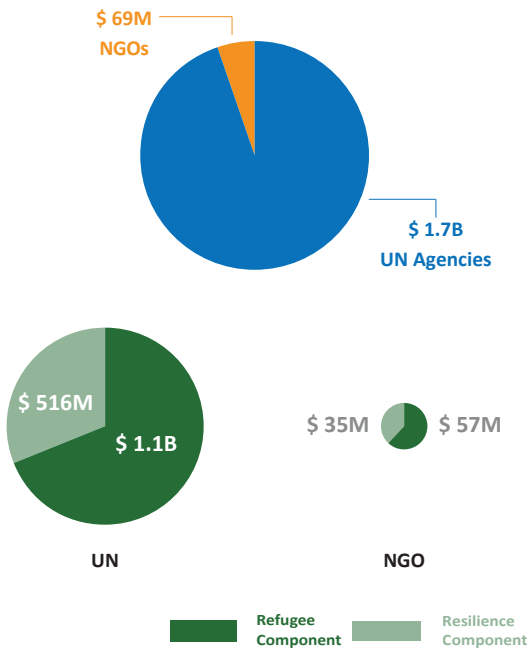

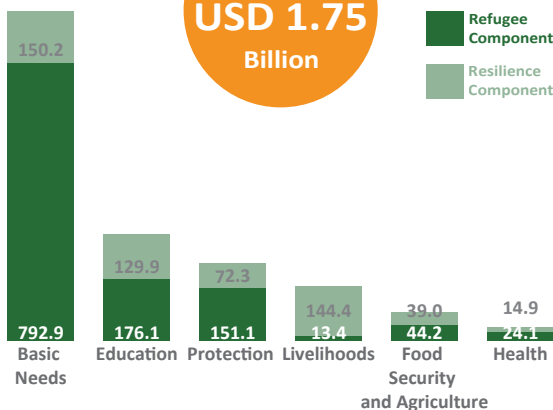

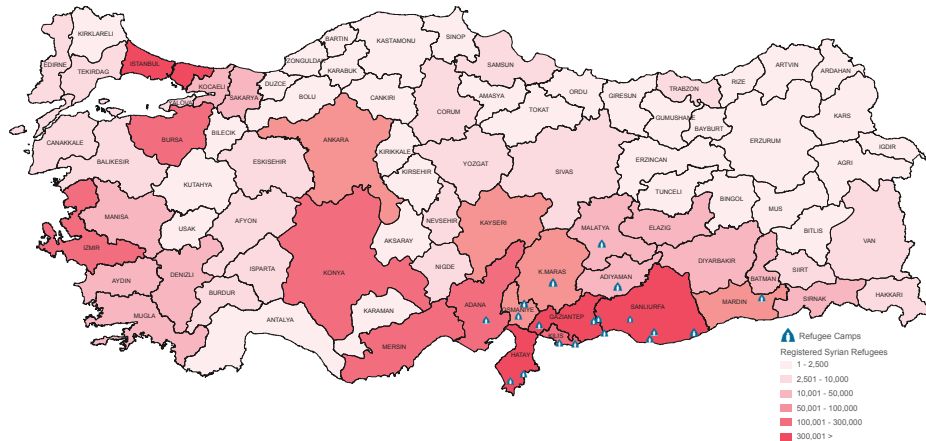


## 3RP Budget Requirements by Sector and Component (in million USD)

## Key Sector Objectives

### Protection

**\$ 223 Million**

- Access to territory and protection: Syrian refugees are able to access the territory and receive effective protection under the temporary protection legal framework.
- Community based protection (CBP): Community members are able to identify and lead the process to implement protection solutions, with particular attention to facilitating the participation of most at-risk groups and individuals.
- Prevention and response to gender based violence (GBV): Risks and consequences of GBV towards by Women, Girls, Boys and Men (WGBM) and those with specific needs are reduced and mitigated and access to quality GBV services is improved.
- Girls and boys affected by the Syria crisis have increased and more equitable access to quality child protection interventions and are protected from violence, exploitation, abuse and neglect.

### Food Security and Agriculture

**\$ 83 Million**

- Syrians under temporary protection are prevented from resorting to negative coping strategies as the most vulnerable men, women, and children are assisted to meet their food needs.
- Food security and access to livelihoods among Syrians under temporary protection are promoted through measures to restore or create income-generating opportunities in the agricultural sector.
- Local capacities are strengthened to improve community resilience and enhance Food Security and Agriculture through assessments, coordination, and information systems.

### Education

**\$ 305 Million**

- Ensure sustained access to formal, non-formal and informal education programmes for Syrian children under temporary protection, youth and adults in Temporary Accommodation Centers and host communities that are inclusive and promote life-long learning.
- Enhance the quality of education opportunities for Syrian children under temporary protection and youth in protective learning environments, living in Temporary Accommodation Centers and host communities.
- Support a resilient national education system to facilitate the provision of quality education to refugee and Turkish children and youth.

### Health

**\$ 39 Million**

- Strengthen the capacity of essential health service delivery and referral health care, including curative and preventative services for non-communicable and communicable diseases.
- Increase access to sexual and reproductive health (SRH) services, including clinical management of GBV cases for particularly vulnerable groups of Syrians under temporary protection and host communities (women, girls, adolescents and youth).
- Strengthen communicable disease surveillance, detection, response (EWARN), and prevention (including immunization); and strengthen all-hazard emergency response.
- Increase access to non-communicable disease (NCD), Mental Health and Psychosocial Support Services (MHPSS) and rehabilitation services at all levels of health services.

### Basic Needs

**\$ 943 Million**

- Improved living conditions of the most vulnerable Syrians under temporary protection in Temporary Accommodation Centres, urban, peri-urban and rural areas and of members of the host communities.
- Strengthened national and local capacities on delivery of welfare and basic services to enhance social cohesion through reduced competition over access to municipal services.

### Livelihoods

**\$ 157 Million**

- Improved livelihoods and living conditions, including better and decent work conditions for Syrians under temporary protection and host communities.
