promotion. 6th round of polio campaign will start soon. New arrivals war wounded going smooth.

Electricity: 5 hour power cut is postponed till further notice. Coming days we will work on the small projects to reduce the electricity usage. In order to avoid the high loads, keep ACs on 24, when you leave turn things off. To pick the wires on the ground, we have plans and will start implementing that in a week or two.

Other issues

Follow up with bailout guidelines with Amman, the new guideline will be shared with refugees and all stakeholders. It was noted due there is an increased number of police referrals of refugees from urban areas to

the camp. Protection unit continues on return monitoring Follow up to discussion with GoJ it was agreed to send list of children over one year who have not yet received their birth certificates. This is for children born inside Jordan.

Response for DAFI scholarship application in the camp was very positive, this highlights the need for higher education opportunities for refugees in the camp.

Youth Task Force: 12th August world youth day will be celebrated. Details of the events to be shared soon.

Recreation: English classes will start soon, also there will be classes on teaching make up. For visiting researcher, if translation is needed IRD can be contacted. British council is also starting a course like IELTS and TOEFL.

Education: For Taujihi exam, 4 students from the camp passed the exam, two in top ten and one topper in overall Mafraq. English and Maths was weak. For catch up classes 800 registered and only 400 attending (these classes are available for 36 days). SCJ's back to school campaign (door to door) will start tomorrow till first day of school.

Ministry of Education announced the dates for the next term of school and those are 17th August for teachers and 24th for the students.
