



Out of 57,444, school age children (6 – 17) 36,465 are enrolled in formal education (primary and secondary)

JANUARY HIGHLIGHTS:

Erbil Governorate: 868 students in Kawergosk received winter rain coats, in addition, 1,112 students in non-camp schools receiving raincoats. PTA meetings were conducted in all camps to discuss school improvement. To ensure availability of teachers to conduct classes for the refugee children in non-camps, three months incentives were issued to teachers through DoE.

A total of 1,602 children from 600 households received cash assistance to encourage vulnerable families to send children to school.

In Erbil, Duhok, and Sulaymaniyah, an 8-day case management training was conducted for 33 social workers, school counsellors, and MOLSA staff, including 14 men and 19 women, and 5 Syrian refugees.

Sulaymaniyah Governorate: As agreed between the education authorities partners, 82 volunteer teachers were provided incentives for the period covering from 10/12/2015 to 10/01/2016.

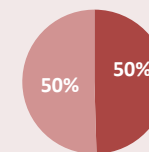
This allowed for certificates to be handed out among refugee students after their midterm examination.

Duhok Governorate: About 120 children from Domiz 2 camp and Domiz community provided transportation to attend schools in Domiz 1 camp. Additionally, 17 kids from Akre camp with 17 trips to attend school in Akre town.



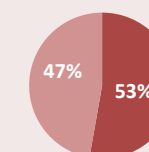
Opening secondary school in Qushtapa camp January 2016

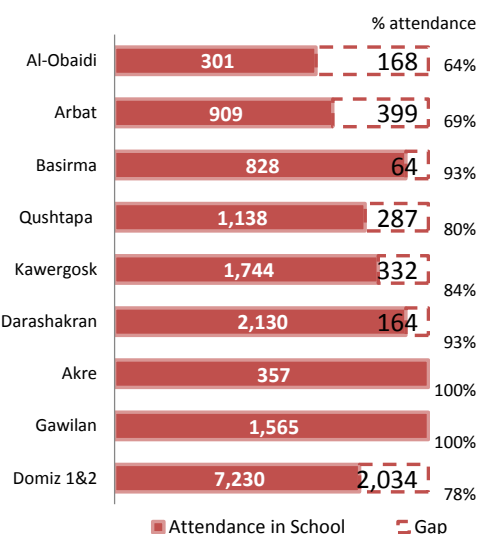
NEEDS ANALYSIS:

The need for transportation for teachers and students to reach school is still a dire need in many locations.

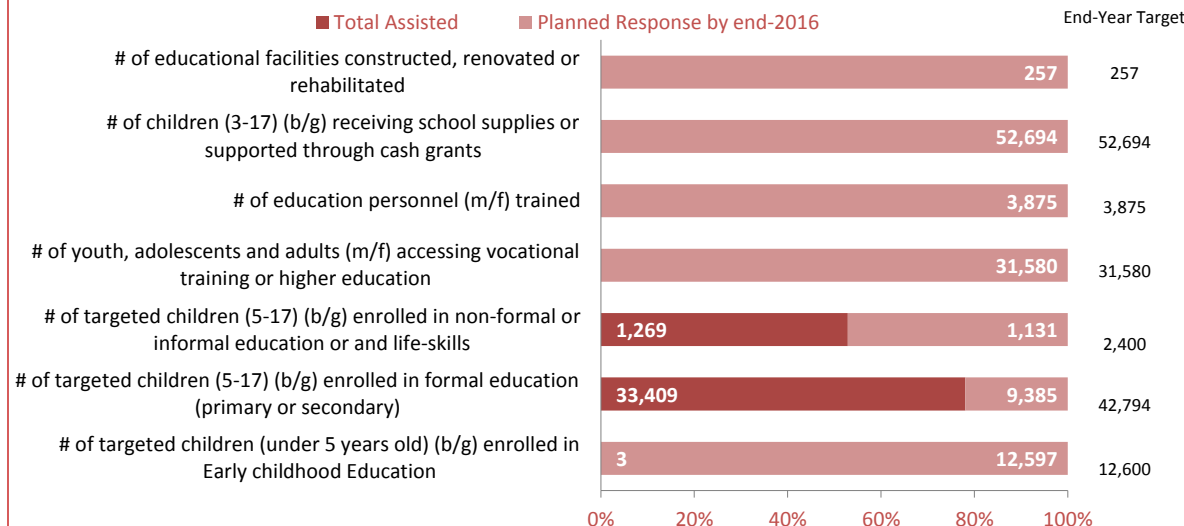

Funds are required for rehabilitation of schools and there is a need for school furnishing for many schools refugee camp schools.
