Tabitha is a local Lebanese civil society actor, registered with the Ministry of Interior in Beirut since 2016.

Tabitha was established to support refugees and Lebanese host communities to deal with a large number of Syrian refugees.

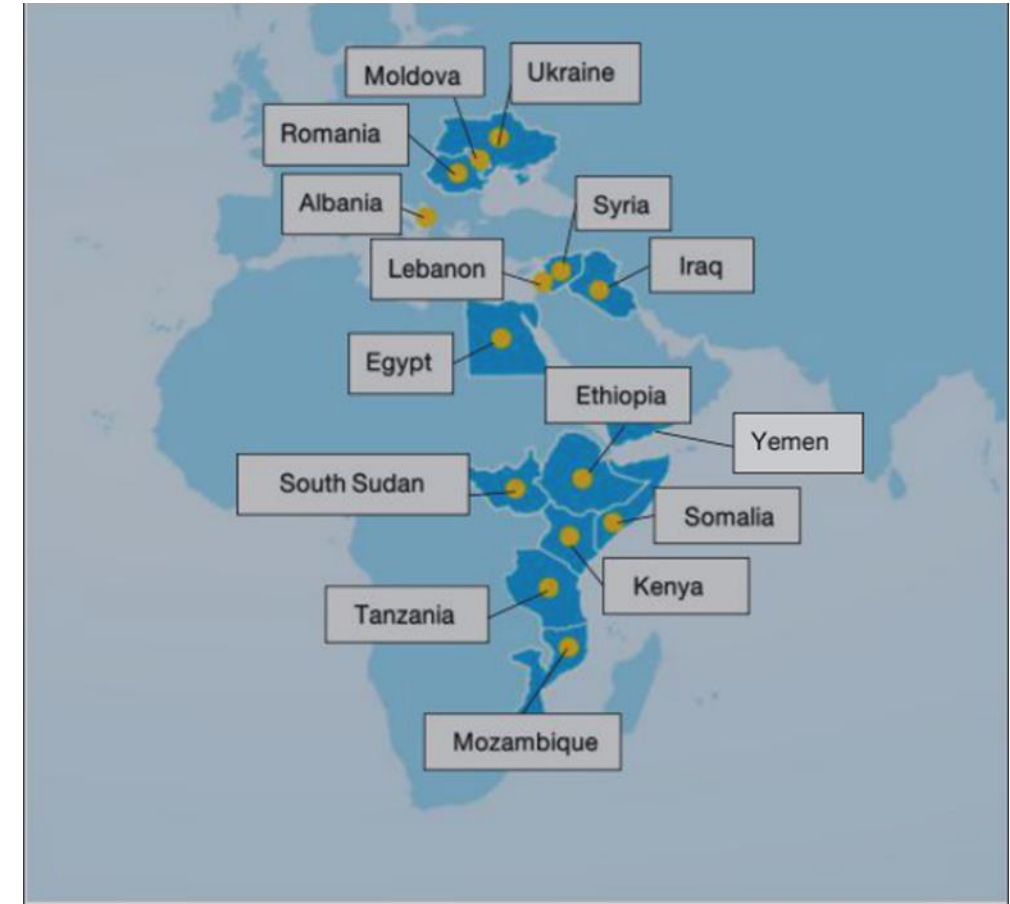

- Tabitha is part of the DORCAS network
- Both entities are strongly linked and work together for several years.
- Dorcas main office is in the Netherlands



Tabitha carries out several activities at the community centers in Batroun, Aley, and Achrafieh.

Activities include:

- Structured and focused psychosocial support
- Psychological follow up
- Case Management CP and GBV
- Child protection activities
- Social and legal counselling
- Awareness sessions
- Reproductive health in partnership with a local PHC in Aley
- Parenting support program
- Education activities (Homework support and language classes)
- Life skills trainings
- Group events
- Community engagement initiatives

At the **individual level**, by helping people unlock their potential.

