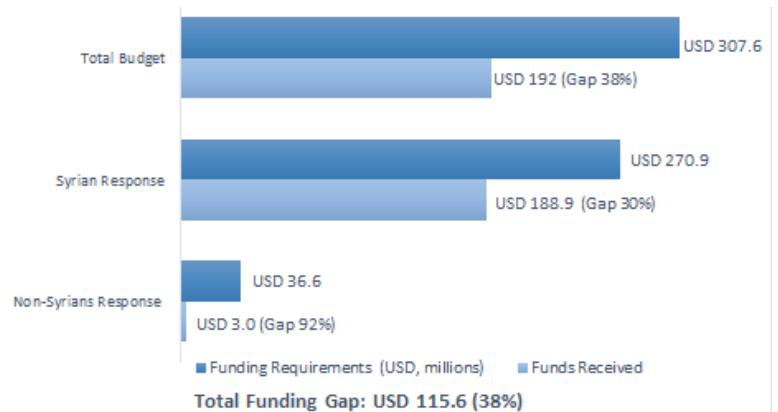

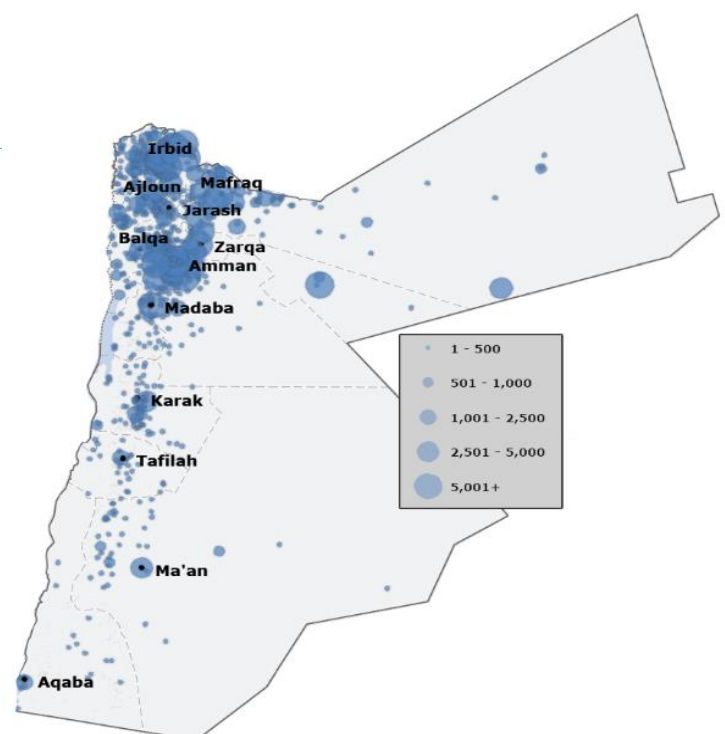

## MAIN ACTIVITIES - SYRIAN REFUGEES

### Registration

- In December 2014, **4,241** Syrian refugees arrived and registered with UNHCR, bringing the total of Syrians registered in 2014 to **120,569** individuals. There is currently no backlog for registration in UNHCR's registration centres and registration takes place on the same day as first approach.

### Protection

- In addition to capacity building and support to national protection institutions, UNHCR provides legal counselling to over **30,000** refugees; support to the Office of the Civil Registrar and the Sharia Court to issue civil documentation; case management services to over **2,800** children at risk and **1,400** survivors of Sexual and Gender Based Violence; and durable solutions.
- UNHCR is actively supporting UNICEF and other partners in the coordination of education activities for refugees in Jordan.

### Cash Assistance

- Regular cash assistance is provided monthly to 21,000 of the eligible urban registered refugees. The delivery mechanism is based on an innovative biometric system using the iris recognition of beneficiaries at iris equipped ATM machines. For budgetary reasons, not all the eligible families can be assisted. The waiting list comprises of **5,611** Syrian families.
- 26,893** Syrian refugee families are assisted for winterization with the net amount of **USD 9,655,113**. Winterization assistance was provided by UNHCR in November and December 2014 (to cover the months of November 2014 –February 2015).

