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1. DEMOGRAPHIC AND SOCIAL PROFILE

NB: Figures and values in the profile only represent the population surveyed in household survey, not the total Afghanistan population, unless stated otherwise.

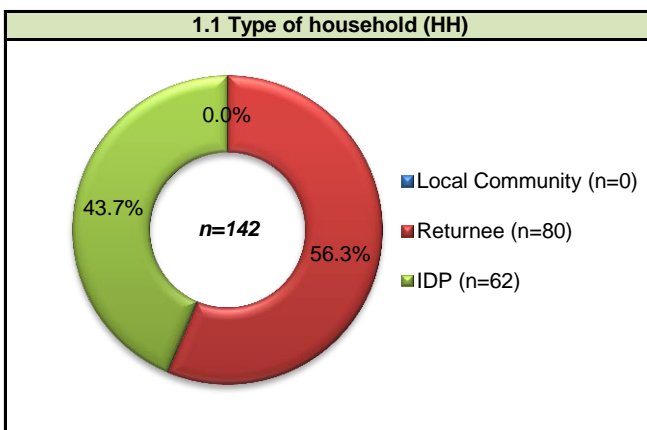
Summary

Barikab is a Land Allocation Scheme (LAS) located 35 km northeast of Kabul City, along the "New Road" to Bagram. Most village residents are IDP and refugee returnees from 2002 that lacked land in their places of origin and were subsequently squatting in abandoned public buildings or living in tent settlements in Kabul City.

Of the 142 households surveyed in Barikab, 80 (56%) were returnee households and 62 (44%) were IDP households. The households encompass a combined total of 1,087 individuals with a gender ratio of 1.2 males for every female.

The average household size was revealed by the survey to be 7.8 persons among IDPs and 7.6 persons among returnees. Children (0-17 years) account for over half the average household size for both groups with a gender ratio of 1.2 boys for every girl.

The elderly (aged 60+) were found to constitute 3%-4% of the population in both household types. Approximately 2% of the population reported to be widowed with six times as many widows as widowers.

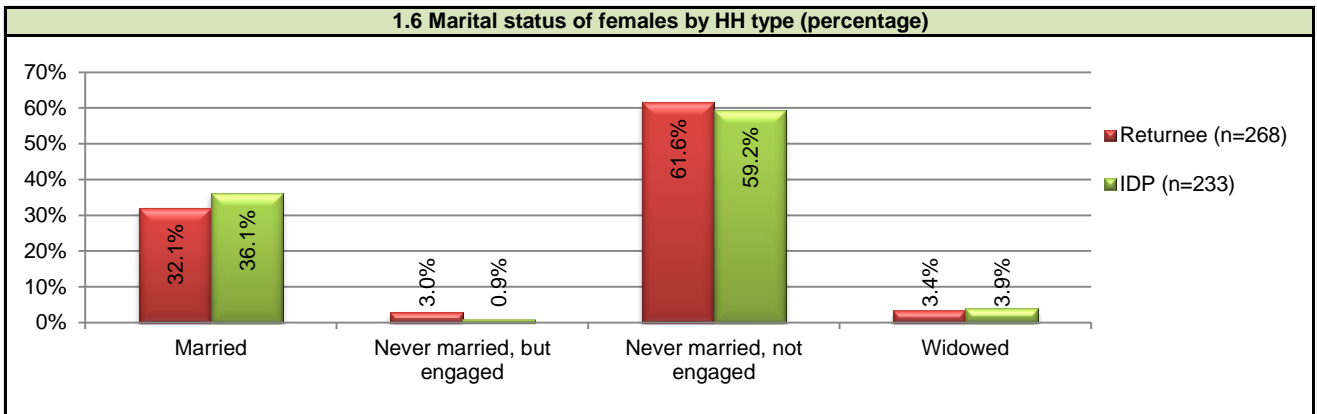
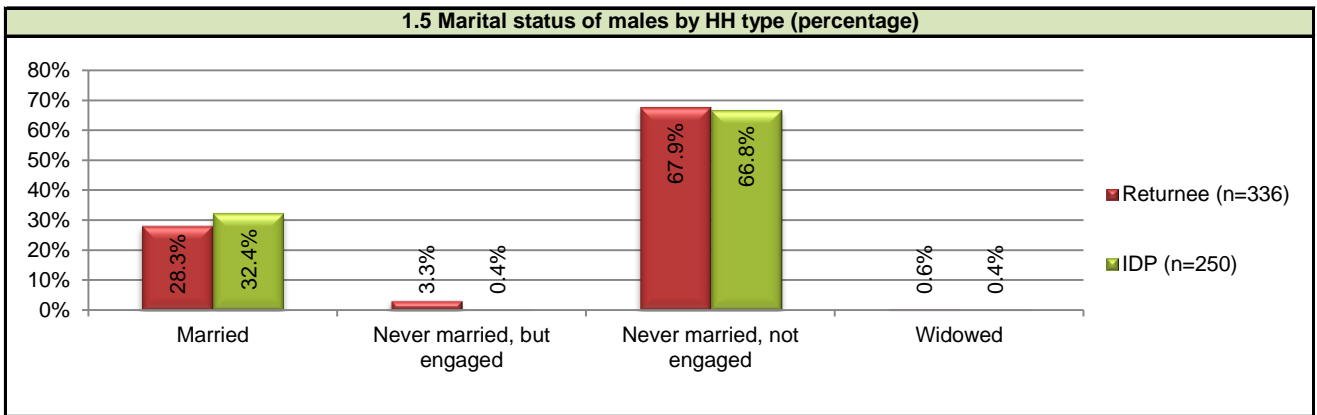

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2. MIGRATION PROFILE

Summary

Among the households surveyed, the year 1388 (2009/10) witnessed the largest number of returnee arrivals in HRA with 20 returnee households and 31 IDP-RET households choosing to settle in Barikab. Prior to 1388 (2009/10), on average, approximately seven returnee households per year have chosen to settle in the area.

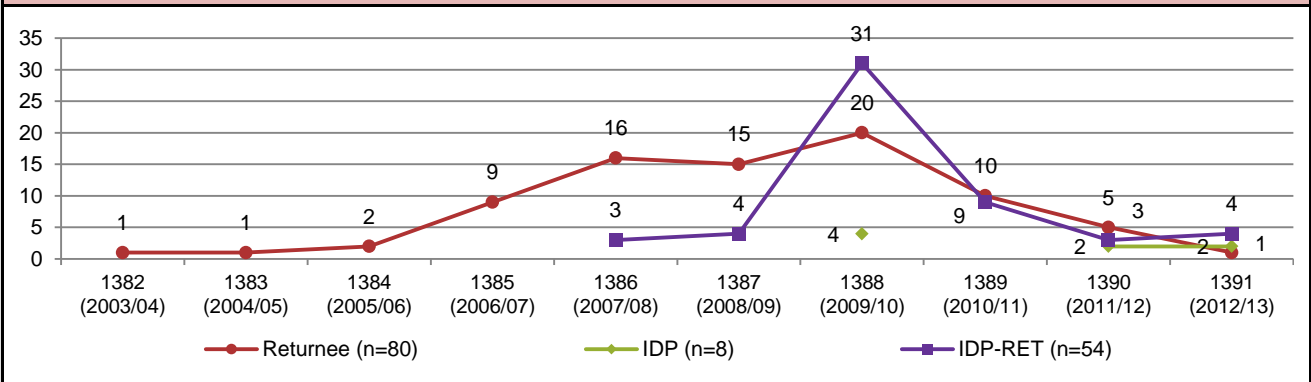
Of returnee and IDP households that have settled in Afghanistan in the last two years, all of both returnee and IDP households stated that they did so voluntarily. Of these, all of returnee and 90.9% of IDP households stated that they intend to remain in the area.

All returnee households had sought asylum in either Pakistan (48.5%) or Iran (11.2%) with 91.3% stating that they did so due to safety reasons due to conflict. Over four-fifths also cited economic reasons and nearly three fifths cited family reasons. A further, one-fifth of returnee households stated that they sought asylum due to harassment/discrimination reasons.

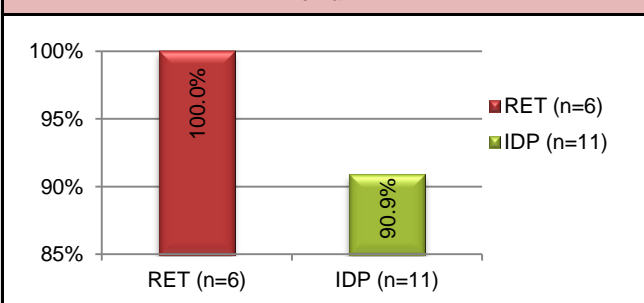
Among IDP households, three-quarters cited family reasons and three-fifths stated economic reasons as the main reasons for having fled their districts of origin. Approximately one-third also cited having own property here as having influenced their decision to move. A further, one-quarter stated that they have fled their districts of origin because of harassment/discrimination.

Two-thirds of households stated that Economic reasons were the main reason of returning back to Afghanistan. Further, over three-fifths stated legal difficulties as having influenced their decision to return. A further over one-third of households returned to Afghanistan because of safety reasons. One-quarter also stated that they have returned back to Afghanistan because of family reasons.

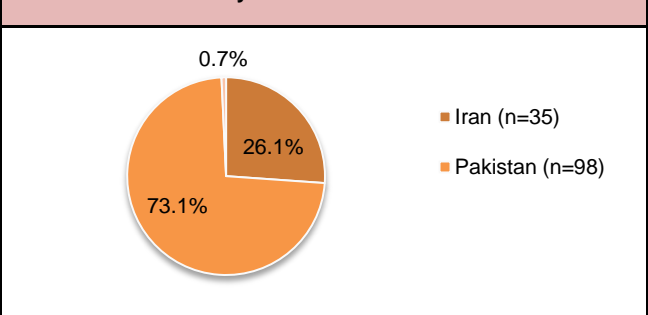
2.1 Year households settled in current location



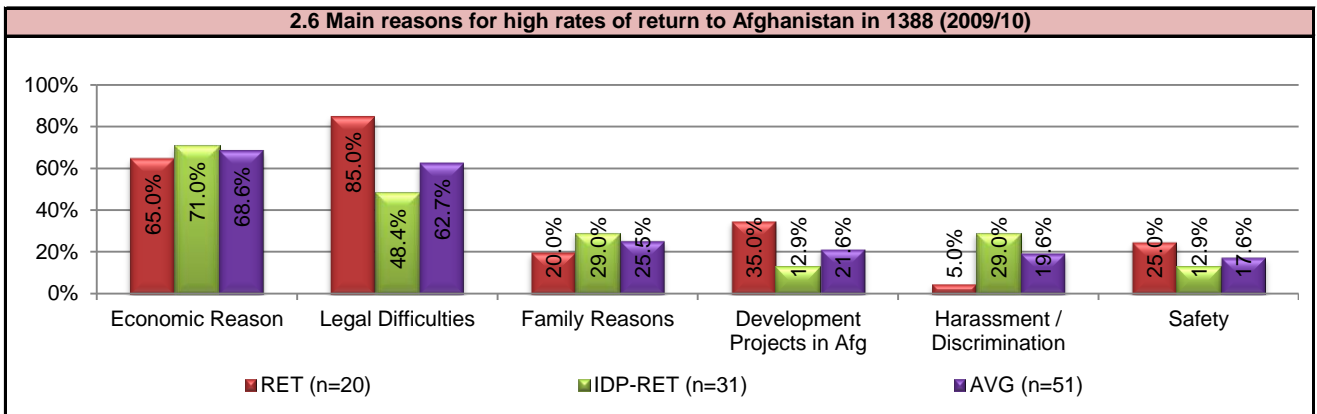
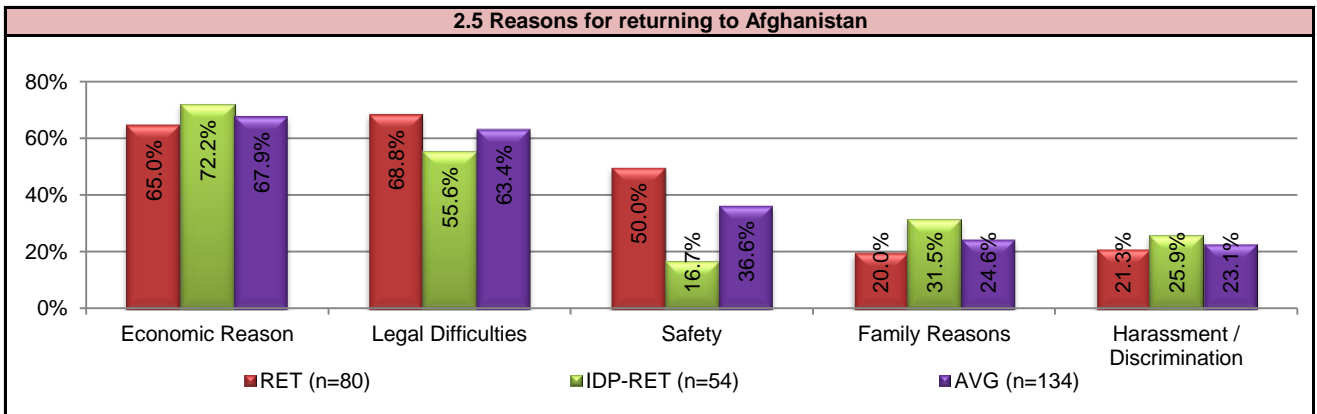
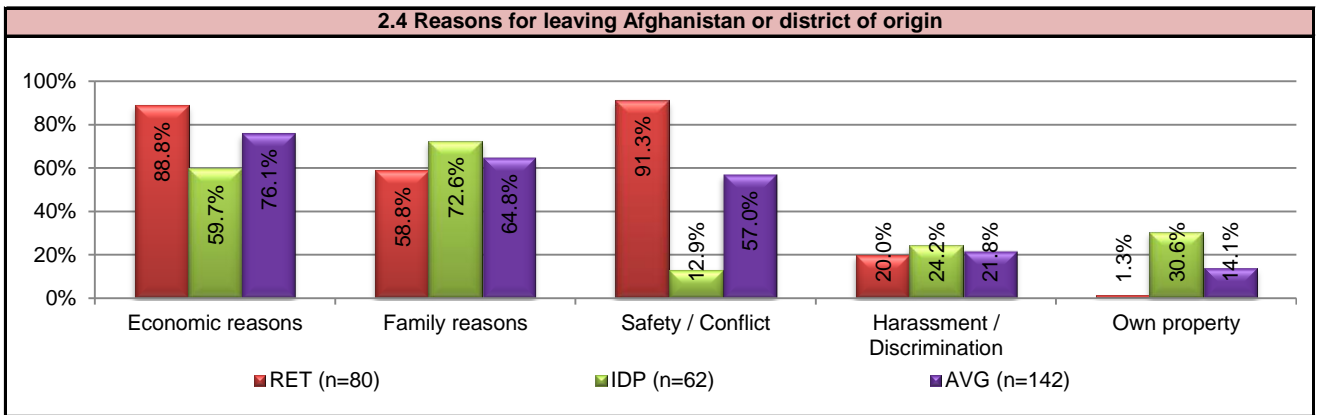
2.2 Percentage of HHs that settled in last 2 years and intend to remain



