1. Introductions	 Introductions were made. A few quick updates were given by the national Cluster coordinator (CC). Since last meeting Cluster Lead had been invited to meeting with Myanmar Peace Centre (MPC), along with other humanitarian actors. This included LNGOs and the Protection Sector. CC had given a brief to HARP Facility following meeting them at the above-mentioned MPC meeting. HARP were present here today and aim was to have them brief at a future national Cluster meeting. CC had also attended UNDAF meetings as part of feeding into relief/development nexus. Also met ODI who were looking into the issue of pooled funding. There would be another JIPS mission in March, mainly to spend time in Rakhine State to support data analysis of the camp profiling, which by the end of February should to a large extent be complete: http://www.sheltercluster.org/rakhine/library/camp-profiling-2016-2017-jips 	HARP to attend next national meeting and brief

Clear Minutes & Actions from Previous Meeting	 Minutes of 30th November were discussed; cleared/uploaded to Cluster website: http://www.sheltercluster.org/library/national-cluster-meeting-minutes-2016. Remaining action points: OUTSTANDING Rakhine: still a shelter gap of over +US\$1 million, - close to 20,000 IDPs in need of adequate shelter – outstanding; CC to share Cluster Coordination Performance Monitoring Tool (CPMT) findings on Cluster website and to organize national workshop to discuss results and agree on actions to be taken to improve weak areas – outstanding;

Shelter Gap

For more details on the current gap see updated Shelter Cluster Factsheet. Three page document; one page national, one for Kachin/Shan and one for Rakhine State. DRC stressed that shelter in "STMG remains a huge concern. There is some rehabilitation but the bulk of the camp remains in bad condition and is unlikely to survive the rainy season. Our approximate estimation for full-scale rehabilitation is US\$400,000 and will be conducting a full shelter assessment in the coming weeks in order to provide a more accurate breakdown.

CCM Reform

Under the guidance of the State Secretary, CCCM Cluster partners established a TWiG to draft revised terms of reference (ToR) and a new code of conduct (CoC) for members of the RSG's camp management structure. After three TWiG sessions the draft was completed shared with ICCG coordinators and Heads of Office for the last round of comments before being presented to the State Secretary. Whilst the ToR and CoC address many of the problems faced by service providers on a daily basis, one key obstacle remains if the ToR & CoC are to be effectively implemented by the RSG. Kudos, power and influence are certainly motivating factors for CMC membership. However, the primary factor is MONEY as illustrated by the vast sums of money being extorted from IDPs. The incentive workers and community groups established by NGOs receive monthly salaries, but CMCs are expected to be volunteers. If the ToR and CoC are implemented by the RSG, members of the RSG appointed camp management structure may have to be paid? The question is, who is going to pay them? To put this into concrete terms, if members were paid 100,000 MMK/month \$500,000/year. Cluster Lead keen to hear partners view on this issue.

Northern Rakhine State (nRS)

CC noted that response since 9th October events remains (as directed by RC/HC) under leadership of UNHCR rather than Cluster. Still in response to some questions from partners and as part of efforts to share information on key messaging:





	Humanitarian access Call upon the relevant authorities to grant access for international staff and ease travel authorizations procedures for national staff for the provision of humanitarian assistance and services.
	Access to relief assistance and services Reiterate call for travel between villages to be eased so that villagers can access services especially health services. Also encourage the Government to re-start issuing border passes to allow people to cross into Bangladesh and
	access health care. Protection of civilians Urge the authorities to respect the principles of distinction &
	proportionality during area security clearance operations and to ensure safety of all civilians.
	☐ Demolitions Express concern over the demolitions of structures and houses. Urge the authorities to stay any further demolitions and find solutions for those who are now
	displaced due to the demolition of their houses (i.e. by issuing legal building permits). Shelter Express concern about the situation of those who have been displaced and whose
	houses have been burnt. Encourage the Government to take the lead in the reconstruction of these houses (express the readiness of the international community to support such
	efforts but stressing that any international assistance should be in support to a government led initiative).
3. Kachin & Northern Shan States	The main body of the presentation and fielding Q&A would be taken by the sub-national
	Coordinator Jade Chakowa (CHAKOWA@unhcr.org). Jade was sadly coming to the end of one year
	deployment and the CC was keen to express all his thanks for her impressive performance over the year. Thanks also expressed to NORCAP who funded the deployment.
	As part of her presentation partners were also encouraged to take note of the Power Point Presentation that would be shared with these minutes. The presentation focused on six key areas:

NRC	NRC also requested that the following information be shared at the national meeting:
	1. Conducted an assessment in Laiza between 17 th -19 th January 2017, visited Woi Chyai, Hpun Lum Yang and Jeyang Camps;
	2. A TA for Lashio has been granted and a visit scheduled for 2 nd week of February 2017;





	 UNHCR & NRC jointly conducted a training targeting CCCM focal points and Line Leaders on CCCM/Protection/Durable solutions 9th to 12th January 2017, a mixed group for NGCA/GCA. 400 winter kits planned to be distributed in Bum-Tsit-Pa IDP Camp, blanket distribution. Process of acquiring TA on going. 40 winter kits to be distributed to newly displaced families in Maing Khaung Camps (KMSS/KBC Mansi). In the month of January 2017, NRC trained 93 IDPs from Bhamo District on CCCM Introductory Course, covering 9 modules. Lastly, there will be an InterAction mission on Protection related issues to Kachin at the end of February.		
7. AOB • Strategic Advisory Group 2017?	CC keen to hear the views of partners on whether they could see validity in reforming a national Strategic Advisory Group (SAG) in 2017? This was something tried for a period in 2013 but never gained much traction since quantity of national actors remains relatively quite small as compared to other large-scale emergencies where Clusters have or remain activated. • Staffing	Strong appreciation to Wilfredo Jr. Tiangco (tiangco@unhcr.org) otherwise known as Boyet, who was coming to the end of his 4+ years in Rakhine. He had done a <i>huge</i> amount of work on the shelter response and the CC wanted to express all his thanks for all he had done and best wishes for next steps and beyond.
