Iraqis Refugees	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Total registered: 63,417 (400 newly registered in Jun) significant increase</li> <li>- 3,695 registered in 2017 while 2,681 arrived in 2017</li> </ul>
Yemeni Refugees	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Total registered: 8,155. Total registered in 2017 2,453 with significant increase</li> <li>- 3,768 Sudanese registered with 375 arrived in 2017</li> <li>- 803 Somali with 24 registered in 2017</li> <li>- 1,540 /no major increase</li> </ul>

Syrian Refugees	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Total Registered: 660,836 Syrians (1.7K increase)</li> <li>- 14,919 newly registered in 2017 of which 8,350 arrived in 2017 and the rest are new born registration.</li> <li>- 80,079 in Zaatari with no significant increase.</li> <li>- Azraq camp 53,570 with 300 individuals decrease in the last month due to bail out process and voluntary repatriation</li> <li>- 7,430 in EJC</li> </ul>
Urban Verification	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- As of 30 June 2017, a total of 421,369 cards were issued in different security centres. Of the total, there are 390,999 (75%) individuals registered with UNHCR.</li> <li>- Document return exercise from RAS: most of refugees requested the documents for the purpose of legalization their situation in Jordan which is 45% of the documents were returned for this purpose, around 15% of the documents were returned for the purpose of voluntary repatriation.</li> <li>- 84% documents returned to Syrian including Azraq camp, and in stage 58.</li> <li>- 189,593 documents were returned to refugees out of 220,000 documents confiscated</li> </ul>
War Wounded	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Reports indicate that Government of Syria forces and allied groups are gaining position along the length of the Jordanian border in southern Syria. Alongside the build-up of forces, intensive airstrikes, barrel bombing and shelling has been reported over a number of days. As a result of that increase noted in number of war wounded who accessed territories seeking treatment.</li> </ul>

<p><b>Coordination Skills Training</b></p> <p><b>Berm Update</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Two participants were selected from health sector (RHSWG and CHTF) and participated in the Coordination skills training which was conducted by Inter-Sector coordination unit as part of capacity building plan for all sectors.</li> <li>- A total number of 4500 patients received primary health care services at the UN clinics and 274 emergency lifesaving referrals since Dec 2016</li> <li>- The following is a breakdown of medical cases by age and gender from May 21<sup>st</sup> Jun to Jun 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2017: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Total number of patients under 5 years old 1256 (41%)</li> <li>▪ Total number of patients above 5 years old 1823 (59%)</li> <li>▪ Female: 1722 (56%)</li> <li>▪ Male 1357 (44%)</li> </ul> </li> <li>- Top 5 chronic diseases: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Hypertension: 33%</li> <li>▪ Asthma: 19%</li> <li>▪ Diabetes: 5%</li> <li>▪ Ischemic heart disease: 1%</li> <li>▪ Cardiovascular disease: 1%</li> </ul> </li> <li>- Top 5 acute disease: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Upper respiratory tract infections: 48%</li> <li>▪ Urinary tract infection: 10%</li> <li>▪ Watery diarrhea: 6%</li> <li>▪ Injury: 3%</li> <li>▪ Skin diseases: 2%</li> </ul> </li> <li>- Access of the population to the clinic is one of the biggest challenges faced by UN teams.</li> <li>- Distribution is on hold till the moment due to security situation.</li> <li>- A meeting took place between JAF, MoH, UNCHR, UNICEF and RMS for the second round of emergency vaccination campaign at the berm, the dates were confirmed between 9<sup>th</sup>-16<sup>th</sup> Jul</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- The purpose of adding this agenda point is to make all partners ready to receive the instructions from MoPIC and MoH</li> <li>- The process of JRP/3RP is a time consuming process but all the steps will be clear for the partners in order to avoid any unnecessary hiccups</li> <li>- Health Sector was the strongest sector during the last JRP/3RP as it wasn't affected by the last year crisis and we submitted chapter straight forward.</li> <li>- Next Sunday, ISWG meeting will be held and a practical session on the inter-agency appeal process- will be presented by Health Sector as a best practice during the last JRP/3RP process</li> <li>- Once instructions received from MoPIC and MoH, a meeting will be called by Health Sector to setup the objectives, outputs and indicators.</li> </ul>