2.3 Countries of asylum from which HHs have returned



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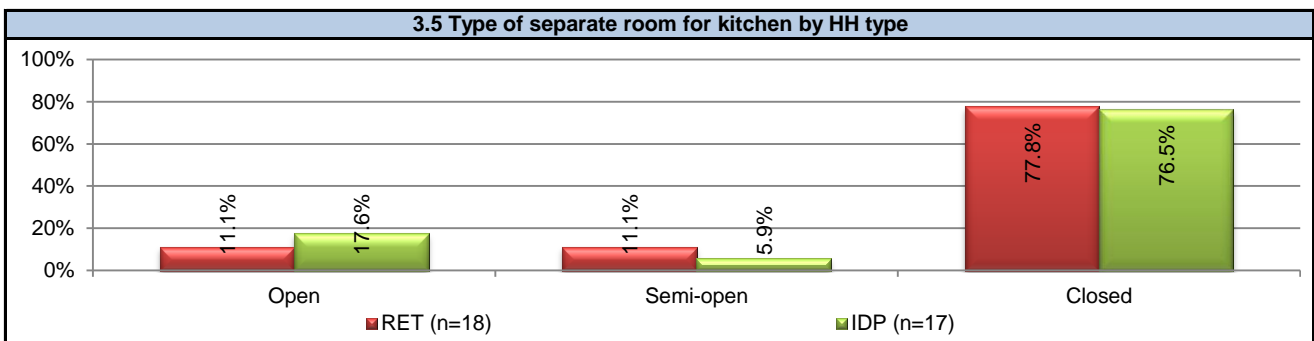
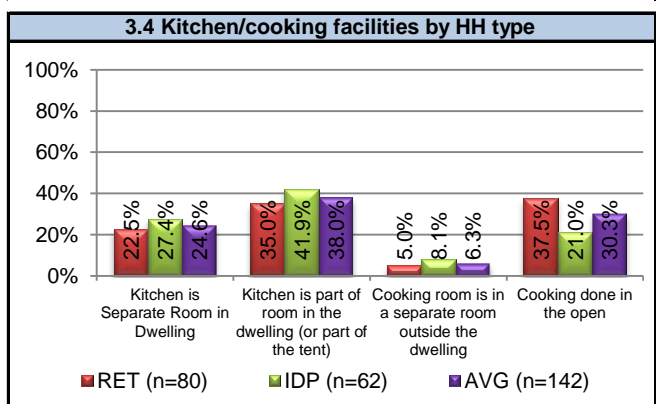
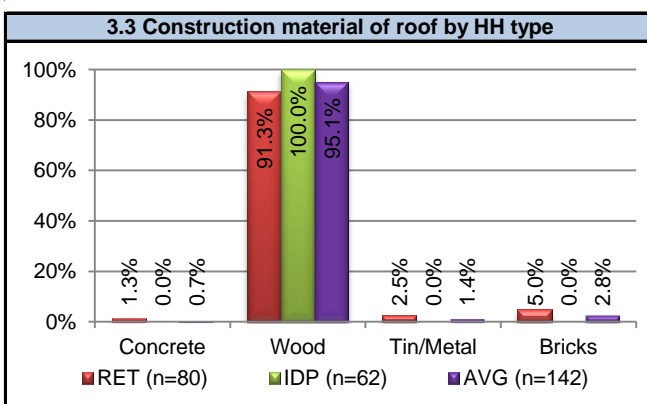
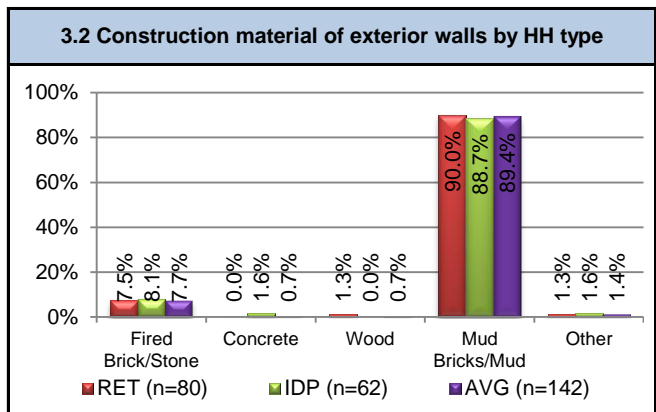
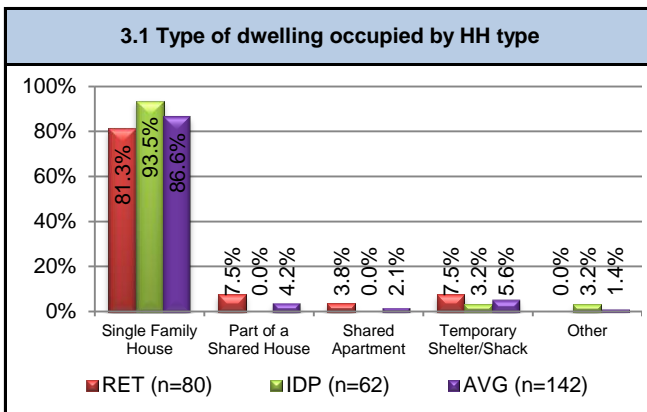
3. HOUSING STATUS PROFILE

Summary

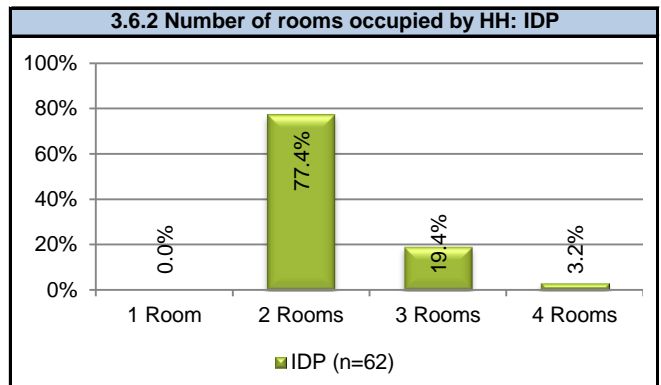
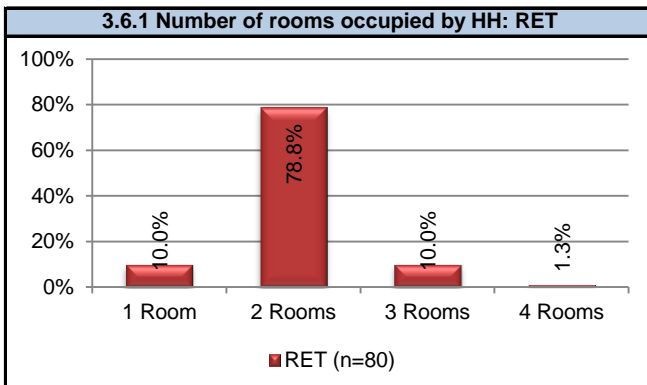
Survey findings reveal that 94% of IDP households and 81% of returnee households currently occupy single family homes. Remaining returnee households reported to be residing in either part of a shared house (8%), in a temporary shelter (8%) or in a shared apartment (4%). The majority of remaining IDP households reported to be residing in temporary shelters. Approximately 90% of dwellings in both groups were mud-brick or mud constructions. Similarly, almost all roofs were wood constructions.

In the region of four-fifths of returnee and IDP households surveyed occupy two-room dwellings. The vast majority of remaining IDP households reported to be residing in three-room dwellings. Remaining returnee households reside in one-room dwellings and three-room dwellings in equal numbers.

With regard to cooking facilities, 27% of IDP households and 23% of returnee households have a separate kitchen. A further 42% of IDP households and 35% of returnee households stated that their kitchen takes up part of a room within the home. Approximately 38% of returnee households and 21% of IDP households cook in the open.



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4. WATER, ELECTRICITY, FUEL AND SANITATION

Summary

Water: Tanker/Bottled water is the main source of water for 52.5% of returnee households and 91.9% of IDP households and it is located on average approximately 14 minutes away from both returnee households and IDP households. Bored wells is the second most principal source of drinking water for 42.5% of returnee households and 6.5% of IDP households located on average 16 minutes away from returnee households and 12 minutes away from IDP households. The other important sources are piped and open wells.

Electricity: Of the 142 households surveyed, a total of 74 (52.1%) reported to have had access to an electricity supply in the 30 days prior to being surveyed. Solar power was the most important source of electricity among 82.1% of returnee and 82.9% of IDP households. The remaining 17.9% of returnee and 17.1% of IDP households use batteries for the electricity.

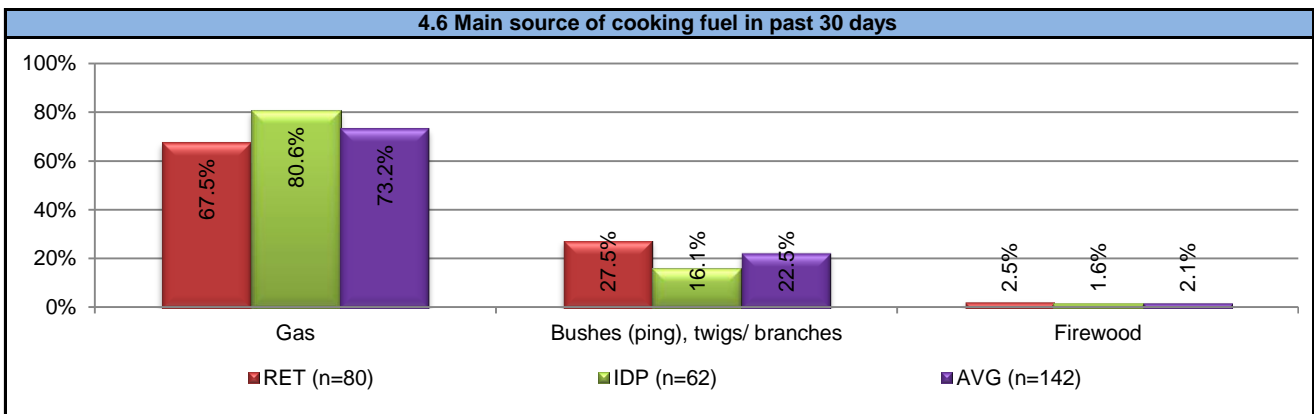
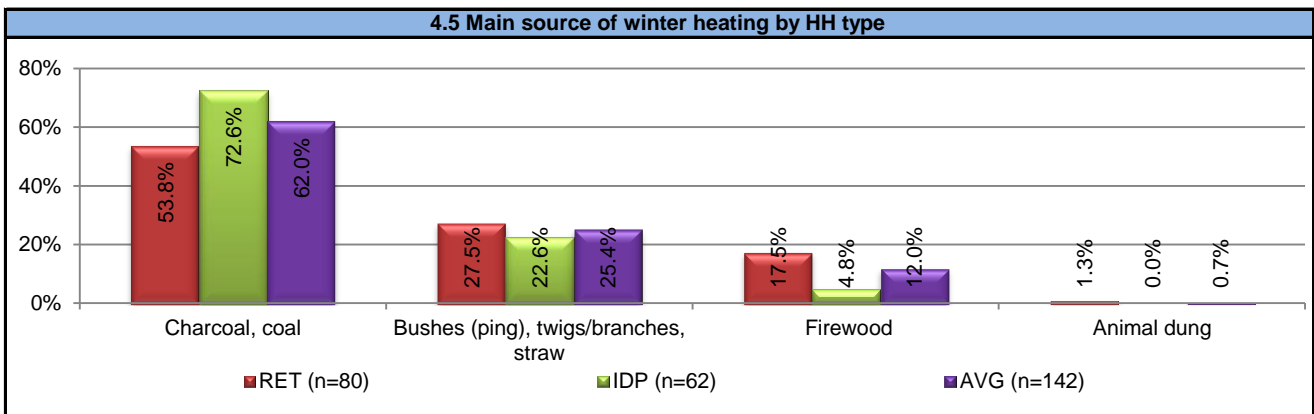
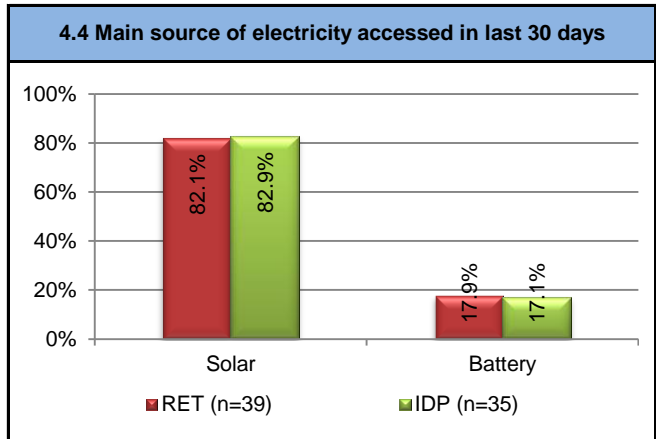
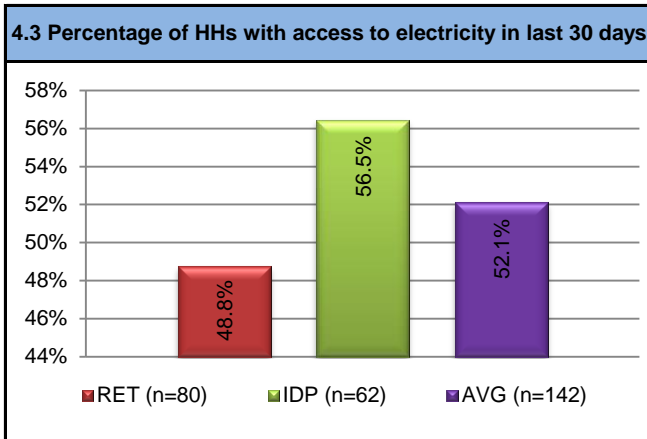
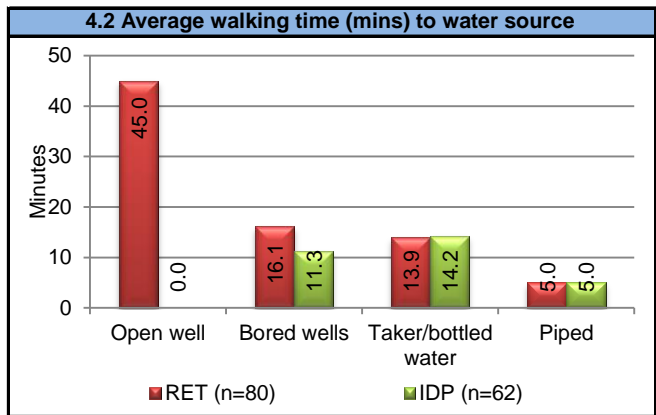
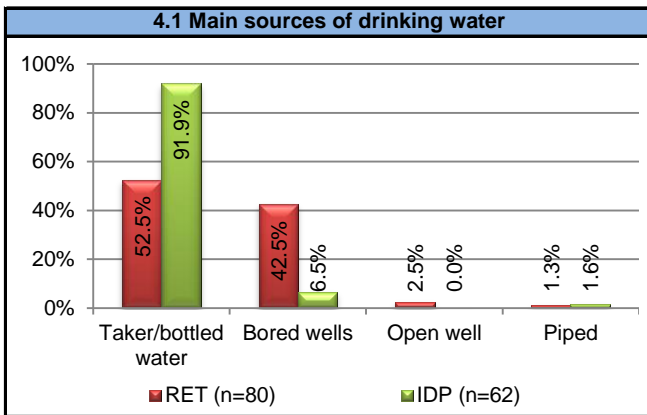
Fuel: During the winter months, Charcoal/coal is the main source of heating for 53.8% of returnee households and 72.6% of IDP households. Bushes (ping), twigs/branches and straw heat the homes of 27.5% of returnee and 22.6% of IDP households. Proportionally less IDP households (4.8%) use firewood as source of heating compared to returnee households (17.5%). Furthermore, only 1.3% of returnee households use animal dung for heating.

The main source of cooking fuel in past 30 days for returnee households (67.5%) and IDP households (80.6%) is Gas. A further, 27.5% returnee households and 16.1% of IDP households use Bushes (ping), twigs/branches and straw for cooking. Small percentages of both returnee and IDP households use firewood for their cooking.

