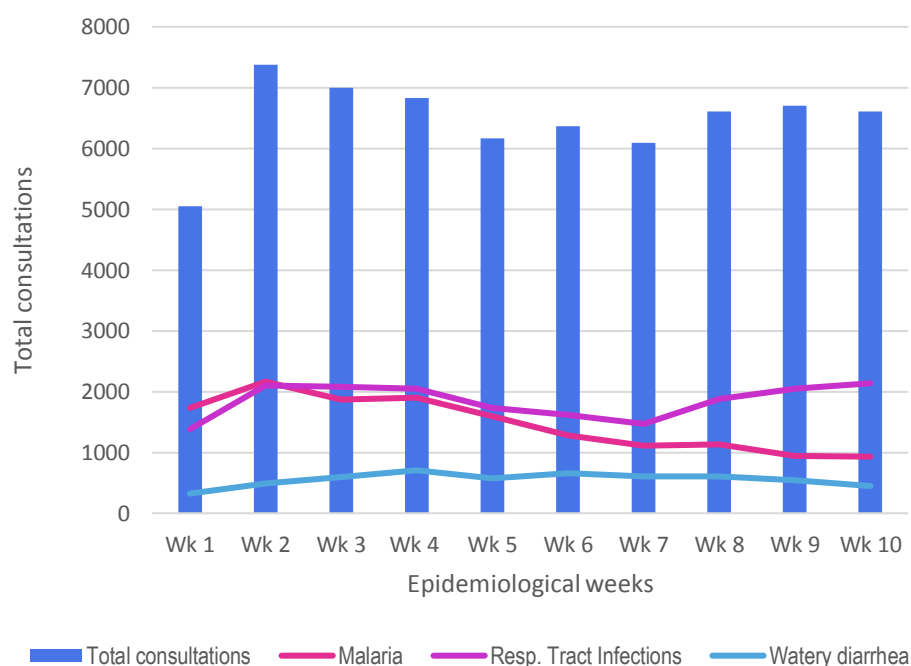

OPD Consultations

During the reporting period, a total of 6,612 OPD consultations were made compared to 6,705 reported the previous week.

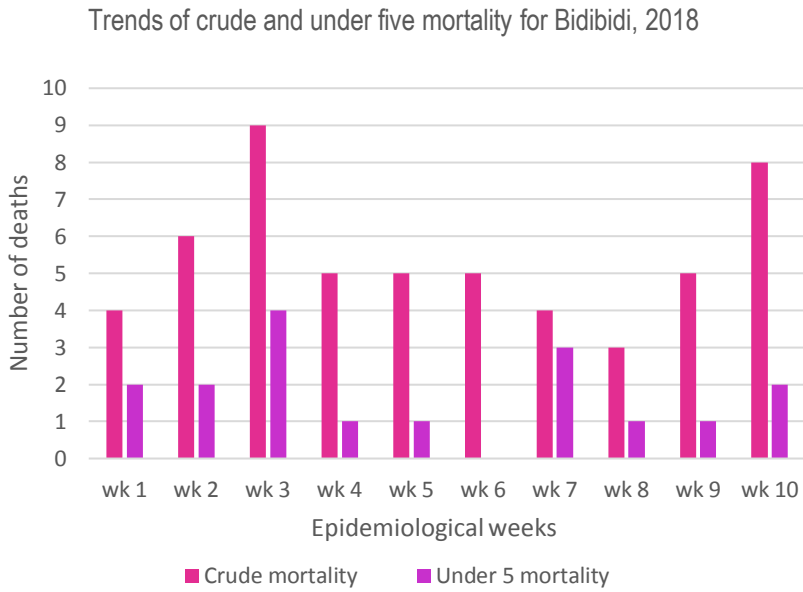
The leading causes of illness (proportional morbidity) were Acute Respiratory Tract Infections/RTI (25.6%), Malaria (11.1%) followed by Watery Diarrhoea/WD (5.3%); this implies that the three top disease conditions contributed about 42% of the total morbidity for the reporting week.

The incidences for Malaria, RTIs and watery diarrhoea this week are estimated at 3, 7 and 2 cases/1,000 persons/week respectively. One case of bloody diarrhoea was reported in Iyete;

One case of suspected measles was reported in Ayivu, samples were collected and sent to the Kampala; awaiting results.

No Typhoid was reported during the week.

▪ **Mortality:**



A total of eight (8) deaths (4 F; 4 M), including two (2) children under the age of five and two (2) elderly person above 60 years were registered (3- *Public Referral Health Facilities*; 4 *Settlement Facilities*, 1 *community*). Probable causes of deaths were as follows: Tuberculosis (1), Anaemia (1), Heart failure (3), Birth asphyxia (1), Neonatal sepsis (1), and septicaemia (1). The Crude Mortality Rate (CMR) and Under 5 mortality rates are estimated at 0.04 and 0.05 deaths/10,000/day respectively, which are both below the emergency threshold of 1 and 2 deaths/10,000/day respectively.

▪ **Mental Health and Psychosocial Support:**

Total number of consultations during the week were 154 (63 new cases and 91 revisits). Consultations were made for Epilepsy (111), Depression (16), Psychosis (20), Drug abuse (3), no suicide attempt or completed suicide was reported.

▪ **Reproductive Health, HIV/AIDS:**

Total for ANC 1 was 164, ANC 4 was 158 and PNC was 177, while 89 deliveries were conducted (with 12 deliveries by nationals). One hundred and eighty eight (188) mothers were tested during ANC; one tested positive and was linked to care. The Number of new clients enrolled on ART during this week is 1.

▪ **Expanded program for immunization, Vitamin A supplementation and deworming:**

A total of 216 doses of DPT 3 and equal doses for PCV3; 179 doses of measles and 147 doses of BCG were administered to children in the settlement; 322 doses of vitamin A supplements and 353 doses of deworming tablets were also given.

▪ **General updates**

- One suspected case of measles was reported in Ayivu-Zone 5, samples taken for analysis.
- Preparations for Hepatitis B vaccination ongoing; campaign expected to start on 19th March

▪ **Challenges**

- The heavy rains continued to disrupt health service delivery in temporary infrastructure; staff accommodation equally uninhabitable for staff since they are leaking

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Achievements: Narrative

- A total of **55** children aged 6-59 months were enrolled in the feeding programs in the reporting period (**2** in ITC, **7** in OTC and **46** in SFP). A total of **2,747** children were screened during the week.
- A total of **1,090** pregnant and lactating women were screened, only **07** was identified and enrolment into the SFP program.
- A total of **2,459** children aged 6-59 months were reached by MCHN while **1,438** Pregnant and Lactating women were reached.
- Nine (9) children under OTC recovered, one was transferred; No defaulters or deaths recorded.

Infant and Young Child Feeding:

- During this reporting period, a total of **69** mother-baby pairs accessed the 3 mother-baby areas of Yangani (**30**), Ombechi (**17**) and Kiranga (**22**).
- Out of the **69** mother-baby pairs mentioned above, **15** pairs were accessing MBAs for their first time this year while **54** came for follow up visits.
- All Mother- Baby pairs were assessed, those with breastfeeding difficulties received full assessment, and then one-on-one skilled counselling was offered. Mothers and caretakers without breastfeeding difficulties were given key messages concerning appropriate Infant and Young Child Feeding in Emergencies, and some came to breastfeed.
- A total of **92** homes were visited; 20 referrals were made, 10 for MBA services and 08 for ANC while 02 for medical services
