Uganda Refugee Response Plan (RRP) 2019-2020


Overview

The provision of general food assistance continued to meet the immediate food and nutrition needs of refugees, while strengthening their livelihoods and promoting food security. Refugees entering the country were provided with high-energy biscuits at the border crossing points and hot meals in reception centres. A settling-in ration was provided to refugees relocated to settlements, with subsequent monthly food or cash support.

Recognising the potential of cash-based transfers to improve people's food security, boost local markets and enhance cost-efficiencies, partners continued to scale up cash assistance, promoting refugees' self-reliance and stimulating local economies by opening up channels for cash flows. Partners continued to strengthen the overall food system in refugee-hosting areas, ensuring that food commodities were fairly priced, and working to improve the retail supply chain management in local markets.

As the first COVID-19 cases were registered in Uganda, WFP adapted its ways of operating to ensure uninterrupted lifesaving assistance to the most vulnerable populations, ensuring that programme implementation did not put beneficiaries at a higher risk of infection. In this context, WFP put in place different mitigation measures at refugee distribution centers, including physical distancing and the provision of handwashing facilities, health and temperature screening at the entrance to sites, abiding by all recommendations from local health authorities to protect the health and safety of the people it serves and its staff.





Households with poor or borderline Food Consumption Score




Objective: Targeted food assistance provided to the most vulnerable refugee households based on assessed needs