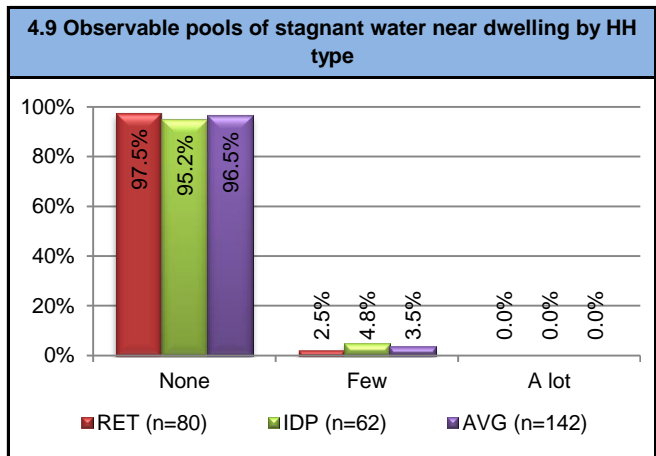
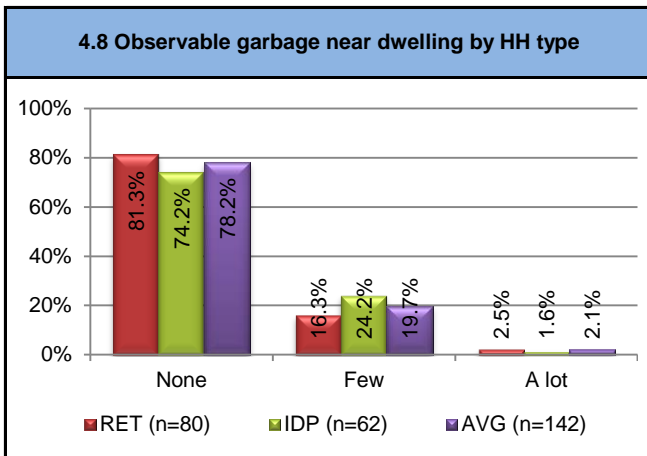
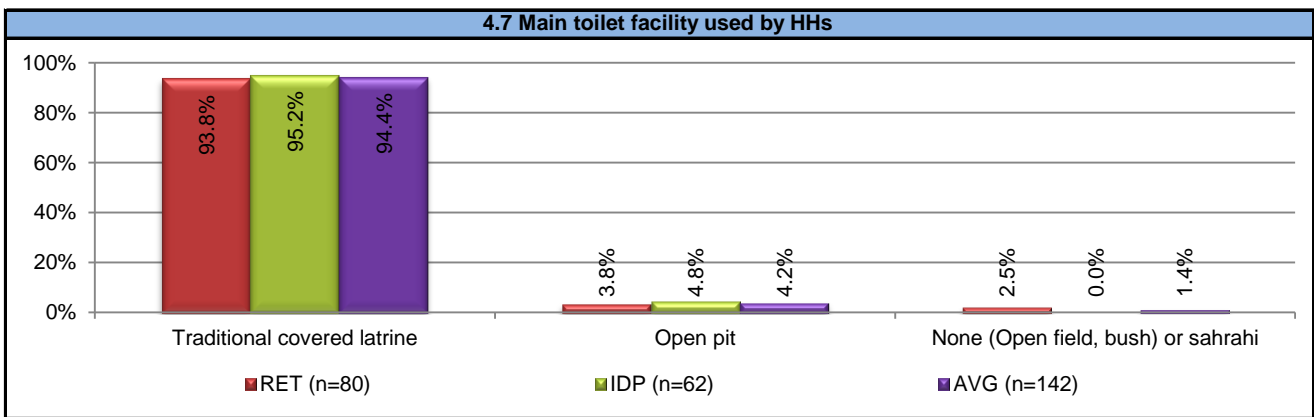
Sanitation: Over 93% of both returnee and IDP households have access to a traditional covered latrine. A further, 3.8% of returnee and 4.8% of IDP households use open pit as their latrine. Only 2.5% of returnee households use open field, bush, or sahrahi for toilet.

Surveyors took note of whether any garbage or pools of stagnant water were observed in close proximity to the households they interviewed. 81.3% of returnee households and 74.2% of IDP households didn't have any garbage near their dwellings. A further, 16.3% of returnee households and 24.2% of IDP households had little garbage near their dwellings. Approximately less than 3% of both returnee and IDP had a lot of garbage near their dwellings. Also, over 95% of both returnee and IDP households didn't have any stagnant water near their dwellings. In addition, 2.5% of returnee households and 4.8% of IDP households had little stagnant water near their dwellings.

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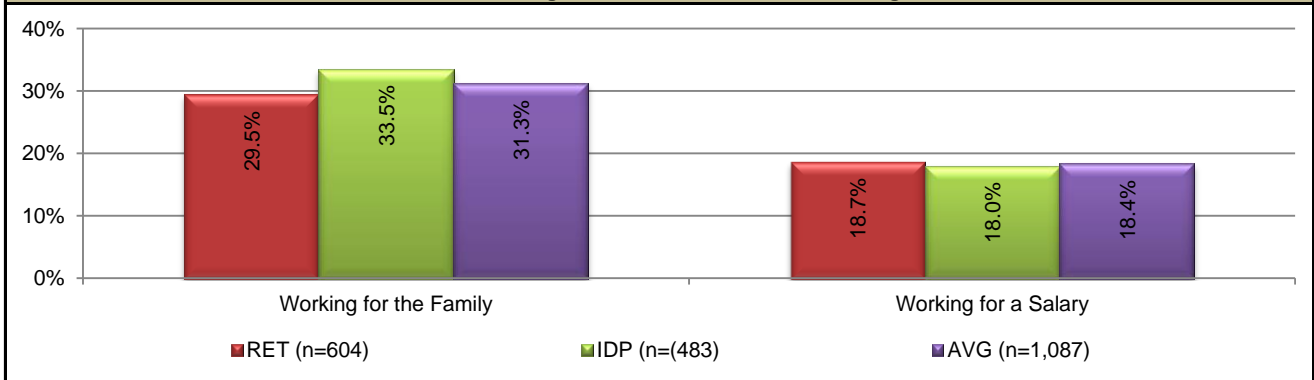

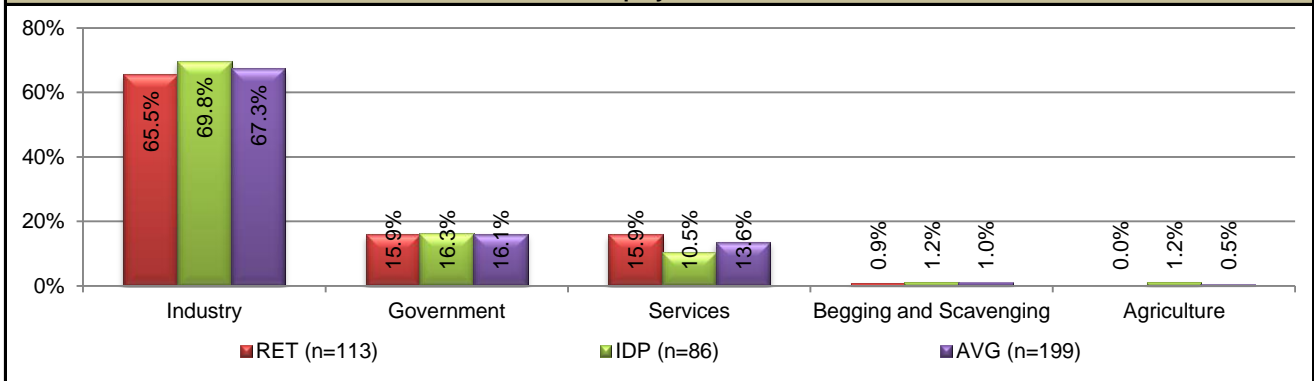
Summary

According to survey findings, 33.5% of IDPs and 29.5% of returnees are engaged in work for the family of whom three-quarters in both groups are female. A further 18.7% of returnees and 18.0% of IDPs reported to be working for a salary of which approximately 95.0% in both groups are male. The majority (>65.0%) of salaried workers in both household types work in industry, with smaller proportions (10.0%-16.0%) working in either the government sector or service sector. Nine IDPs and eight returnees aged 12-17 years were also reported to be employed.

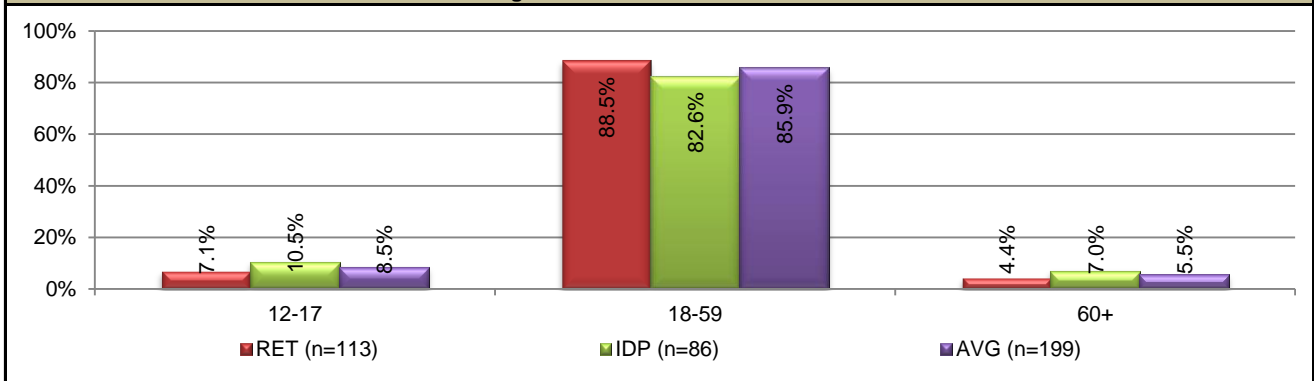
5.1 Percentage of household members working

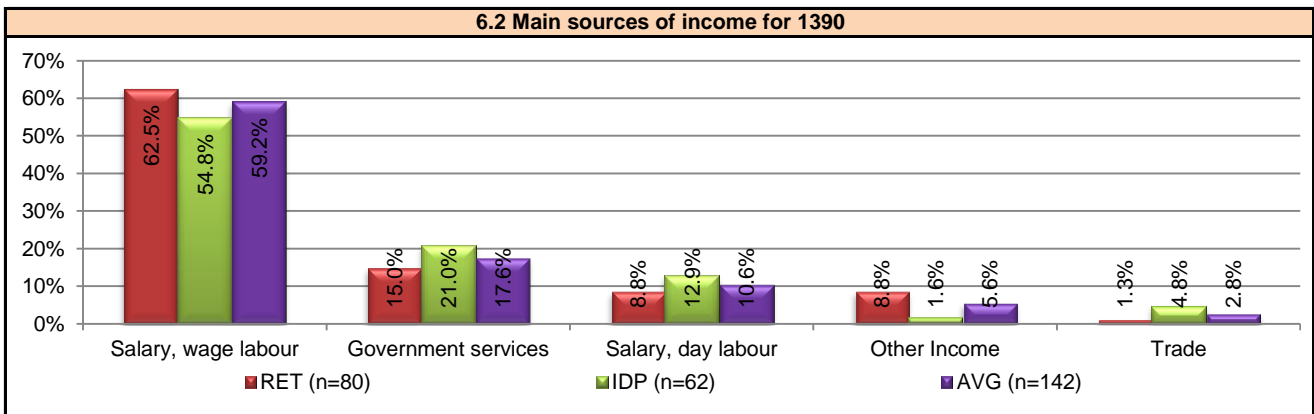
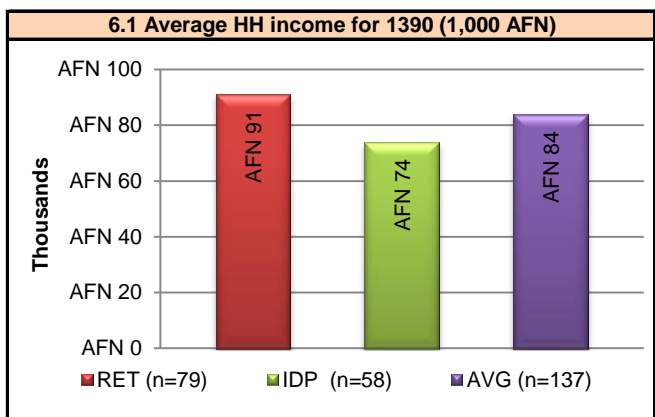
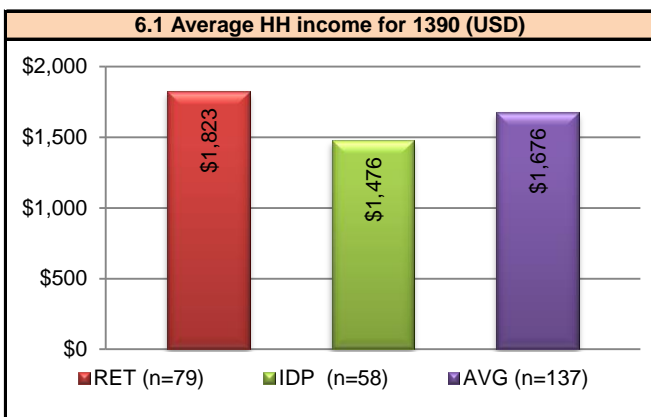
Summary

Income: Average household income in 1390 was USD 1,823 among returnee households and USD 1,476 among IDP households. Wage labour was the main source of income for both returnee (62.5%) and IDP (54.8%) households. Proportionally more IDP households (21.0%) derived income from government services than returnee households (15.0%). More IDP households (12.9%) also derived income from day labour than did their returnee (8.8%) counterparts.

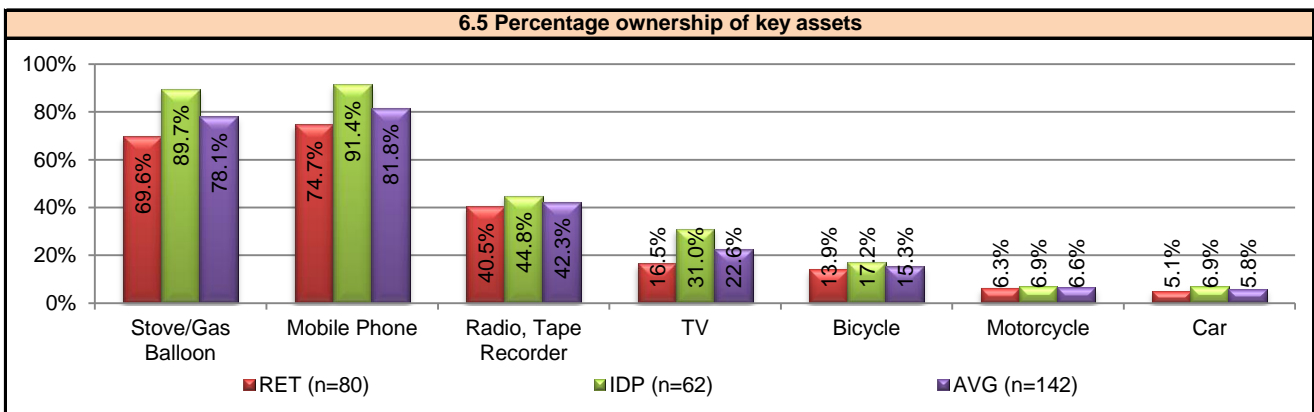
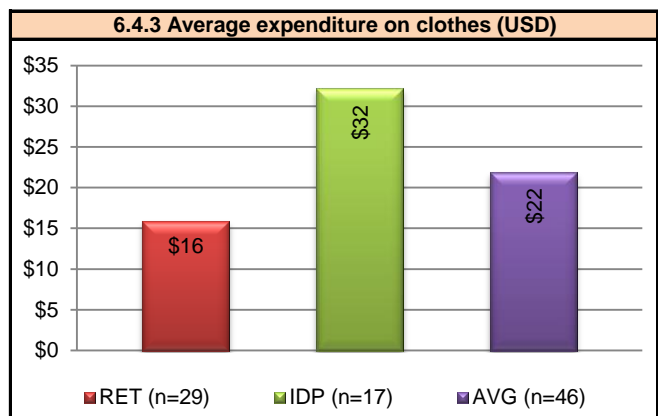
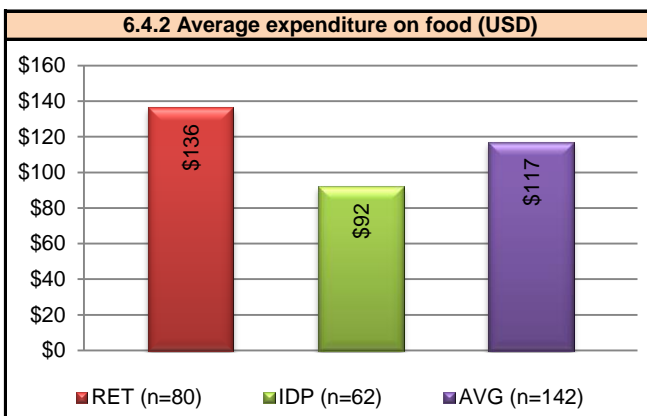
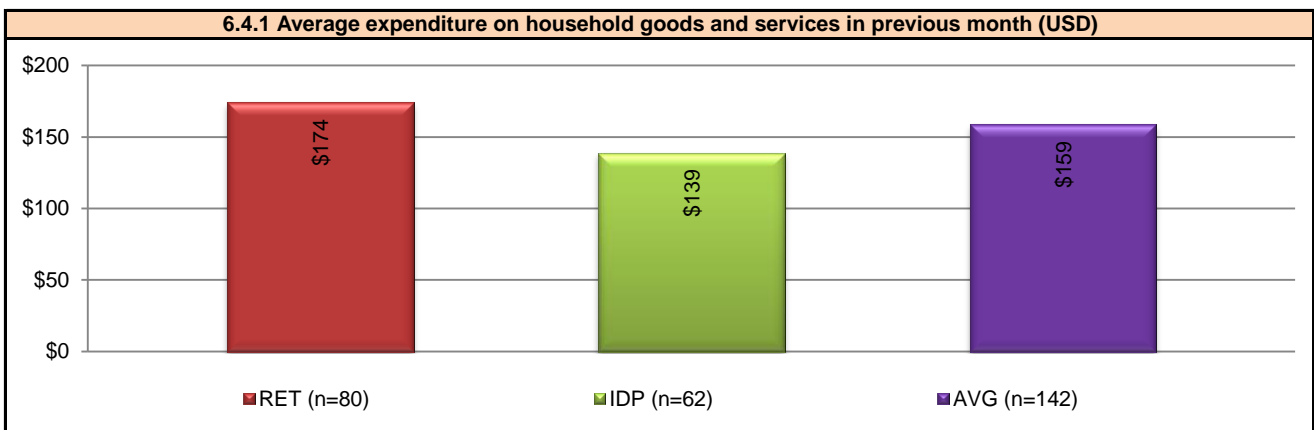
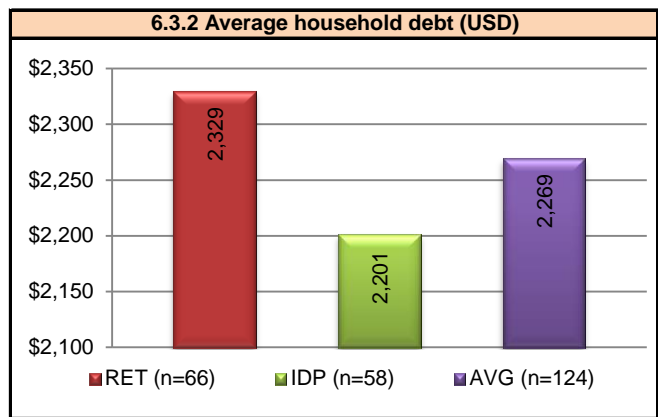
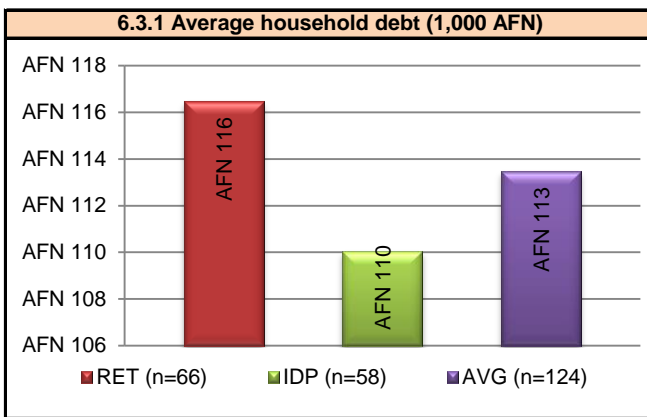
Average household debt was revealed to be USD 2,329 among returnee households and USD 2,201 among IDP households.