WHO	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Missions under Joint Collaboration Program providing technical support for need assessment of Neglected Tropical Diseases NTDs, 23 - 27 July 2017...</li> <li>- 5 days training workshops for unusual respiratory event based surveillance from 23-27 July 2017.</li> <li>- Center of disease control /Atlanta will conduct visit to Jordan from 16 – 20 July 2017, to discuss with MOH in collaboration with WHO two qualitative assessment projects around National Certification Committee for polio eradication and National Immunization Technical Advisory Group (NITAGs), described briefly below.</li> <li>- Gathering evidence for the most effective use of the assets of national expert advisory groups for polio in the post-eradication era.</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Assessment of NITAG integration in the policy process of vaccine introduction from initiation through implementation in selected count</li> <li>- 18 July the 2nd national workshop on ERP (Emergency Response Plan). WHO will send invitation to interested partners</li> <li>- WHO supported MOH by attending the Sub-regional meeting on scaling up acute watery diarrhea/cholera preparedness and response, BEIRUT, LEBANON, 08 – 09 JULY 2017</li> <li>- The non-communicable diseases STEPs wise survey in Jordan aims to provide the country with precise data regarding the NCDs burden and risk factors for better planning and resources utilization data about the NCDs</li> <li>- The NCDs STEPs wise survey will be conducted in Jordan with WHO support and close cooperation between Department (DoS) of statistics and MoH</li> <li>- The survey will be representative to Jordanian at national level and to Syrians residing in the four main governorates(Amman, Zarqa ,Irbid ,Mafraq)</li> <li>- WHO-CO, MoH and DoS are working on the preparations for the survey including the questionnaire.</li> </ul>
<b>MSF</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- In June MSF-H Ramtha Emergency Surgical project Hospital received 48 war wounded patients to ER, out of which 41 were admitted.</li> <li>- It is a remarkable increase in numbers compared to 16 seen in ER in May.</li> <li>- Currently we have 58 patients admitted in the Hospital, which is challenging as with a hospital capacity of 44 beds and with 21 patients out of admission criteria (as Spinal Cord, head injuries, maxilla-facial and eye injuries, others.)</li> <li>- Main challenges at the hospital level is dealing with needs of paraplegic and other disabled patients.</li> <li>- Kind request from agencies specialized in these areas for support.</li> </ul>
<b>IOCC</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- IOCC is opening their service center in Azraq camp in order to coordinate their activities, will share the invitation to the opening of its office in Azraq camp</li> </ul>

<b>SCJ</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- 30/06/2017 was the last working day for SC Jordan in the camps and Amman, SCJ trained IMC- JHAS as the part of the hand over process in the camp as agreed earlier.</li> </ul>
<b>JICA</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- JICA finished the procurement procedures for the mobile clinic for its project in the north</li> <li>- JICA is in the preparation of the operational plan along with MoH</li> <li>- In Aug, midterm evaluation mission will be doing its job to evaluate the projects in the North, also this mission will help in designing future projects for JICA</li> </ul>
<b>MSF-F</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- MSF-F is working in Mafraq since mid-Jun on mental health</li> <li>- MSF-F had concern regarding the referral criteria and a discussion was passed after the meeting</li> </ul>
<b>QRC</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- QRC managed to get fund for the kidney dialysis project for the end of Aug (110 cases outside the camps)</li> <li>- The project was funded by Kuwait Bayt Zakat.</li> </ul>
<b>UNFPA</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- UNFPA is in the process of developing the new country program cycle (9<sup>th</sup>) for the coming five years 2018-2022 with all national partners and IPs</li> <li>- A mission will be held next week from the regional office to finalize the plan.</li> <li>- UNFPA is procuring contraceptives for MoH for the next year (Jun 2017- Jun 2018)</li> <li>- Maternity unit (hospitainre) was completely installed in Rugban clinic and it will be functioning next week (for Normal vaginal delivery)</li> </ul>

<b>RH (UNFPA)</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Last meeting was held in 22nd Jun</li> <li>- UNFPA is working closely with MoH revise and update the RH guidelines and develop the training package on revised tools. This will be finalized by the end of 2017.</li> <li>- Within the RH SWG, UNFPA requested partner to provide their needs of Depo-Provera injectable Family planning method as there is a stock with other NGO's that need to be utilized before the end of 2017.</li> <li>- Also requested all partners to provide their needs from Ferro folate tablets to be used for pregnant women during ANC for prevention and management of Anemia.</li> </ul>
<b>Mental Health (IMC/WHO)</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- MHPSS to share the national action plan for MHPSS workshop: the discussion with relevant entities is going on the finalize action plan, once its finalized and endorsed by MoH, the action plan will be discussed.</li> <li>- Online 4Ws workshop is going to take place on the 19th of this month, the group will go with online mapping this year which is pilot exercise.</li> <li>- An assessment for MH services is taking place this month, to look at the perception of refugees and host community on MH, this includes camps and urban areas. The report to be issued by September.</li> </ul>
