## WEST—Nigerian Refugees

As of 14 December, there are **2,336 Nigerian refugees** (730 families) in Chad. The large majority of this population lives among hosting communities in Ngouboua and Tchoukoutalia, in the Lake Chad Region of the West. Among this population, 62% are children (23% children under 5, 29% ages 5 to 11 and 10% youth between 12 and 17 years old) and 23% of all adults are women while 15% are men.

In August 2014, UNHCR established a Field Office in Bagassola (some 50 km from Ngouboua) to ensure provision of protection assistance, coordination of activities with local authorities and partners and to monitor interventions through a permanent presence in the area.

## Coordination and Partnership

UNHCR works in close collaboration with the government of Chad (CNARR) and DPHR, local authorities (health and education in particular) and partners on the ground to assist refugees and hosting communities with community-based assistance, prioritizing access to basic needs such as the provision of shelter/infrastructure (CRT), access to water, sanitation and hygiene (APSELPA) as well as and health (IMC).

## Nigerian Delegation

Between 3 to 9 December, a 12-member delegation representing the Government of Nigeria visited Chad with the aim to travel to the Lake Chad Region, meet with Nigerian refugees in the area, verify information received, assess refugee needs and discuss options for voluntary return to other, more secure, areas of Nigeria. The Delegation was unable to visit the Lake area, however upon request, UNHCR together with CNARR, provided briefings for the mission on 4 and 8 December. The Delegation requested information on statistics and identified needs of refugees for possible support from the Government of Nigeria. In view of the continued conflict in northeastern Nigeria, UNHCR anticipates the arrival of up to 10,000 additional refugees in 2015.

## South - Refugees and Chadian Returnees from the Central African Republic (CAR)

**Doholo:** The Government of Chad has identified the site of Doholo, some 10 km from Gore, to accommodate 4,000 newly-arrived refugees currently living in Dosseye camp. In 2014, UNHCR facilitated the transfer of close to 7,000 newly-arrived refugees who fled violence and human rights abuses in CAR, from border entry points in southern Chad to the camp of Dosseye where they could benefit from ongoing assistance such as protection, access to shelter, water/sanitation, health, education, etc. With an increase in the population of Dosseye in 2014, it became necessary to reduce overcrowding, overuse of facilities and to prevent potential tensions arising between refugee communities in the camp.

On 3 December the first convoy transferred 263 CAR refugees from Dosseye to Doholo. As of 16 December, a total of 1,139 CAR refugees (396) families have been relocated. The transfer of the remaining population (2,861 persons) will take place in the coming days.

**Assistance in Doholo :** UNHCR is working closely with CNARR, DPHR, and partners to provide assistance in shelter (FLM and IIYL), water (CARE), health (CSSI), education (ACRA), protection / community services (APLFT) in Doholo.

**Chadian Returnees :** UNHCR continues to support the Government of Chad in assisting Chadian returnees from CAR. Leading the Shelter/Camp Management and Camp Coordination (CCCM) Cluster, with IOM as co-lead, UNHCR works in close collaboration with local authorities, cluster members and partners to ensure coordination of activities, identification of gaps, timely response to needs and effective use of resources. UNHCR and IOM work together to ensure collected data is accurate, timely and harmonized prior to dissemination to all stakeholders. In 2014, the Cluster coordinated the distribution of 4,272 shelters to the Chadian returnee population living in the temporary sites of Gaoui (210 shelters), Maingama (1,951), Danamadja (1,632) and Kobiteye (479). The reactivation of the Shelter/CCCM Cluster has been extended to 30 June 2015.


## UNHCR Chad - Budget 2014\* (USD)