Expenditure: Average household expenditure in the month prior to being surveyed was USD 174 among returnee households and USD 139 among IDP households. Food supplies constituted the largest monthly expense for both returnee (78.2%) and IDP (66.2%) households. IDP households had spent twice as much on clothing as had returnee households.

Assets: With regard to ownership of key household assets, 83.9% of IDP households and 68.8% of returnee households own a stove/gas balloon. Moreover, 85.5% of IDP households and 73.8% of returnee households also have access to a mobile telephone. In the region of two-fifths of both household types own a radio. IDP households were almost twice as likely to own a television set, while comparable proportions in both groups own a bicycle, motorcycle, and car.



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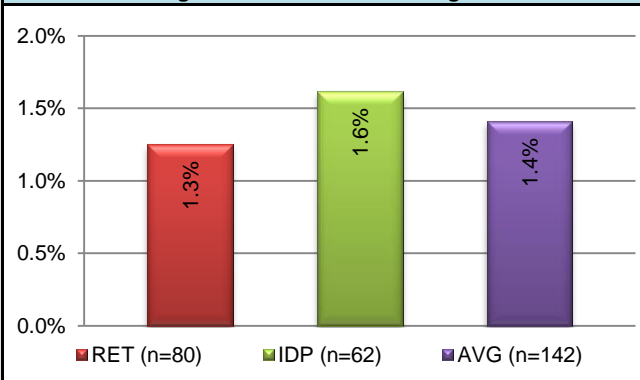
7. AGRICULTURE & LIVESTOCK

Summary

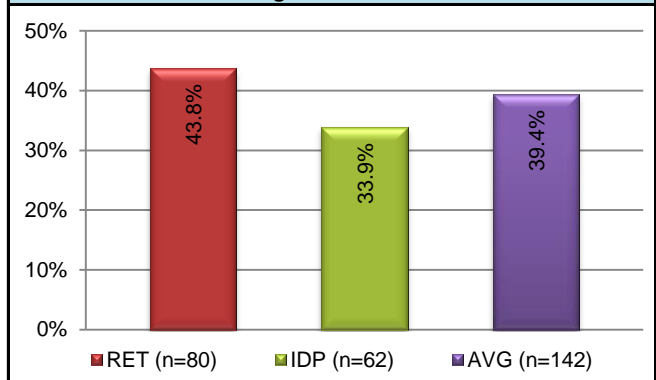
Agriculture: Of surveyed households, only one returnee household and one IDP household have access to agricultural land. In 1391, the returnee household cultivated 10.0 jeribs of wheat and the IDP household cultivated 6.0 jeribs of potato. Only one household in each group reported to have access to a garden plot.

Livestock: Some form of livestock is owned by 43.8% of returnee households and 33.9% of IDP households. Among returnee households that do, chickens are owned by 82.9% while smaller proportions own sheep (8.6%), goats (5.7%) and other birds (5.7%). Similarly, among IDP households that own some form of livestock, 76.2% own chickens while significant proportions also own other birds (19.0%) and sheep (14.3%). Cows are owned by only 4.8% of IDP households and 2.9% of returnee households.

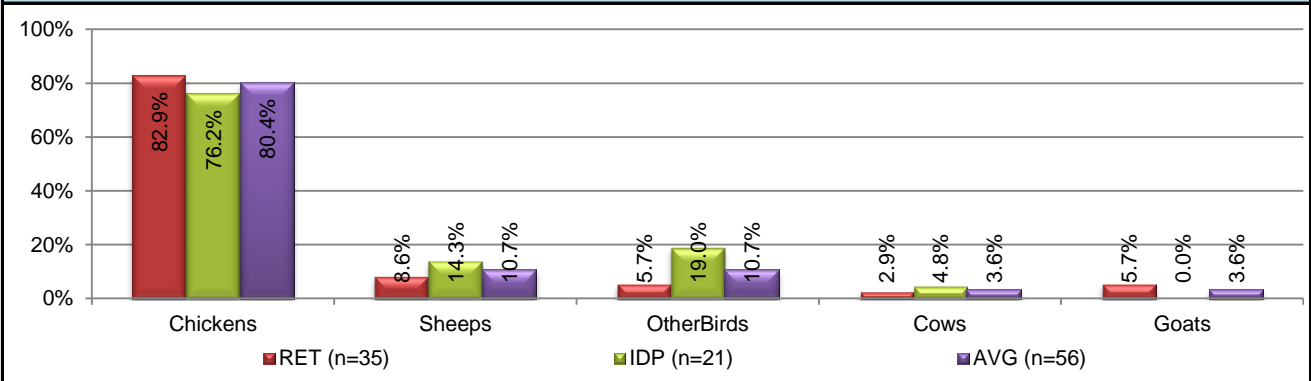
7.1 Percentage of HHs with access to agricultural land



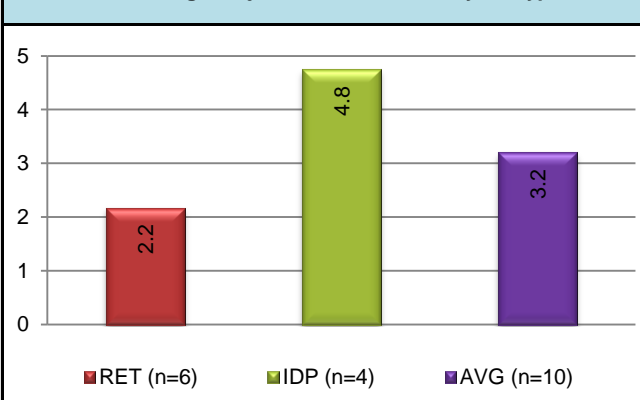
7.2 Percentage of HHs with livestock



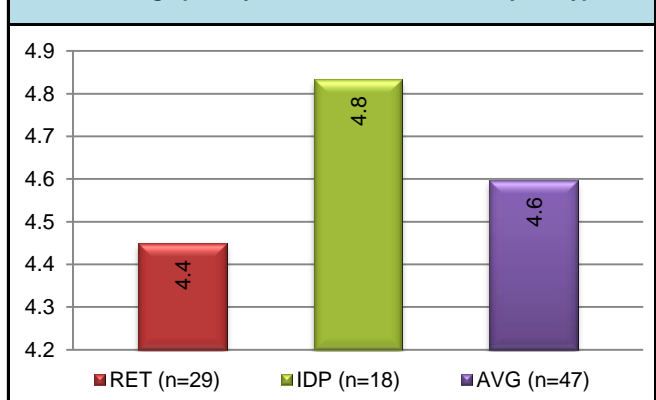
7.3 Type of livestock owned by HH type

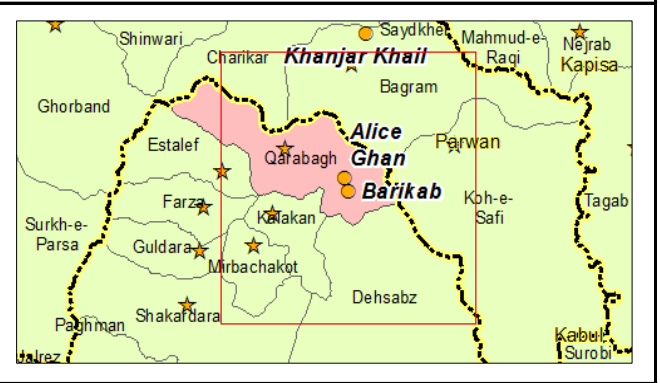
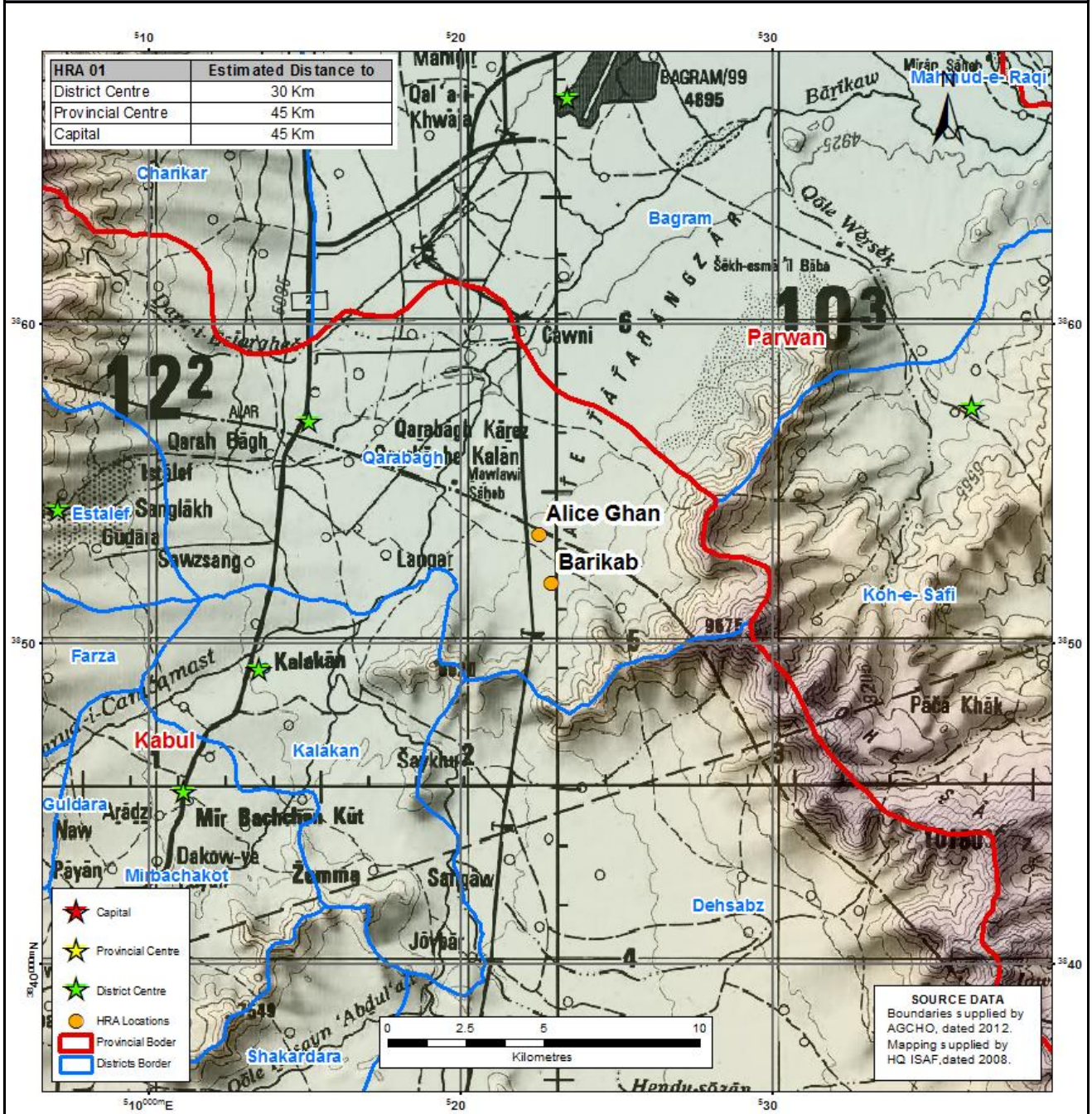


7.5 Average poultry and other birds owned by HH type

Summary

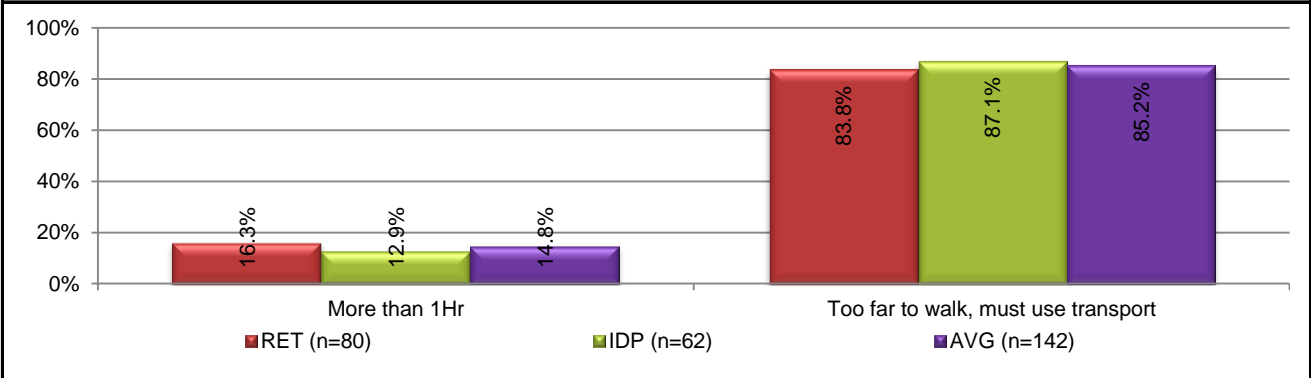
Over 80% of both returnee and IDP households have stated that District Centre is too far to walk, must use transport. In the last three months, the main reasons for travelling to the District Centre for both IDP and returnee households were to purchase goods or services, to work or to visit relatives. Moreover, over two-fifths (45.0%) of returnee households stated that police station is less than 15 minutes and over two-quarters (53.2%) of IDP households stated that the nearest police station is 15-60 minutes away.

Over two-fifths (41.3%) of returnee households and three-fifths (61.3%) of IDP households stated that public health centre 15-60 minutes away. For the vast majority in returnee and IDP households, the nearest private health clinic is either too far to walk to or 15-60 minutes away. The nearest hospital is too far to walk to for both returnee and IDP households.

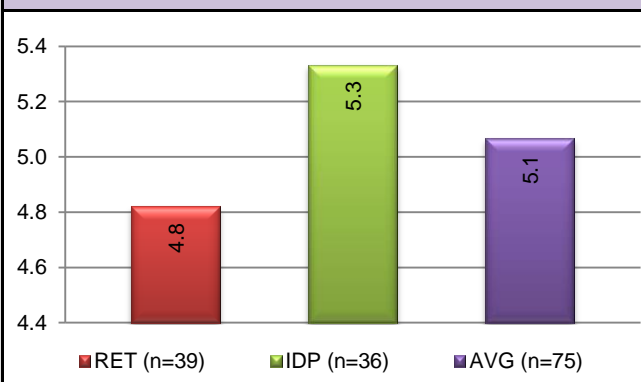
One-third (35.0%) of returnee and IDP households stated their employment area is 15-60 minutes away. Over two-thirds (66.3%) of returnee households and three-quarters (77.4%) of IDP households stated that their access to transport is less than 15 minutes away.

