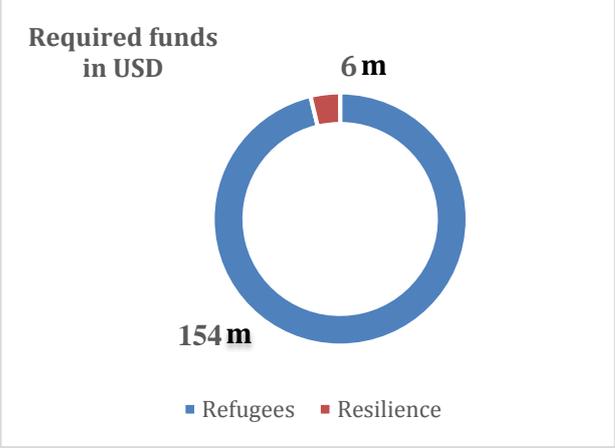

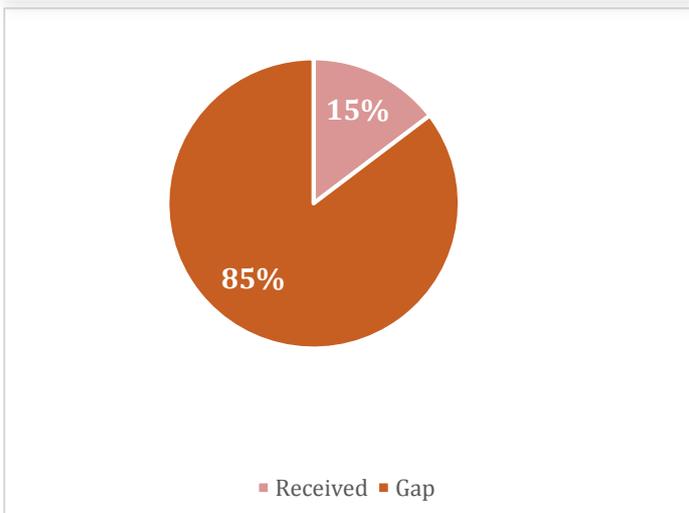

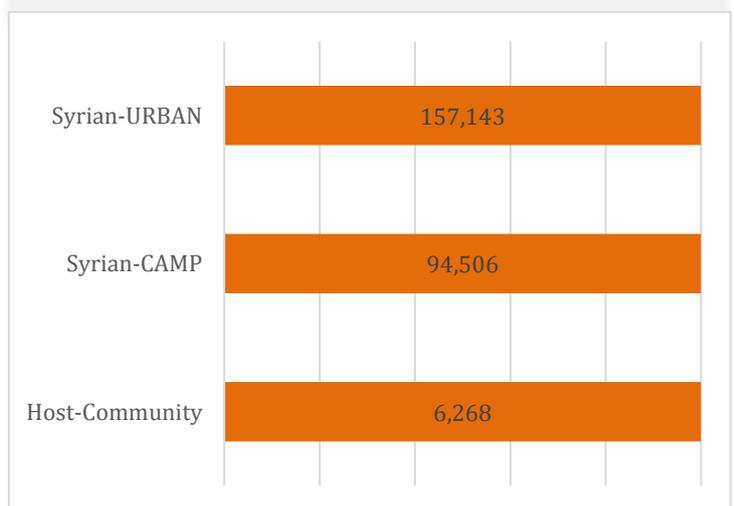
4. Population reached through basic needs interventions

Services provided: Replenishment / replacement and new arrival kits; multi-purpose cash assistance and Non Food Items (NFIs)

