




4. Population reached through Shelter interventions

Services provided: adequate shelter and access to basic facilities and services. In camp; through distribution of emergency tents. In non-camp settings; upgrading of sub-standard housing units, increasing quantity of adequate housing; providing conditional financial assistance to meet rental costs and to ensure security of tenure, adapting sub-standard dwelling units to overcome harsh weather conditions and enhancing awareness on tenure rights and obligations amongst refugee tenants and target all refugees who reside in non-camp settings.


% of funds received vs total requested (by Sector)

6. Key Achievements

- Information Management Task Force continued supporting the agencies in terms of monitoring correct reporting on ActivityInfo. Seven organizations were reported on ActivityInfo including; Caritas Jordan, Habitat for Humanity Jordan, ICMC, IOCC, INTERSOS, NRC and WRG.
- The SWG laid out the workplan for 2017 including revision of technical guidelines, review of the sector strategy and further work on the cross-sectorial linkages.
- Gap analysis on the housing conditions of Syrian refugees residing host communities was updated and shared with group members, the analysis will be updated quarterly to provide a general overview of the situation in the various governorates and highlight the areas with the most significant gaps.
- The Shelter Sector Tree used for the evaluation of shelter vulnerabilities through VAF was updated and finalized, the new tree puts additional weight on tenancy security, accessibility and housing conditions.
- The SWG also contributed to winterization response in both camps and out-of-camps settings, co-chairing the winterization task force.

7. Challenges faced during the reporting period

- The shelter sector continues to be underfunded, greatly limiting the ability of the sector partners to deliver urgent needed assistance across Jordan.

- The chronic underfunding of the sector, also meant that the number of actors working on shelter projects remains limited, particularly on JRP shelter sector priorities. The gap in addressing needs in host communities has been identified to be the most urgent in the governorates of Mafrqa, Amman, Irbid and the South of Jordan. The latest gap analysis can be found on the SWG portal.

8. Key priorities and gaps foreseen in the 2nd quarter (April - June)

- The SWG and the Protection working group will continue the work initiated in the first quarter on the mapping and setup of clear referral pathways for cases under the threat of eviction.
- The SWG will work on updating the technical guidelines in the coming period realigning with the changes on the ground and based on most recent updates of the MEB for 2017.
- The SWG will also be looking into complementarities with the livelihoods sector, building on the most recent efforts for formalizing work for Syrian refugees in the construction sector.