For returnee and IDP household, the nearest primary, secondary and high schools for both boys and girls are located 15-60 minutes away on foot except for boys' secondary school among returnee households which is less than 15 minutes away.

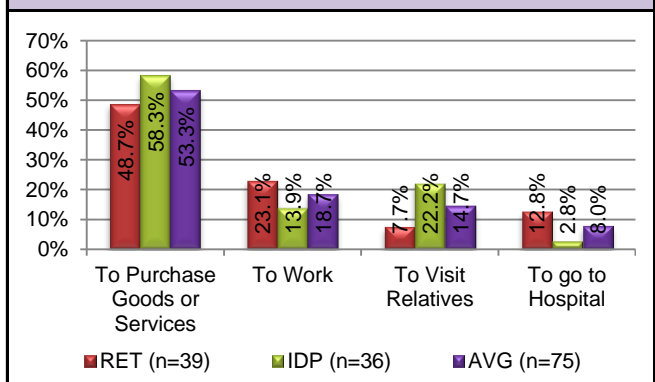
8.1 Average time taken to walk one way to District Centre



8.2 Average number of times a HH member has travelled to District Centre in last three months

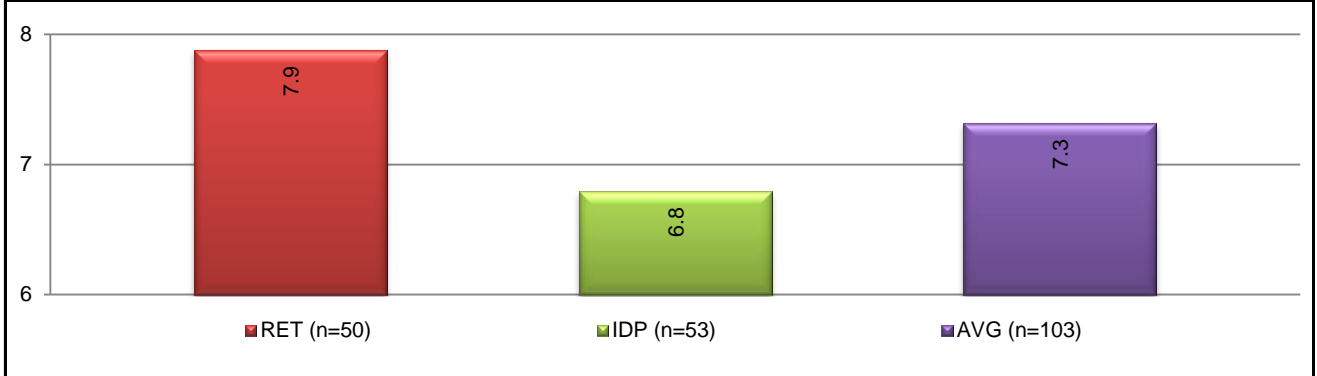


8.3 Main reasons for travelling to District Centre in last three months

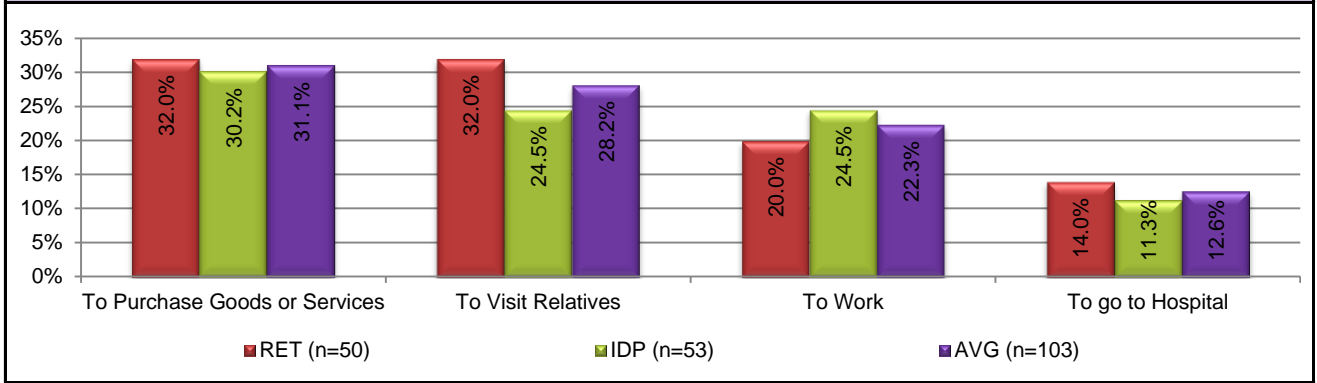


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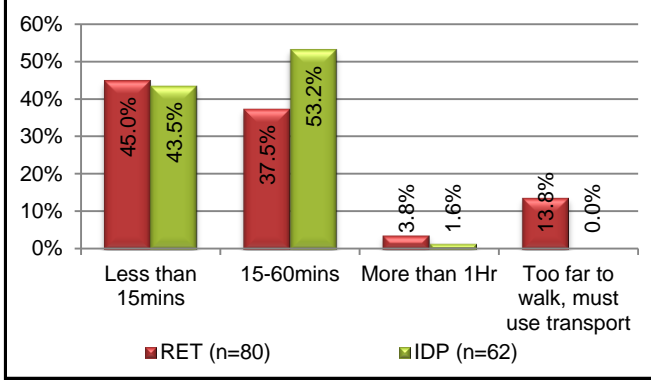
8.4 Average number of times a HH member has travelled outside District Centre in last three months



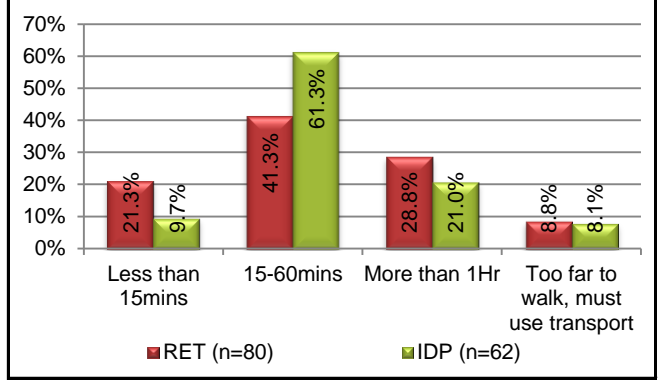
8.5 Main reasons for travelling outside District Centre in last three months



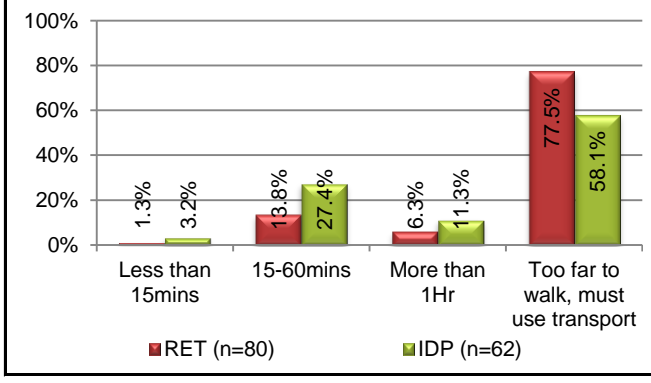

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9. EDUCATION PROFILE

Summary

Among those aged five years and over, 54.9% of returnees and 56.1% of IDPs reported to be literate. Of these, 61.9% of returnee males and 65.3% of IDP males reported to be literate. Similarly, 46.0% of returnee females and 46.9% of IDP females reported to be literate.

Among adults aged eighteen years and over, 91.9% of returnee males and 94.1% of IDP males did not achieve any school grade. Similarly, over 98% of both returnee and IDP females had not achieved any school grade.

Among males aged 6 to 24 years, 62.8% of returnee males and 54.4% of IDPs males reported to be currently attending school. Among females aged 6 to 24 years, 54.7% of returnees and 51.2% of IDP females reported to be currently attending school. The main reason for not attending school given by those aged 6 to 24 years across both returnee and IDP was because the family did not permit them to. Furthermore, 11.7% of those aged 6 to 24 years across all three groups didn't go to school because children needed to work to help family. Also 7.6% of returnee and 10.3% of IDP members aged 6 to 24 years didn't attend school because they didn't like school or didn't learn enough.

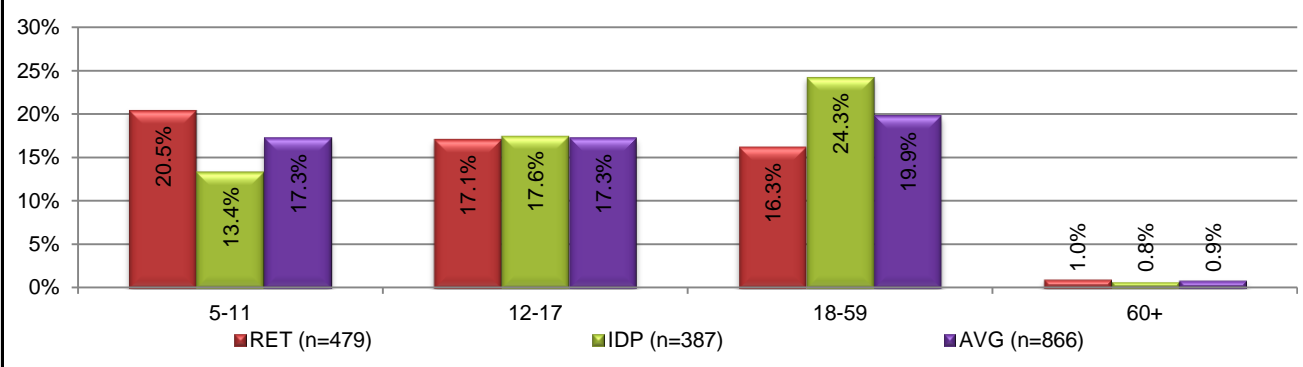

9.3 Age distribution of literate household members

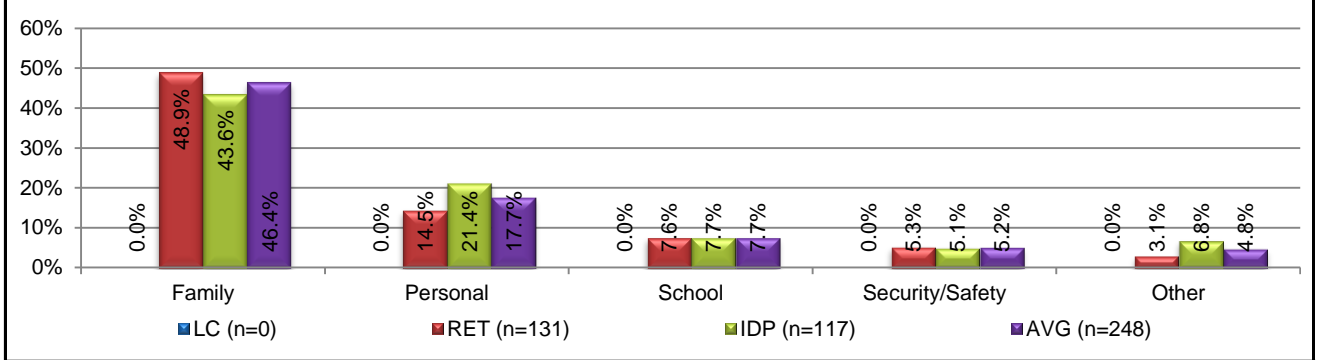


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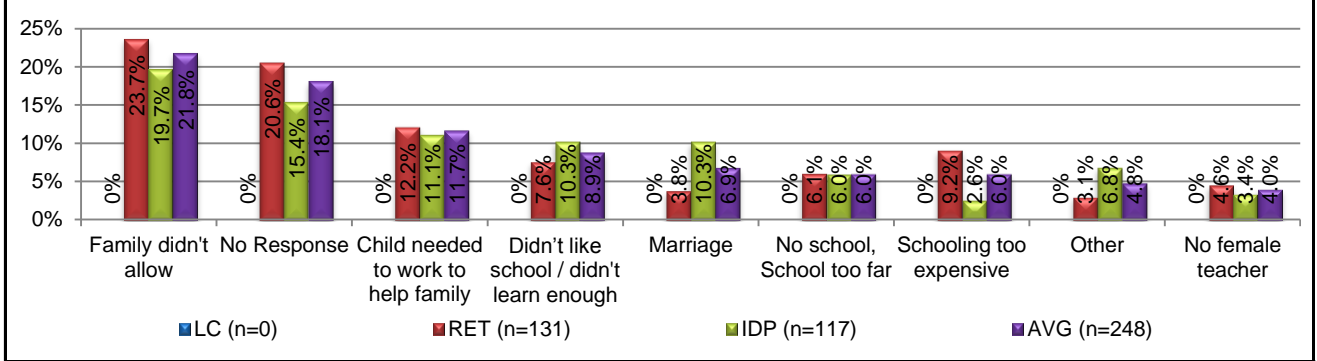

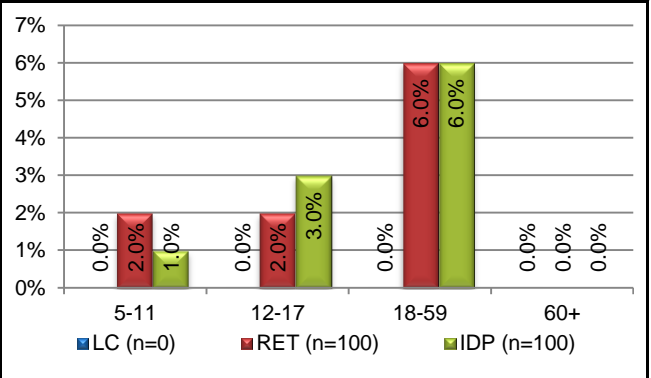
9.10.2 Specific reasons for not attending school



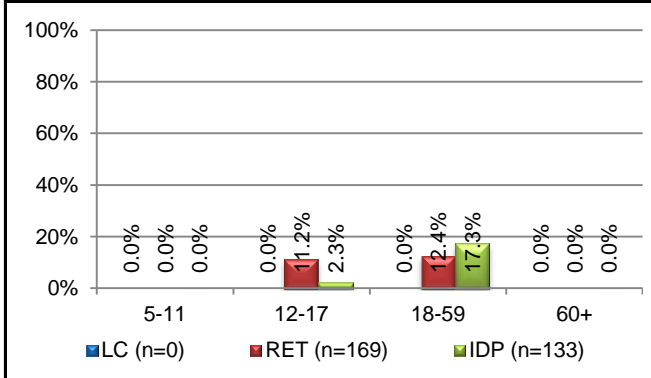
9.11 Age distribution of males who received education in another province



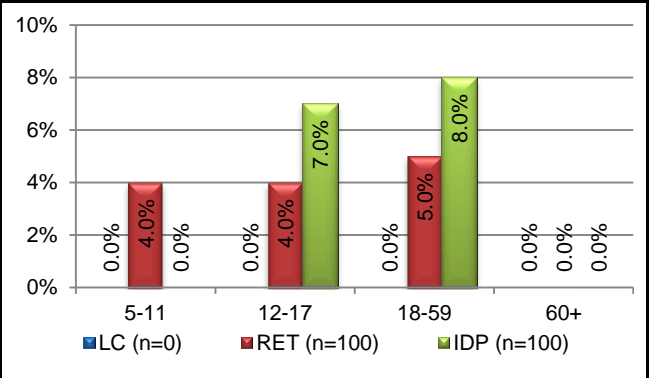
9.12 Age distribution of females who received education in another province

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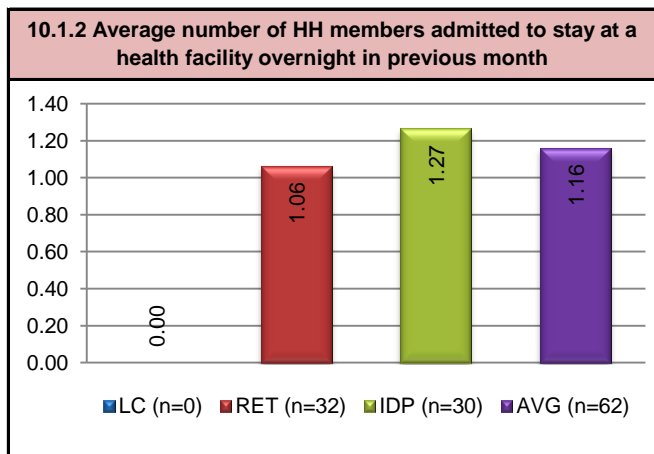
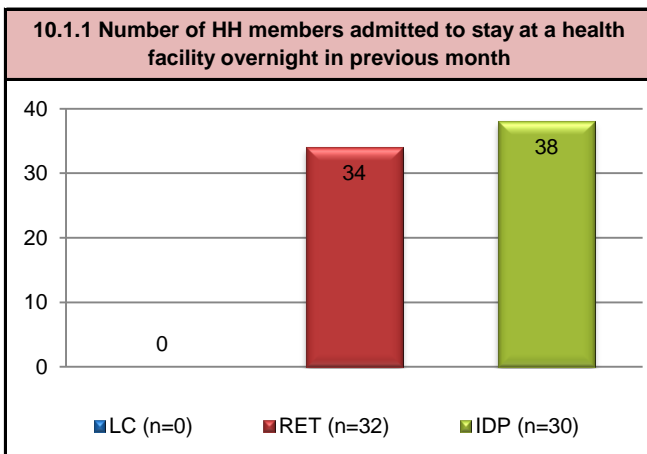
10. HEALTH PROFILE

Summary

40.0% of returnee households and 48.4% of IDP households had between one and two household members admitted to a health facility as an inpatient over the course of the previous month. Three-fifths (61.3%) of returnee and two-thirds (66.1%) of IDP households also had at least one member receive care from a health provider, a pharmacy or traditional healer without having to stay overnight. The private health facility was visited most by returnee and IDP, followed by the Regional Hospital and the comprehensive health facility for IDP households and district hospital and comprehensive health facility for returnee households. The most common reasons for seeking medical treatment by returnee households were communicable problems (18.9%), digestive problems (14.9%), respiratory problems (5.4%) and other non-communicable problems (6.8%). Similarly, for IDP households the most common reasons were other non-communicable diseases (18.2%), digestive problems (16.7%), and treatment of respiratory problems (15.2%).

