

Foreword



I met the mayor of Machta Hamoud in the hot August of 2011. Machta Hamoud was one of several villages in Wadi Khaled that had recently taken in 2,000 Syrian refugees. The mayor wanted to discuss water. With so many people to assist, the town was running dry and he needed help.

Three years later, the war in Syria shows no sign of ending and there is little hope for a speedy return to Syria. Wadi Khaled now hosts 16,000 refugees. Machta Hamoud still needs more water.

This year, Lebanon marked a grim milestone: more than one million refugees now live here.

How best to convey the weight of a million? No country in recent memory has taken in more refugees proportional to its size. Refugees live in more than 1,700 communities in Lebanon, some of which host more refugees than nationals. And while international humanitarian funding has been considerable, it does not cover all of the needs of refugees or of the Lebanese communities who have reached out and provided protection and assistance even when it has meant sharing their often already strained public services.

Yet, in the midst of this bleak picture, there are signs of hope. Support to communities hosting refugees has begun, with hundreds of community support projects initiated in areas where poverty levels, refugee numbers and tensions are high. Across Lebanon, villages are benefiting from: new wells; water, sanitation and waste management facilities; community centres; improved medical facilities; youth education and sport activities; rehabilitation works; and livelihood projects. This publication focuses on 278 projects that UNHCR has initiated, generously supported by donors and implemented by partners under the guidance of government authorities.

Machta Hamoud is one of the many communities profiled here. It now pumps water regularly into hundreds of homes previously suffering from intermittent supply. The community is grateful for this modest but high impact investment. But it is only a start.

Projects alone will not solve Lebanon's problems, but helping Lebanese communities can mitigate tensions and help lift the weight of a million.

Foreword



By mid-February 2014, a new Lebanese Council of Ministers was formed, at a point when Lebanon was already struggling to cope with over 1,000,000 displaced Syrian citizens on its territory. Nearly eight months into our tenure, the Syrian population in Lebanon has further expanded and thousands of communities across the country are still carrying burdens too great for them to bear.

From Akkar all the way to the South, our towns and villages have been at the forefront of the humanitarian response to an incessantly escalating crisis. The inhabitants of these communities have opened their hearts and homes to the refugees. They have shared their food, their water, their electricity, their schools, and their clinics – resources and services that were barely adequate to cover the local needs prior to the crisis.

The Syrian crisis has had an enormous impact on Lebanon including at the local level. The presence of over a 1.5 million Syrians across Lebanon has directly affected the public and service sectors at the national scale. It has become very difficult for the Lebanese people, the Government and all other stakeholders to keep up with the sheer pace of this crisis and the resultant surge of needs in terms of sufficiently expanding and maintaining public services and infrastructure. This difficulty came at a time when the impact of the crisis on Lebanon was not yet evident to the world.

This has led the Government of Lebanon, in close collaboration with the international organization, to work on setting national needs and priorities that focus on strengthening the capacity of Lebanon to cope with the increasing numbers of Syrians and to be able to tend to their humanitarian and protection needs. Therefore, we are currently working on directing available resources to where they can generate the greatest impact: local communities. While not close to being enough, considerable investments have been made in support of these communities in various sectors. Any support to the hosting communities, which lies within the priorities and needs set by the Government, is always a welcome initiative. The UN system has always been one step ahead of everyone in this domain, which lies at the heart of the mandate of the Ministry of Social Affairs (MoSA). The special relation between MoSA and UNHCR, strengthened, by the close collaboration on the response to the Syrian emergency in Lebanon, since May 2011, has resulted in a commendable effort put into the support of the local community.

The numerous projects highlighted in this publication have brought much needed breathing space to our communities and improved our lives and the lives of our Syrian kin. Yet these projects should be perceived as but the beginning of an intervention much larger in scale and scope.

Among its neighbors, Lebanon has welcomed the largest number of Syrian refugees and borne the heaviest burden as a result. In order for Lebanon to continue affecting its humanitarian role, much more needs to be done by way of economic and social development.

When refugees flee across borders, it is often local communities that are the first to respond. Nowhere has this been more the case than in Lebanon.

For more than three years, Lebanese communities have received refugees in record numbers. Refugees are now present in at least 1,700 communities across this small country, with the largest concentration of refugees found in areas that are marked with the highest levels of poverty among Lebanese people. Many towns have more refugees than resident Lebanese.

Substantial and prolonged refugee influxes invariably place increased political, social, economic and environmental pressures on hosting communities. This is the case in Lebanon, where infrastructure that was fragile prior to the Syria crisis is now under severe strain.

The effects are visible across the country. Waste and sanitation facilities are insufficient for the swelling population; water supplied by leaky pipes cannot meet increased demand. Subsidised public goods (such as electricity and flour) are being consumed in greater numbers, with consequent pressure on the public purse; increased demand for health services is leading to longer waiting periods for Lebanese and is costing Lebanon's Ministry of Public Health more; and greater competition for jobs is driving down wages.

Responding to a refugee influx requires more than simply meeting refugees' needs. Institutions, municipalities and hosting communities need support to cope with new arrivals, including help to strengthen relevant capacities and to mitigate some of the negative effects of refugees' presence. This is always a vital component of UNHCR's refugee response and has been since the outset of the crisis in Lebanon. The pace of this part of the agency's programme has matched the pace of the arrival of refugees: support was initially provided to Lebanese households sheltering refugees when the numbers were relatively small, and as the numbers of refugees grew that support was extended to line ministries and communities.



In 2014, UNHCR reserved 15 percent of its humanitarian budget in Lebanon for support to public institutions and local communities that provide protection and assistance to refugees. This publication focuses on the latter and demonstrates the investments that bring needed services and relief to communities who shoulder a heavy load.