### Shelter

- As the Sector lead, UNHCR is providing shelter support to refugees living in camp and non-camp settings. A total of **27,546** shelters were provided and/or built in camps in 2014, including **6,260** caravans and **13,257** tents in Zaatar camp, and **8,029** T-shelters in Azraq, where an additional **1,994** T-shelters are under construction. In coordination with sector partners, UNHCR also intervenes in non-camp areas, including upgrading of sub-standard housing units among other activities.

### Coordination and Camp Management

- UNHCR leads the refugee response in support of the Government of Jordan. 64 NGOs and UN agencies participated in the 2014 Regional Refugee Response (RRP6) in Jordan.
- UNHCR also supports SRAD in the management and coordination of Zaatar and Azraq refugee camps. More specifically, UNHCR's role is to ensure that aid is provided in accordance with international humanitarian standards and protection principles, and to maximize the efficiency of funding provided for the refugee response by identifying gaps and targeting assistance.

### Health and Nutrition

- UNHCR health activities in urban and camp settings include: provision of primary health care, reaching **178,325** individuals; provision of new arrival with medical screening, triage and vaccination; prospective surveillance in urban settings; antenatal care for **26,433** female in reproductive age; screening of more than **25,000** children for malnutrition; clinical mental healthcare services for **54,456** individuals; provision of secondary and tertiary lifesaving health services through referrals program to **14,902** individuals; increased availability of Gender based Violence (GBV)-related medical services.
- UNHCR equipped and rehabilitated **51** primary and secondary governmental facilities and trained over **2,000** Community Health Workers.

## Community Empowerment and Self-Reliance

- In partnership with IRD, UNHCR supported **663** educational, cultural and social activities conducted by the **15** Syrian Community Support Committees (CSCs) all over Jordan in 2014 for **49,623** beneficiaries (**34,623** Syrian refugees and **15,000** Jordanians).

## Water and Sanitation

- While UNICEF is the WASH Sector lead, UNHCR has undertaken various projects focusing on infrastructure support projects in host communities. Conducted through Mercy Corps and IRD, these projects concern primarily water infrastructure priorities identified with the Ministry of Water and Irrigation, such as rehabilitation of wells and pipelines.

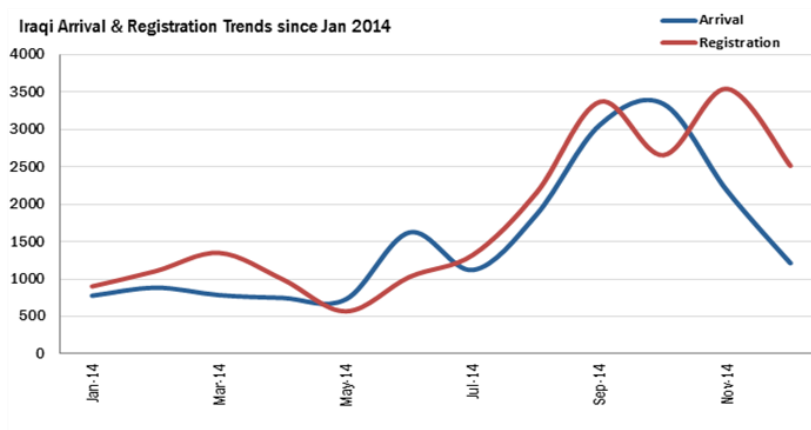

- In December, UNHCR registered **2,683** non-Syrian refugees. In 2014, UNHCR noted an increase in the number of Iraqis approaching UNHCR, notably as a result of the upsurge in violence in Ninewa, Salah-Al-Din and Anbar.
- 2,200 households were provided with regular cash assistance in 2014.
- UNHCR supports 6 Iraqi Community Support Committees (CSCs), which conducted in 2014 165 activities benefiting 4,237 Iraqis and 1,425 Jordanians. Two UNHCR supported CSCs for Somali and Sudanese refugees organized 83 activities in 2014 for 3,241 refugees and **676** Jordanians. The CSCs gather refugees and Jordanians from the host community.