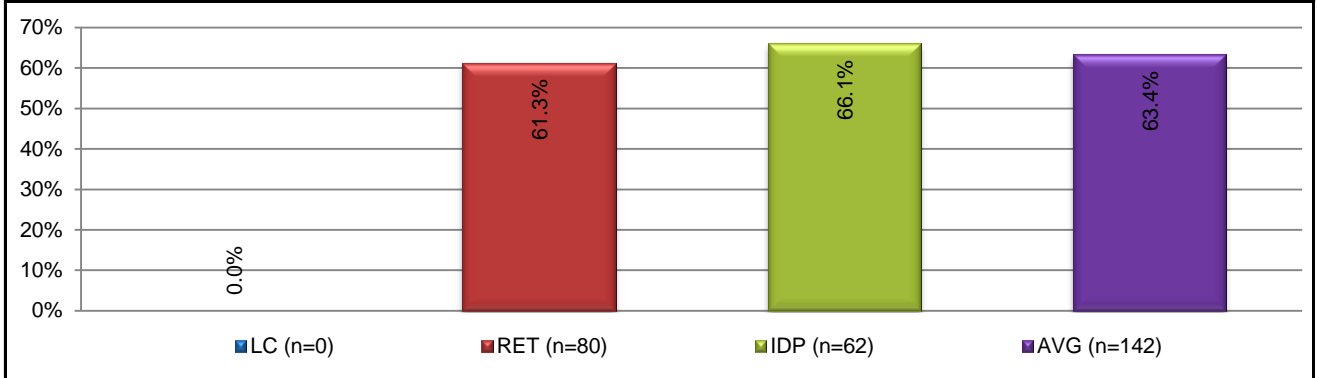
Of the 257 females aged 13-49 years that were included in the survey, a total of 53 were reported to be married among returnee households (n=28) and IDP households (n=25). Based on this data, the average number of births stands at 5.8 for returnee females and 5.4 for IDP females. Correspondingly, the average number of infant/child deaths is 0.8 for returnee females and 1.0 for IDP females. Of the 52 females aged 13-49 years that have given birth, 91.7% of returnee and 84.6% of IDP females received antenatal care during their last pregnancy with an average of 3.23 antenatal care visits per mother, and 56.4% had the assistance of a midwife during delivery.

With regard to children under the age of five, 58.1% of returnee children and 61.3% of IDP children have been registered with the civil authorities. Over the course of the previous month, 51.2% of returnee under-fives and 9.7% of IDP under-fives have received a Vitamin A capsule and one-quarter of returnee children and 38.7% of IDP children have suffered from diarrhea. In the range of 5% of both returnee and IDP children have a persistent cough.

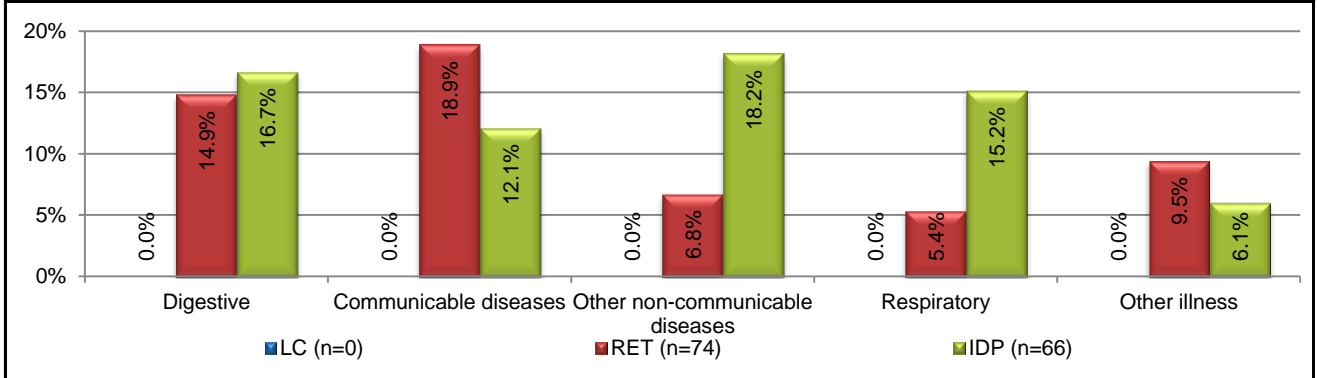


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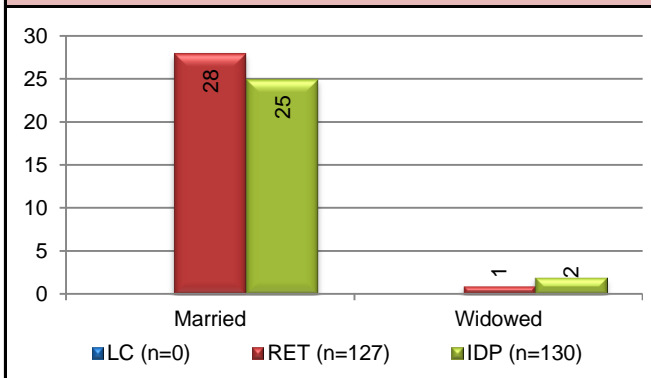
10.1.3 Percentage of HHs with at least one member who sought treatment from a health provider, a pharmacy or traditional healer without staying overnight



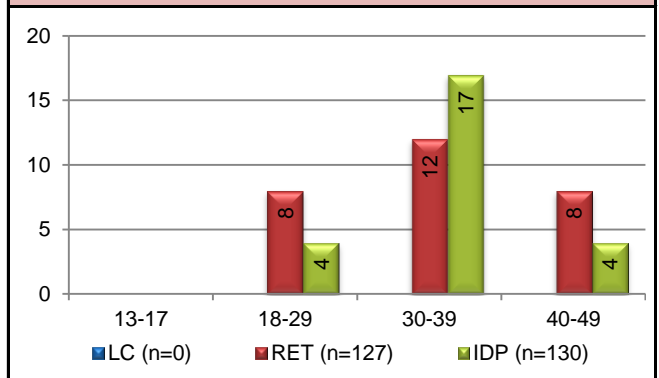
10.1.4 Reasons for seeking treatment



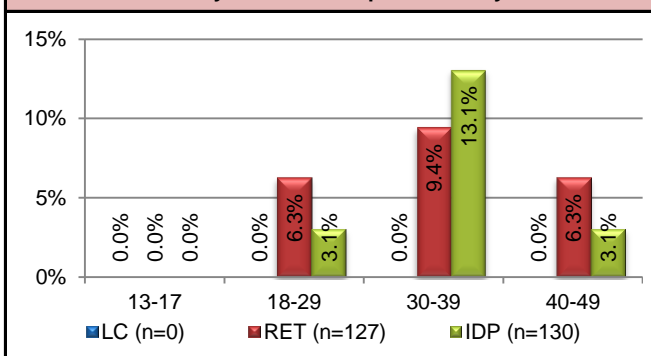

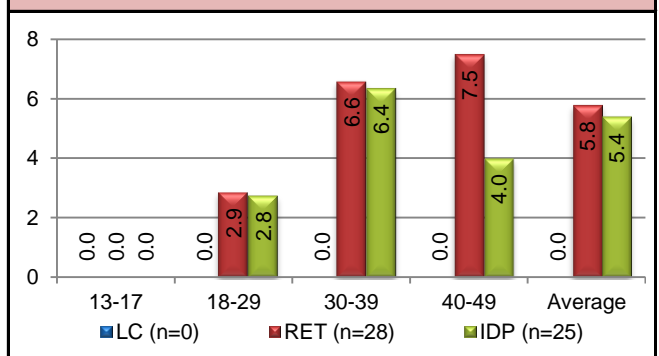
10.2.2 Age distribution of married women who completed survey



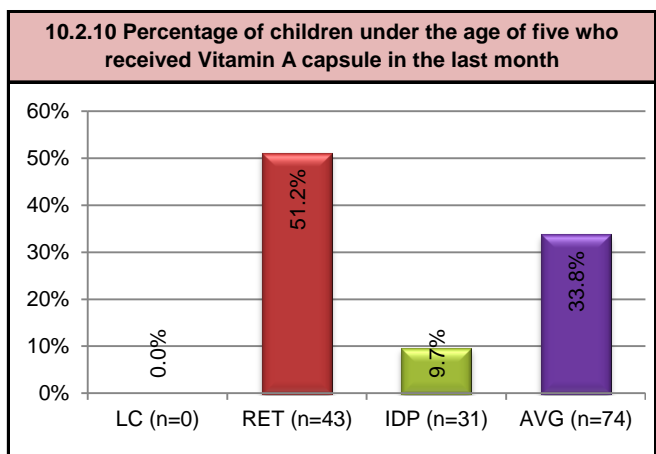
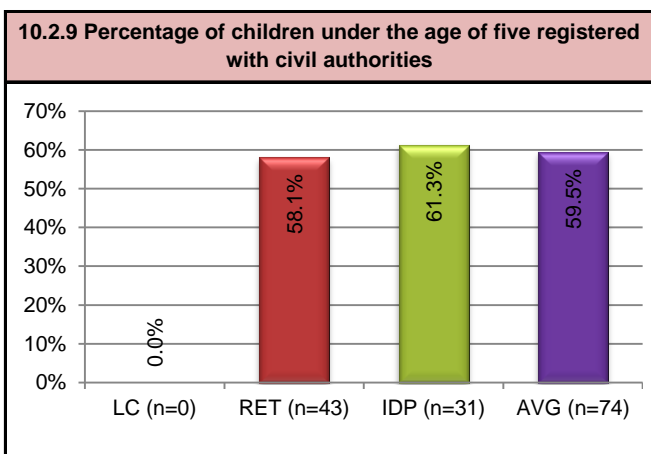
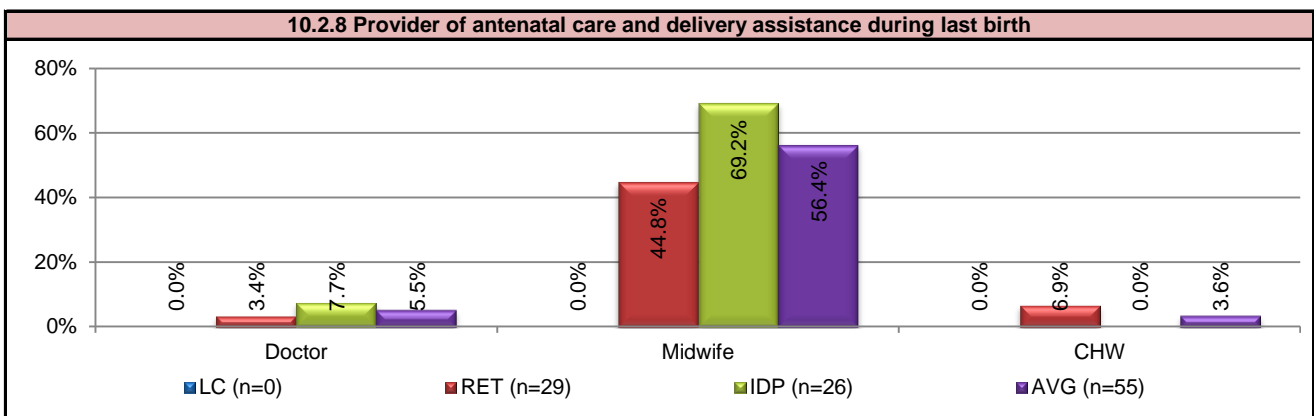
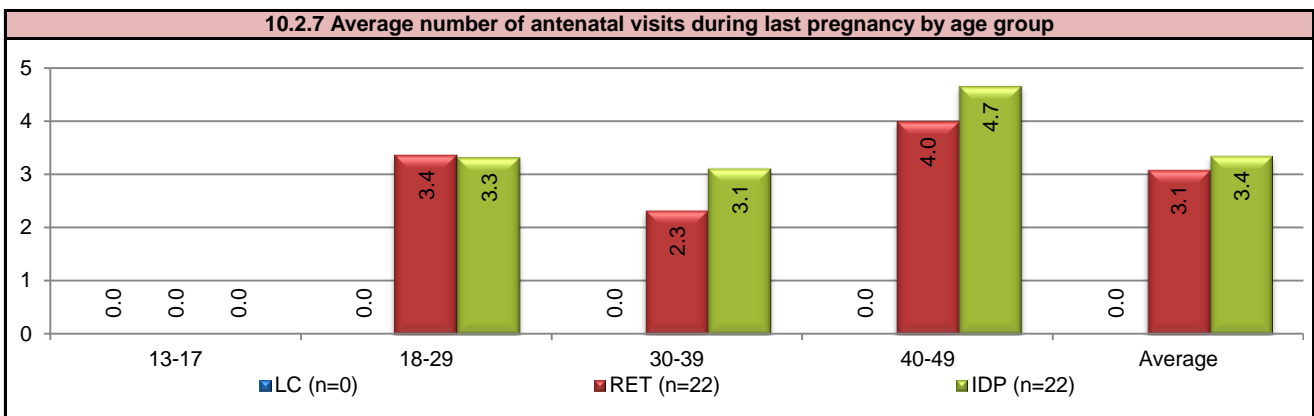
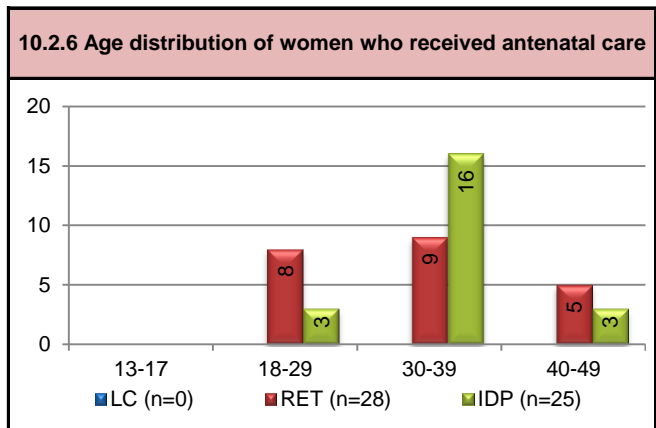
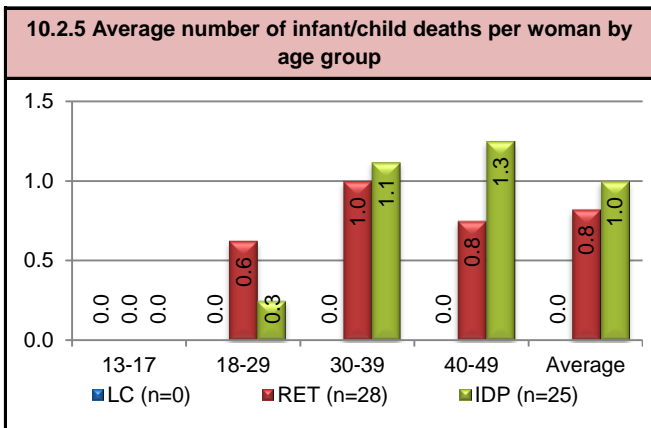
10.2.3 Percentage of overall number of married women aged 13-49 years who completed survey



