



Mission

Founded in 1933, the International Rescue Committee responds to the world's worst humanitarian crises and helps people to survive and rebuild their lives. Since 2007, IRC has worked with refugees and other vulnerable populations in Jordan. IRC's recent and current programs in Jordan focused on interventions that address Gender based Violence, reproductive health and primary health care Iraqi and Syrian refugees and host community members. Interventions in this sector ensure coordinating the available services while ensuring quality services through building the capacities of local partners and service providers on the ground.



According to the figures in the RRP6 Mid Year Review, the IRC has appealed for a revised total of **USD 15,307,452**

Additional Sector Information

In addition, the IRC is implementing for UN agencies who have also appealed under RRP6. This includes a 12-month project with UNFPA to manage four women's centers in Zataari camp, which provide a safe space for women and girls and also offer life-skills training in things like sewing, hairdressing, and literacy and numeracy. The IRC also works with UNICEF and UNHCR to support separated and unaccompanied children in Zaatari and Azraq camps.

The IRC also implements a number of projects to assist urban refugees and host communities with bi-lateral donors not under the RRP6, for example the Bureau of Population, Refugees, and Migration, ECHO and DFID

Geographic Information

In 2014, IRC plans to intervene Mafrq and Irbid and has Protection and Health programmes that are in general in the north and country-wide.
