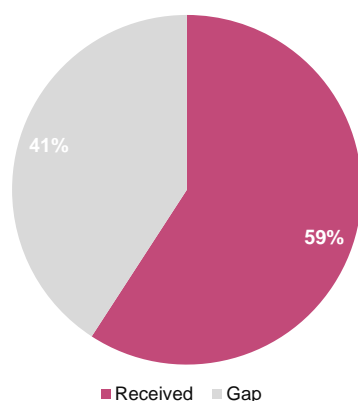

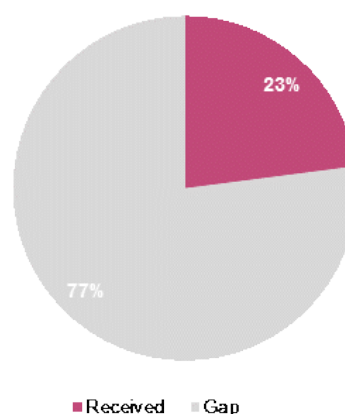

## Key achievements

- Health Sector Working Groups maintain their regular coordination forums, during the third quarter, through the main Health Sector Working Group (HSWG), Reproductive Health sub working group, Mental Health sub working group, Nutrition sub working group and Community Health taskforce. Field coordination maintained as well in (the) both camps (Azraq and Zatari) as well as in Mafraq and Irbid.
- Maintain health services on the Jordanian Berm (Rukban area) through UN Joint clinic complex (UNHCR, UNFPA & UNICEF) through provision of primary health care , ante natal care, nutrition and IYCF, basic and emergency reproductive health, expanded program of immunization (EPI) and medical evacuation/referrals.
- Jordan Humanitarian Fund (JHF) by OCHA has funded two health projects, both projects aims to improve access to essential secondary and lifesaving services including maternal and neonatal care for Syrian refugees in urban and camps.
- Jordan Response Plan (JRP) 2018/2020 and Regional Refugee Response Plan (3RP) 'Health Sector' chapter developed and endorsed by MOPIC
- Country needs of family planning commodities secured for 2018 and under procurement through UNFPA.
- Acute Flaccid Paralysis (AFP) surveillance is carried out by WHO nationwide and at the berm as part of the polio surveillance and eradication programme

## Challenges faced during the reporting period

- Improve access of Syrians on the Berm at Rukban area to access established health care services on the Jordan side and referral to lifesaving health services inside Jordan.
- High demand on secondary and tertiary care including emergency life saving services for camp and non camp vulnerable refugees.
- Increase demand on cash for health projects with 95 % of sector target achieved by end of September year.
- Approval for a vaccination campaign (Polio, Tetanus and Measles) at he Berm could not be obtained

## Gaps and key priorities foreseen in the next quarter

### ◇ Gaps:

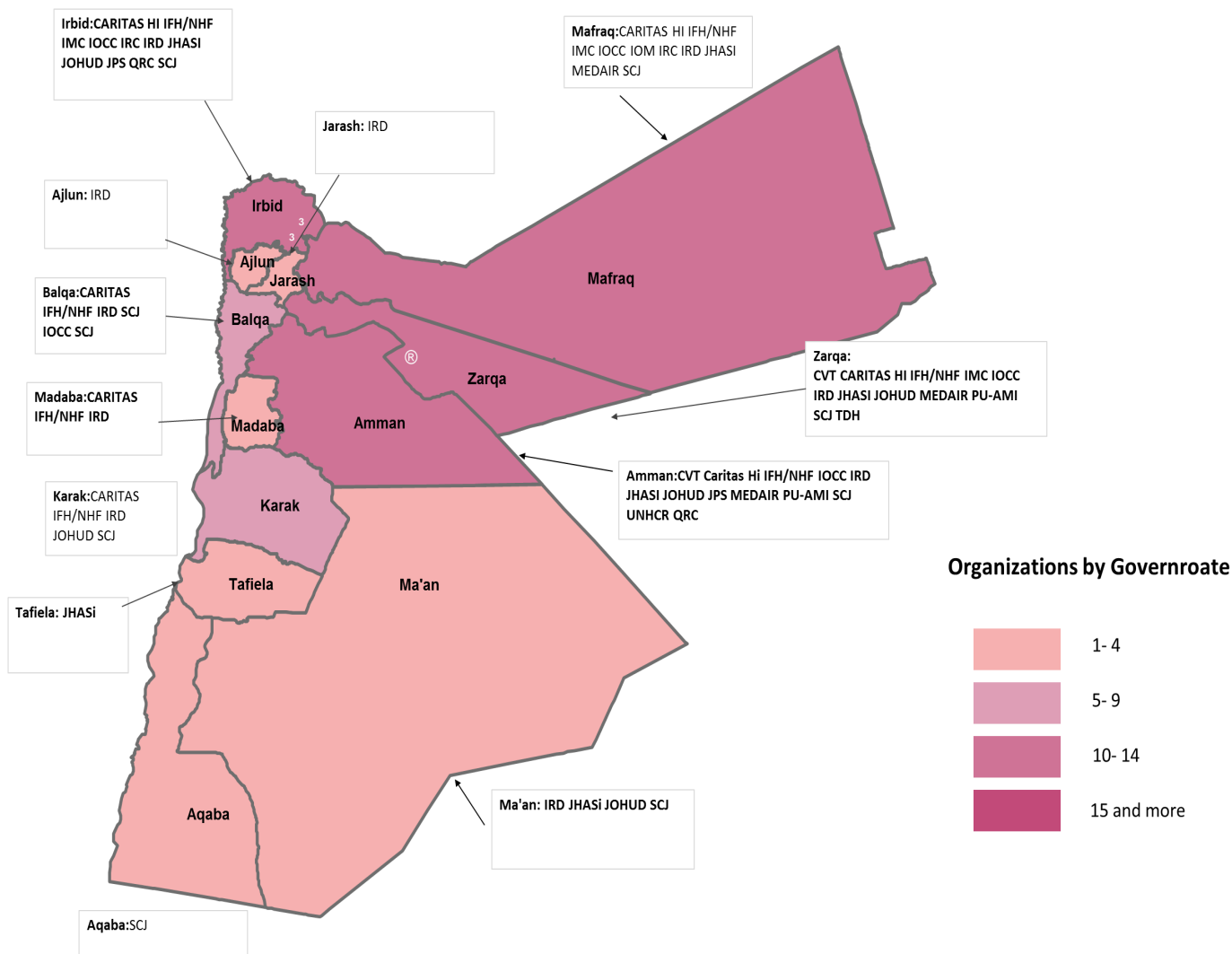
- Increase demands on essential secondary health services
- Lack of long term convalescence health services for survivors of war injuries.
- Suspension of renal dialysis care due to lake of funding for more than 120 cases living in urban setting.

### ◇ Key Priorities:

- Maintain essential level of services including medical stabilization for war-wounded acute cases.
- Continue supporting cash based interventions that improve access to essential health services.
- Integrate IYCF interventions within primary health care services in Urban, Za'atari and Azraq camp.
- Finalize and activate the national reproductive health protocols.