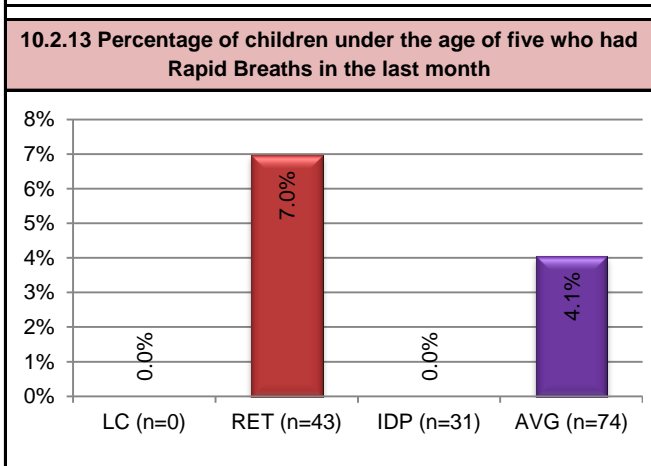
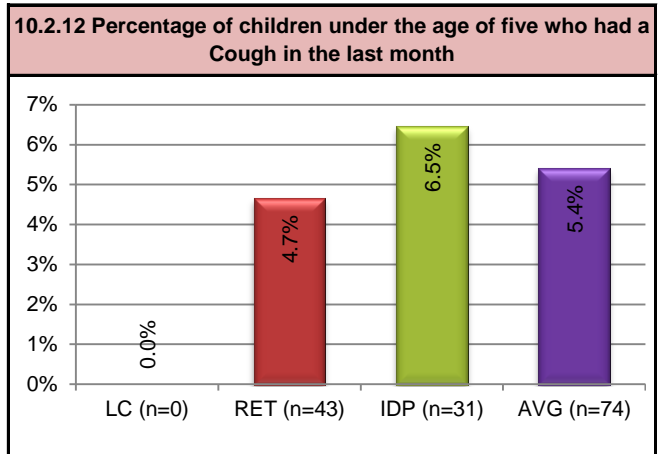
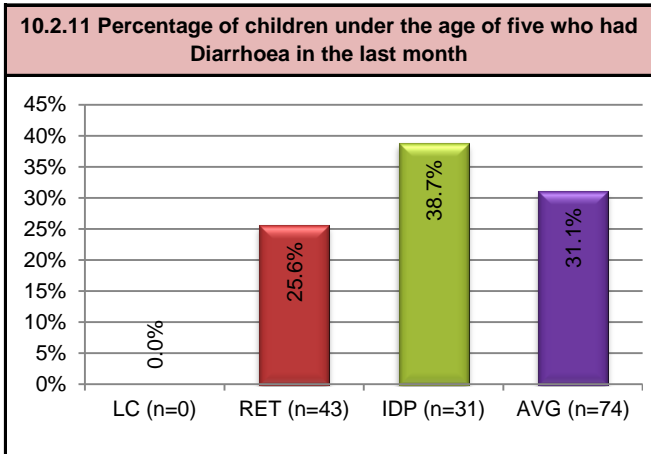
10.2.4 Average number of births per woman by age group

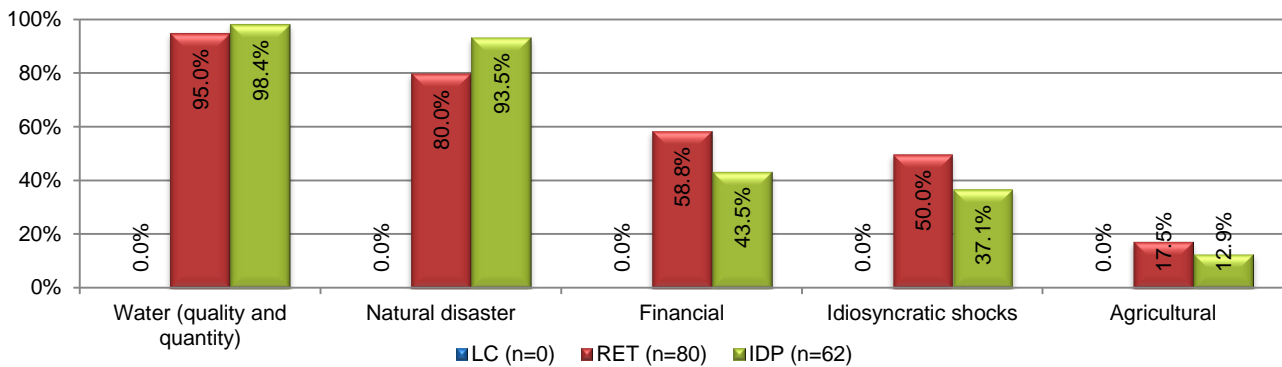

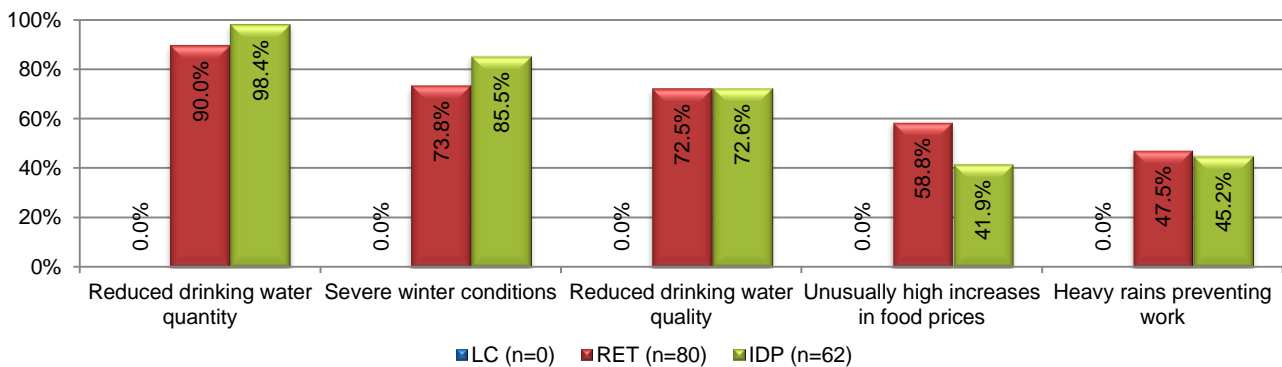
Among returnee households, 90.0% were affected by reduced drinking water quantity, approximately three-quarters (73.8%) by severe winter conditions, approximately three-quarters (72.5%) by reduced drinking water quality, three-fifths (58.8%) by unusually high increase in food prices and about two-quarters (47.5%) were affected by heavy rains preventing work. Over four-fifths (86.3%) of returnee households responded to these shocks by decreasing expenditures, approximately three-quarters (72.5%) took loans, two-fifths (38.8%) reduced quality of diet, one-third (35.0%) purchased food on credit from traders and 30% of returnee households reduced quantity of diet in order to cope with shocks faced.

Among IDP households, almost all (98.4%) were affected by reduced drinking water quantity, over four-fifths (85.5%) by severe winter conditions, approximately three-quarters (72.6%) by reduced drinking water quality, over two-fifths (41.9%) by unusually high increase in food prices and about two-fifths (45.2%) were affected by heavy rains preventing work. Over three-quarters (77.4%) of IDP households responded to these shocks by decreasing expenditures, four-fifths (80.6%) took loans, three-fifths (64.5%) reduced quality of diet, further, one-third purchased food on credit from traders and reduced quantity of diet in order to cope with shocks faced.

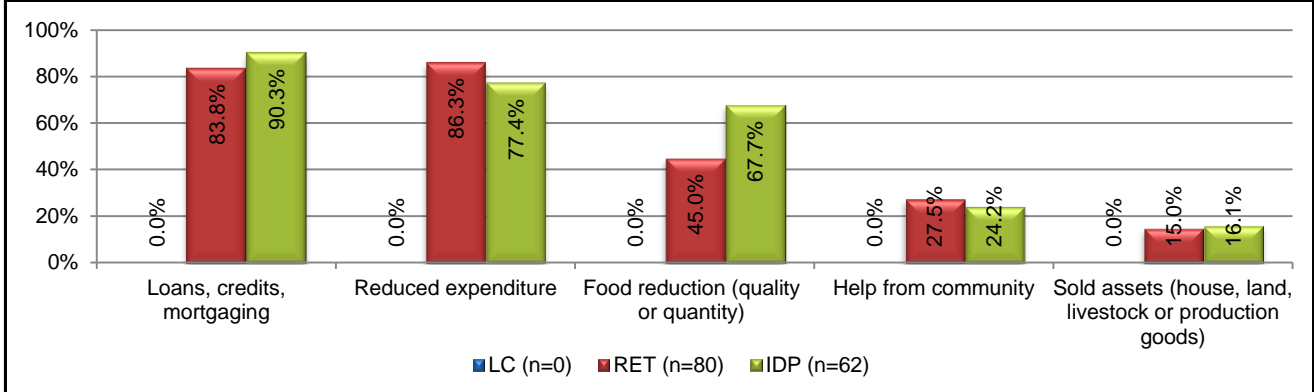


11.2 Specific household shocks in 1390

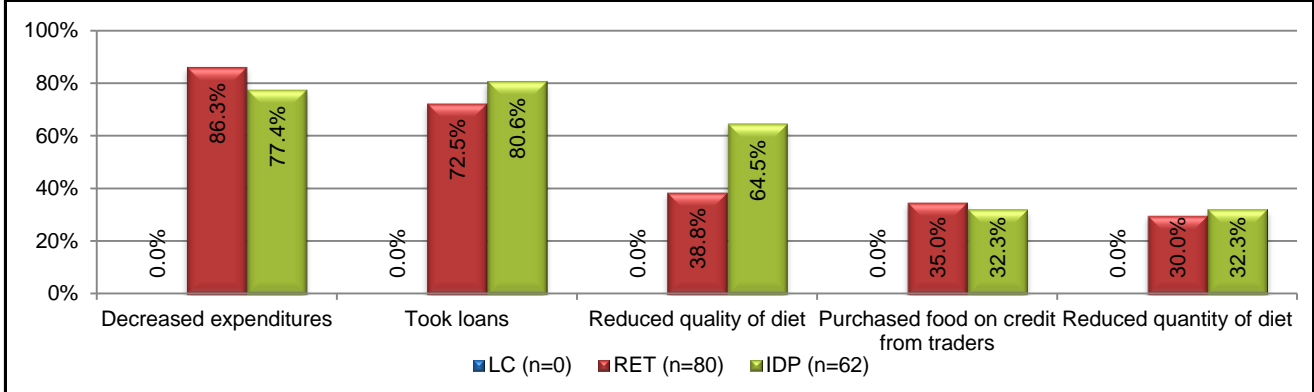


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11.3 General coping strategies employed in response to household shocks in 1390

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12. PROTECTION PROFILE

Summary

Of the 142 households surveyed, 85.2% had an adult male aged 18-59 years as head of household. Moreover, three returnee households and three IDP households have an adult female aged 18-59 years as head of household. A total of 21 households had an elderly (aged 60+) head of household of whom 4.8% were female. Five returnee households and four IDP households were headed by a widow or widower.

One returnee male, one returnee females; one IDP male and three IDP females aged 16-17 years were reported to be married. Among married adults, a total of 24 returnee and 16 IDP females reported to have been under-18 years of age at the time of marriage.

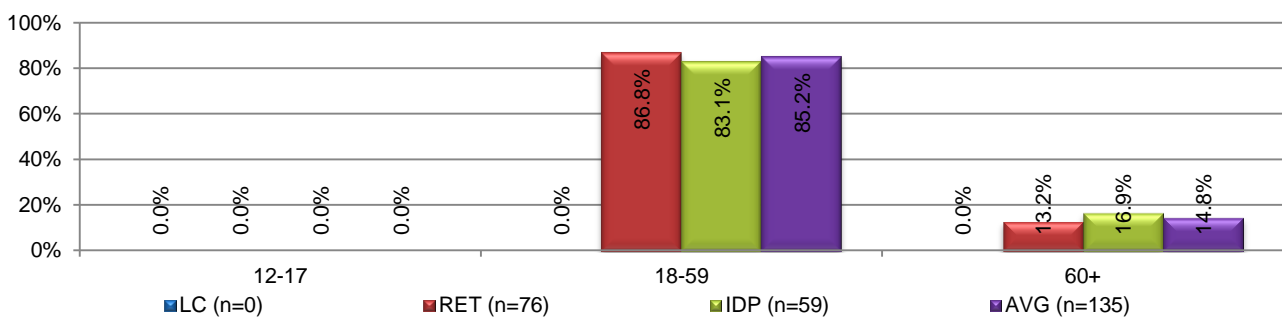
Four returnee households and none IDP households contained more than one wife.

The survey found 64 people living with a disability of which 73.4% were male. The most common disabilities were reported to be either physical (56.3%) or sensory (7.8%) in nature. 73.7% of disabled returnees and 69.2% of disabled IDPs were adults aged 18-59 years. In the range of 21.1% of disabled people in returnee households and 15.4% of disabled people in IDP households were aged 60 years and over.

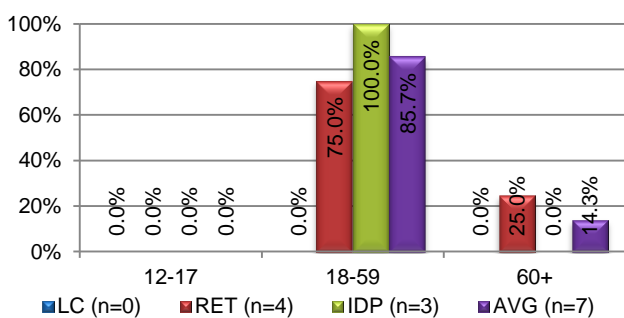

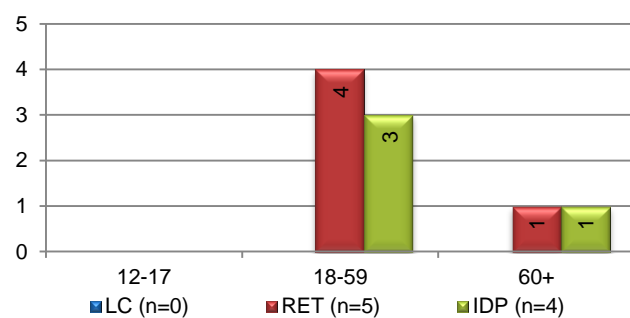
12.1.1 Age distribution of male heads of household