UNHCR's community support projects (CSPs) are quick, focused projects producing rapid results. These projects not only help communities mitigate the impact of refugees' presence, but many bring services which had been required by villages prior to the crisis. These included electric generators; boreholes, waste treatment facilities, vehicles for garbage collection and snow removal, public libraries and community centres.

In total, since 2011 UNHCR has implemented 278 community support projects in Lebanon, allocating USD 25.5 million to these projects so far. In 2014, more than USD 12 million have been allocated to these projects.



Sectoral Breakdown by Year


Percentage of total community support budget

Since 2011, UNHCR has been working with community leaders to identify solutions to urgent needs. CSP budget priorities continually respond to the changing needs of host communities.





Selection Process

Community support projects focus on the nearly 250 localities where the largest number of vulnerable Lebanese and refugees live. In each of UNHCR’s five field offices, selection committees have been established, comprising technical specialists and representatives of Lebanon’s Ministry of Social Affairs, United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and specialized non-governmental organisations. Other ministries are consulted in respect to projects that fall within their areas of concern, such as education, environment, public health and water. Overall, the committees must ensure that projects:


- meet local needs;
- are sustainable;
- involve the community;
- benefit both host and refugee communities in areas with a high refugee presence, or where tensions are potentially arising;
- are consistent with municipal priorities and planning; and
- are environmentally neutral or positive.

Moving Forward

As important as these projects are, they are just the start. Support to public institutions, municipalities and hosting communities requires more robust engagement by a wider array of actors. To encourage that, since 2012 UNHCR and UNDP have chaired a working group on social cohesion and livelihoods, which brings humanitarian agencies together to focus on and coordinate efforts to respond to community needs. This working group also benefits from the guidance of the Ministry of Social Affairs and the Prime Minister's office.

In parallel, beginning in 2012, funding appeals for institutional and community support were also captured in the Syria Regional Response Plan. By 2013, 25 per cent of the funding appeal for Lebanon under the Plan was allocated for institutional and community support. These efforts will receive an added boost with the introduction of a resilience plan that, together with the refugee plan, will make up the comprehensive 2015/16 Plan.

Education Projects

Providing support to Lebanese schools and students

During the 2013-14 school year, Lebanese schools enrolled more than 90,000 Syrian refugee children. Education CSPs have increased the capacity of the education system, enabling public schools to accept more students and improve the quality of education offered. Today, more students—both Lebanese and Syrian—are learning in child-friendly classrooms and have access to toilets, school supplies and new equipment.





In 2012, the Qab Elias public elementary school in the Bekaa Valley was in need of equipment and repair. With only 400 desks, the school was forced to turn away students in the area, referring children to schools further away from their homes. Without enough heaters, students were often cold during the winter months.

A year later, the school joined 20 others in the Bekaa Valley to launch a second shift of afternoon classes for Syrian refugee children. To support Qab Elias and other schools running double shifts, UNHCR, in partnership with UNDP, rehabilitated classrooms and bathroom facilities, and performed electrical work. Broken doors and windows were repaired, and new desks and heaters were delivered. This project has benefited students across classes and Qab Elias has been able to enrol more Lebanese and Syrian students.

“The support received from UNHCR allowed the school to operate at its full capacity,” said Mr. Hicham Qamar, the school’s principal. “The equipment we had, previously, could only cater for 400 students. Now, with the support we received, we’ve been able to enrol over 1,000 students.”

More children in Hrar, Mishmish, Fnaydek and Bazbina are now enrolled in school, thanks to rehabilitation provided by UNHCR, in partnership with UNDP. Schools received new classrooms and significant rehabilitation; broken windows were fixed, floors were paved, electrical work was performed and support structures were repaired. Students now learn in child-friendly classrooms and have access to working toilets.

At the Lebanese University in Tripoli, students often had difficulty completing their studies because they did not have easy access to computers, printers or academic support. The University's Study Centre did not have enough equipment, and students were forced to rely on private computer centres at considerable cost.

In 2013, UNHCR, in partnership with DRC, supported the University's Study Centre by providing an academic assistant, free photocopy services, a computer lab, Wi-Fi, and free workshops with professional trainers. Now, Lebanese and Syrian students can use these resources to complete their studies without financial burden.

"I used to spend around 20,000 Lebanese pounds (USD 15) per day on photocopying, doing research on the internet, and printing materials," says Aysha, an 18-year-old Lebanese student. "That is the equivalent of 400,000 Lebanese pounds (USD 265) per month."

Her father is retired and struggles to cover living expenses and tuition for Aysha and her four siblings. Now she can access these services for free.

"I can use the money I save on transportation instead," she said. "It is now a lesser burden on my parents, who are able to pay for my siblings' education expenses."



In Mount Lebanon, twelve schools were in need of repair. Many students could not access toilets, and classrooms were not well-equipped for the students, missing desks, chairs, and other classroom essentials.

In 2013, twelve schools received significant repairs; damaged windows, doors, and electrical sockets were repaired, and leaks in the roof were fixed. UNHCR, in partnership with WCH, installed new toilets and washing facilities, and repaired water tanks. Schools also received new tables, chairs, and heating systems. Now Lebanese and Syrian students have access to functioning bathrooms and well-equipped classrooms.







As the population increased, random dumping sites appeared, and garbage was burned in the streets, posing a health risk to residents.

In 2013, Qab Elias received a garbage compactor for garbage collection. The garbage truck collects over 12 tons of garbage a day, and now a Lebanese citizen has a job as the truck's driver, providing additional income for him and his family. Sanitation conditions in the area have improved significantly.