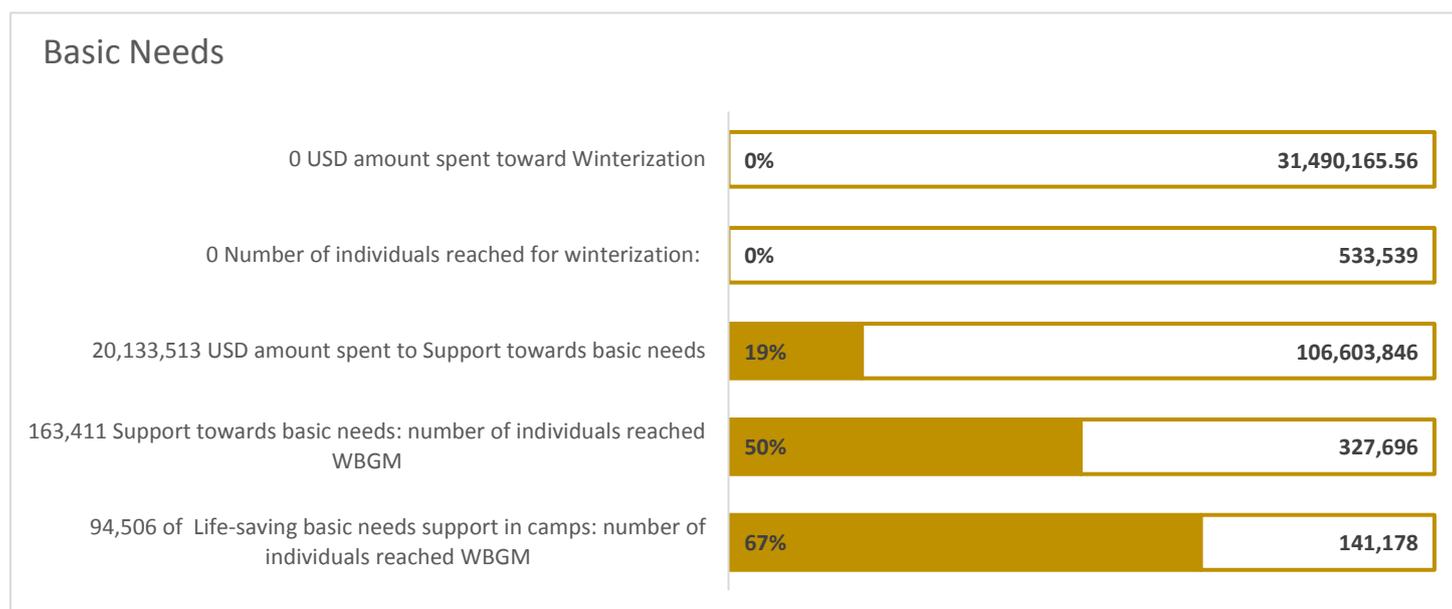
% of funds received vs total requested (by Sector)

6. Key Achievements

In the first quarter of 2017, more than \$20,133,513 USD were provided through cash based interventions to around 150,786 vulnerable individuals in the refugee and host communities.

During the reporting period, funding for two projects was given for basic needs¹ (see Progress Report above) under refugee component. A third project funded for basic needs is linked to seasonal assistance (winterization support) and is expected to start in October 2017.

The Basis Needs Working Group supported process of formulating sector priorities for the OCHA-JHF call for proposals. The sector focused needed attention for the delivery of core relief items in Azraq camp.

The Basic Needs Sector has started mapping cash based interventions in different sectors (Protection, Health, Shelter and Livelihoods). Discussion on modalities of urgent cash assistance between the Basic Needs Sector and the Protection Sector is taking place regarding urgent cash assistance

7. Challenges faced during the reporting period

Four organizations who appealed under the Basic Needs sector were not successful in securing funds to implement activities. Further challenges are foreseen as only 15% of the funding request for basic needs sector was received in the first quarter.

8. Key priorities and gaps foreseen in the 2nd quarter (April - June)

Basic Needs will advocate to secure the required budget needed to continue implementation of cash based intervention activities in the urban context. Consideration should be taken as 89 percent of Syrian refugees are living below the Jordanian poverty line (68 JD per capita).

ⁱ Basic Needs projects are:

- 1) To provide life-saving basic needs assistance to Syrian refugee households and vulnerable families affected by the crisis inside the camps and in non-camp settings. This project include replenishment kits that is provided multiple times. The overall target for this project is the camp population that is 141,178 individual (as of May 2017).
- 2) Support towards basic needs, this project include the provision of multi-purpose cash assistance and Non Food Items in Urban context.
- 3) Winterization Support (Urban and Camps), this project includes the provision of seasonal cash assistance and Non Food Items.