12.1.2 Age distribution of female heads of household

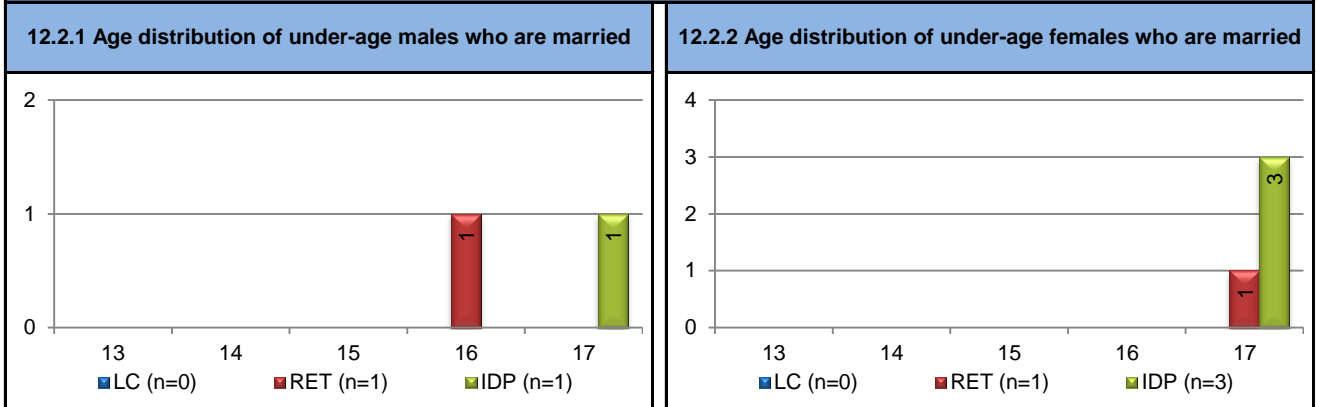


12.1.3 Age distribution of widowed heads of household

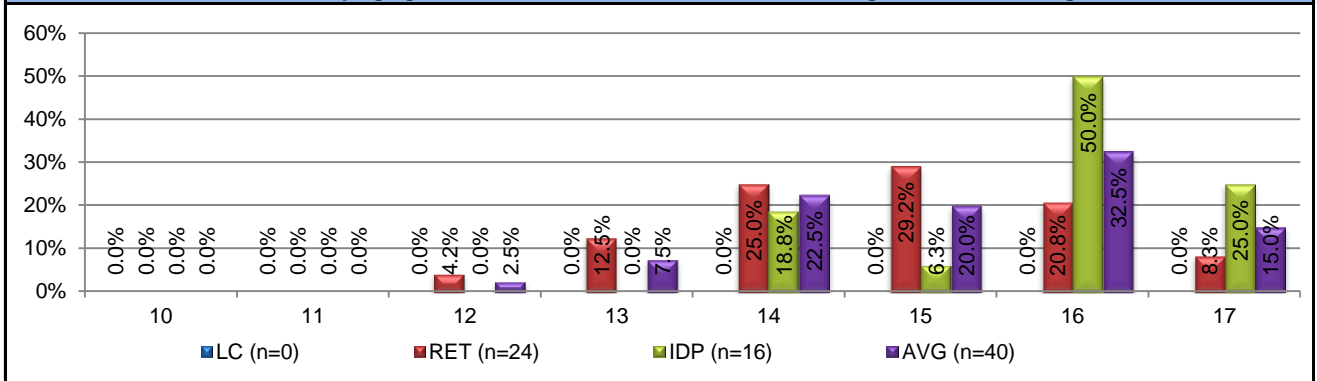


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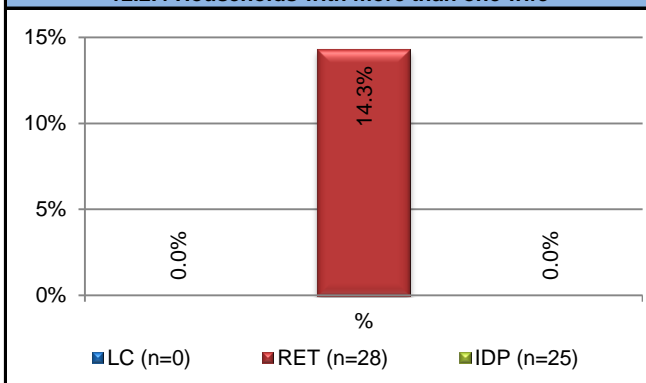

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13. Child Labour

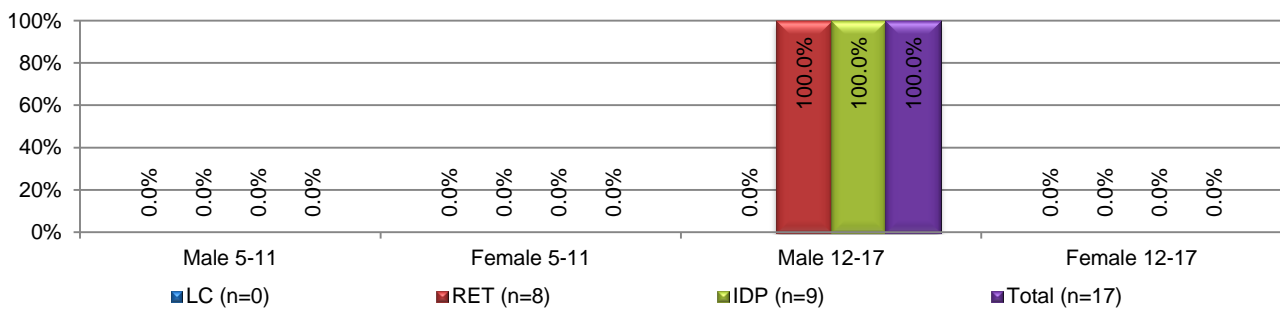
Summary

Among households surveyed, a total of 17 children were reported to be working and include 8 children aged 12-17 years among returnee families, and 9 children aged 12-17 years among IDP families.

Child workers belonging to returnee households were reported to be working an average of 7.9 hours per day with 62.5% of returnee child workers reported to be day labourers and 25.0% were self-employed. Child workers of IDP families work an average of 9.4 hours per day and 33.3% were reported to be both self-employed and salaried workers and 22.2% were day labourers.

Vast majority of children of each type of household were engaged in industry sector. The second most common sector for child workers all three household types is government sector.

13.1 Distribution of child workers by age and gender



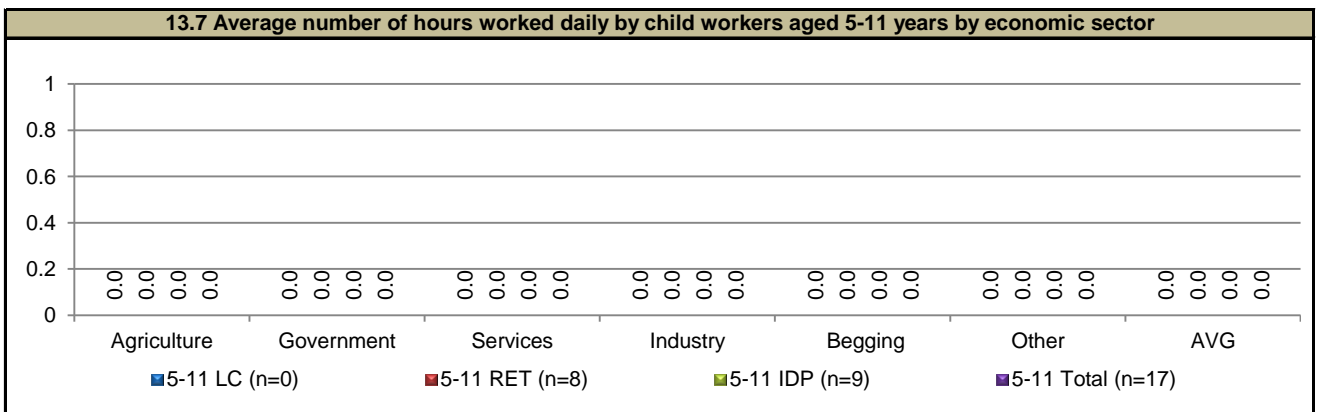
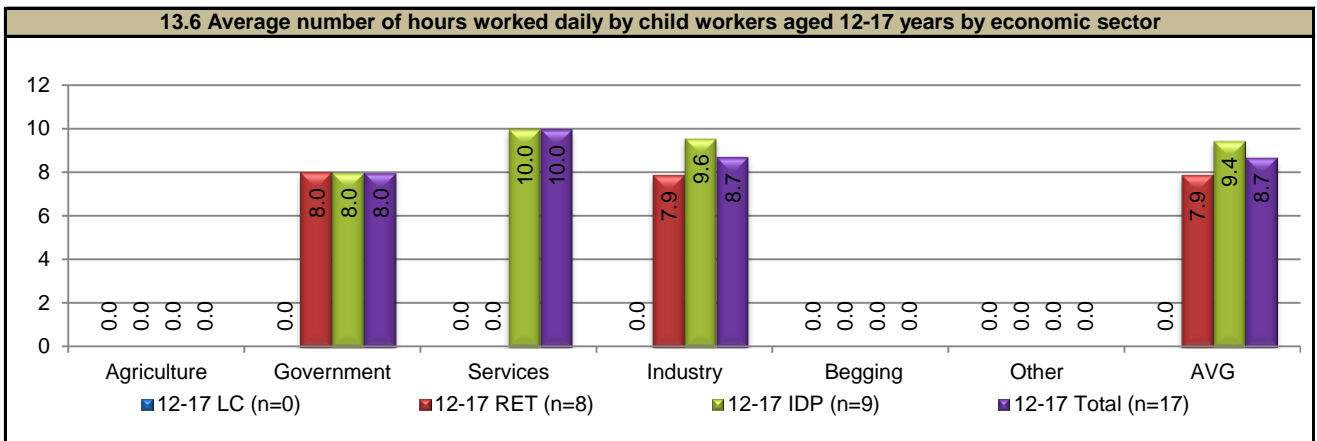
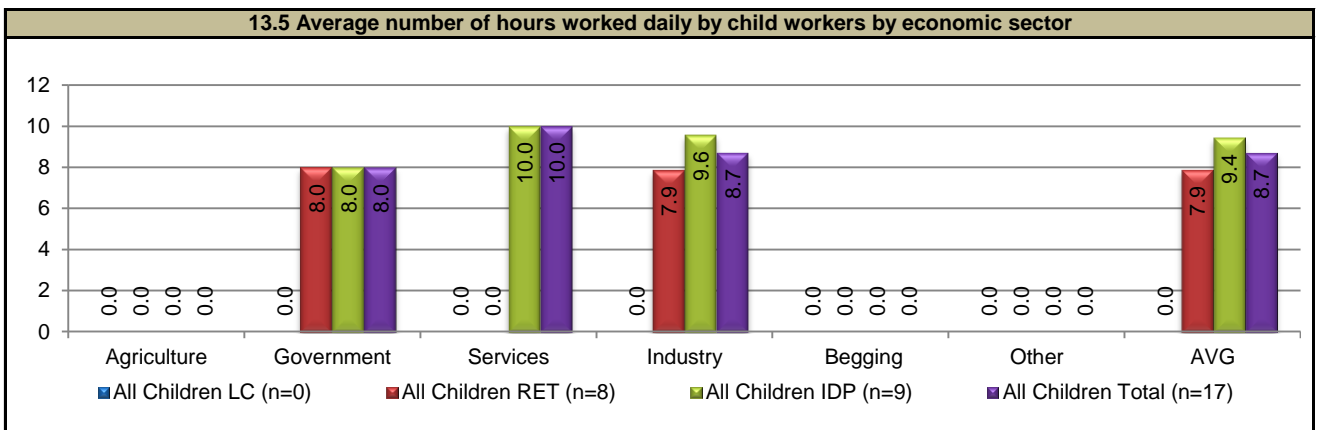
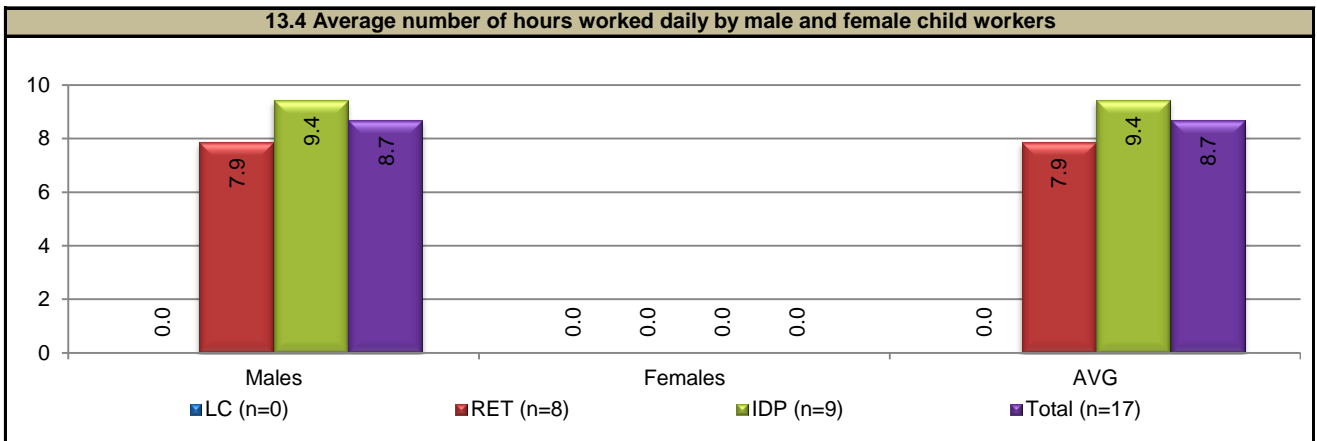

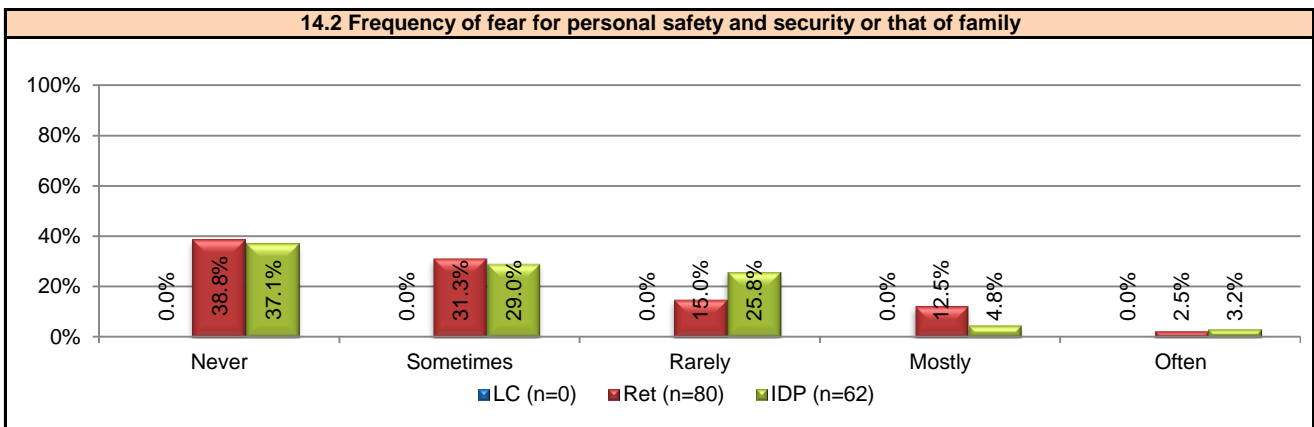
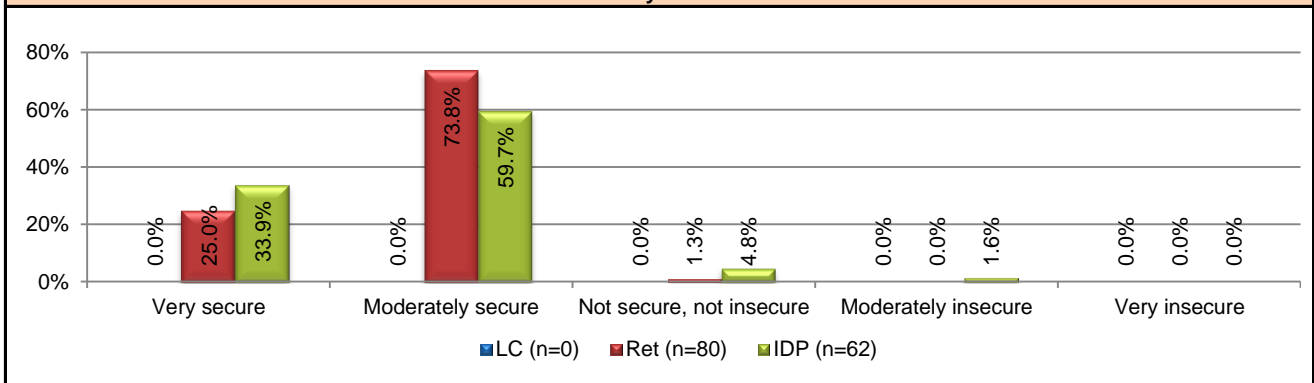
The security situation in the district was described as “moderately secure” by 73.8% of returnee households and 59.7% of IDP households. A further 33.9% of IDP households and 25.0% of returnee households described security in the area as “very secure.” However, 4.8% of IDP households and 1.3% of returnee households consider the district to be “not secure, not insecure”, while 1.6% of IDP households consider it to be “moderately insecure.”

In the region of 38.0% of households in both groups stated that they “never” fear for their personal safety or security or that of their family, while approximately 30.0% in both groups stated that they “rarely” do so. However, 12.5% of returnee households and 4.8% of IDP households reported “often” fearing for their safety.

Approximately two-thirds of households in both groups reported being “moderately satisfied” with policing in the district. A further 27.5% of returnee households and 24.2% of IDP households reported to be “very satisfied” with the police. IDP households (9.7%) were significantly more likely to be “not satisfied” with the police than returnee households (1.3%). However, 3.8% of returnee households also reported being “moderately dissatisfied” with policing in the district.

Five IDP households and two returnee households had experienced some form of violence in the three months prior to being surveyed.
