



Total Number of Refugees Registered and with Registration Appointments	843,625

Highlights

- On 11 September, AFAD, the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Turkey's Government, announced that the total number of Syrians registered and assisted in the 22 camps located in 10 provinces was 220,240. AFAD reported that from 10 to 11 September, a total of 580 Syrians were admitted and registered in the camps and 683 Syrians have voluntarily returned to Syria.
- In Akcakale, the numbers of members of the women committee will be increased from 7 to 10. The committee members who meet on a weekly basis informed UNHCR that they will support the camp management in identifying orphan children and disabled persons. The children committee members stated they will work in the districts to identify school aged children not enrolled in school. This committee has conducted a similar survey during the previous academic year and identified around 100 children in one district who were not enrolled.
- In Ceylanpinar camp, officials informed UNHCR that there are around 70 Syrians requesting admission claiming to have newly arrived from Syria. The camp management stated it will not be possible to admit them because the camp is at full capacity. They have decided not to admit any more spontaneous arrivals because they believe it to have become a pull factor since more people continue to approach the camp.
- The Provincial Directorate of Family and Social Policies informed UNHCR that the Social Services Center in Ceylanpinar is opened and the social workers in the center will support the camp management to conduct the assessments of unaccompanied minors (UAM) when needed to make the appropriate recommendation on action to be taken. The recommendations may include placement in a child centre.
- The media continued to report on new arrivals from Syria into Turkey through unofficial crossing points near Kilis Elbeyli town. A UNHCR team spoke to some of these new arrivals who stated that they left their villages (Raqqqa, Azaz, etc.) because of insecurity and having become bombing targets. Some also stated they hope to work in Turkey's agriculture.