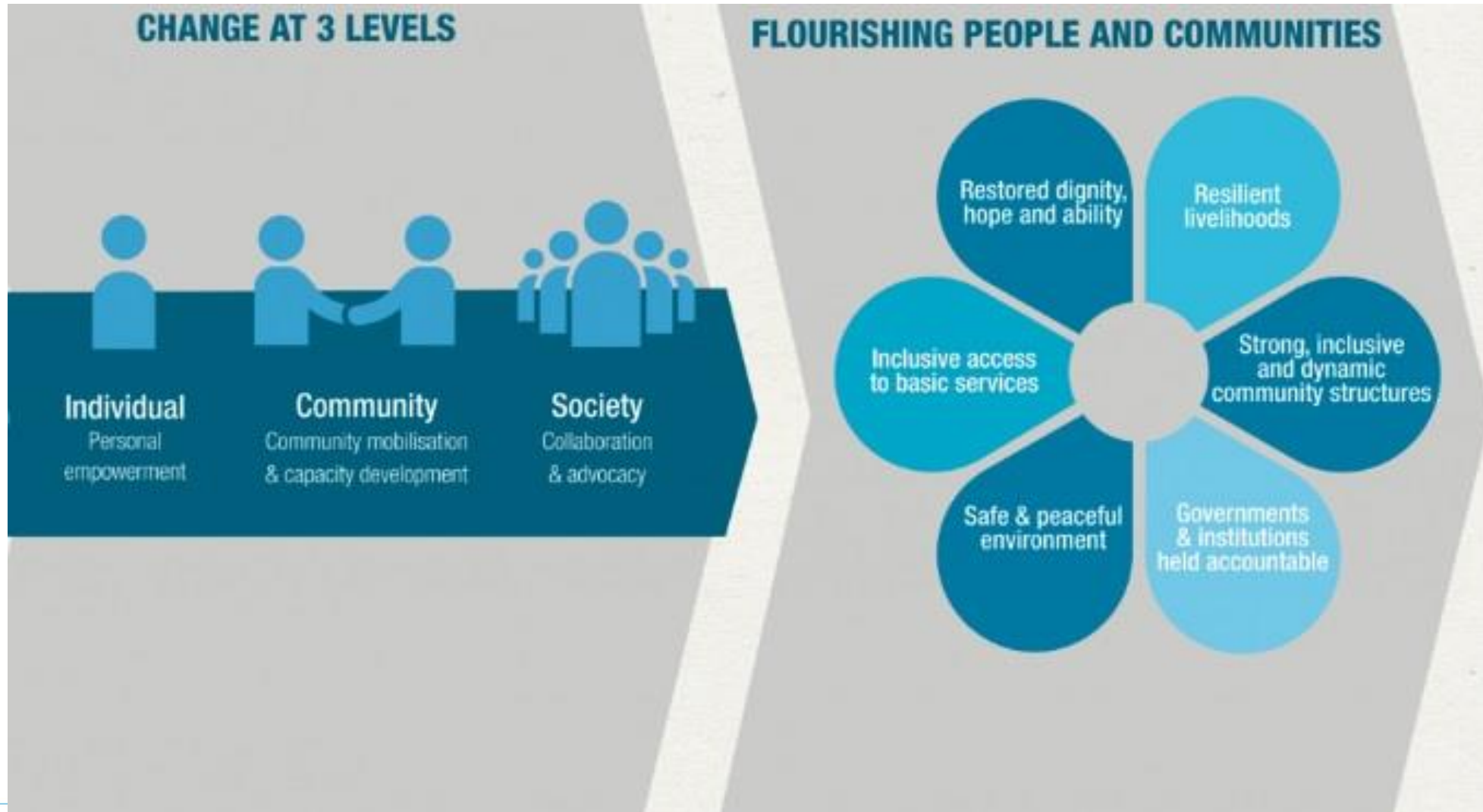
At the **community level**, by encouraging people to exercise their combined strengths.

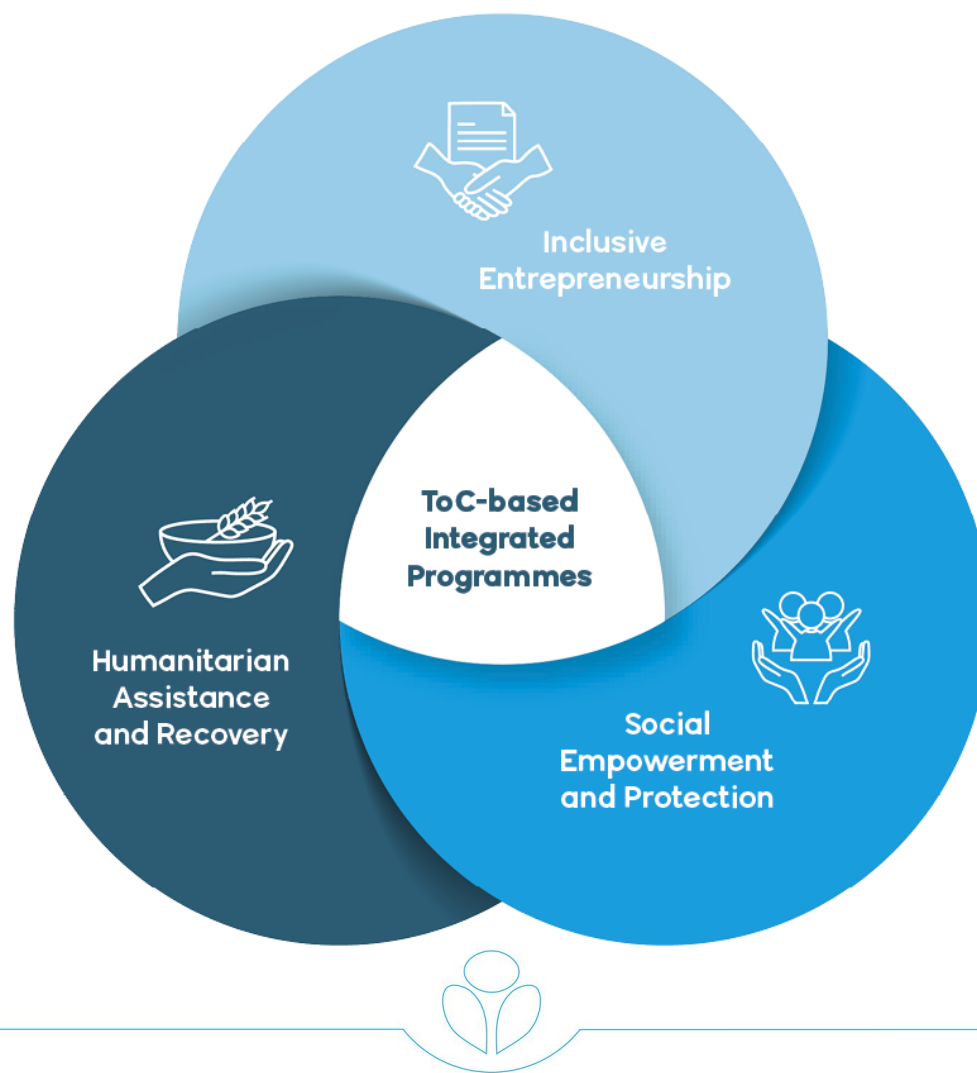

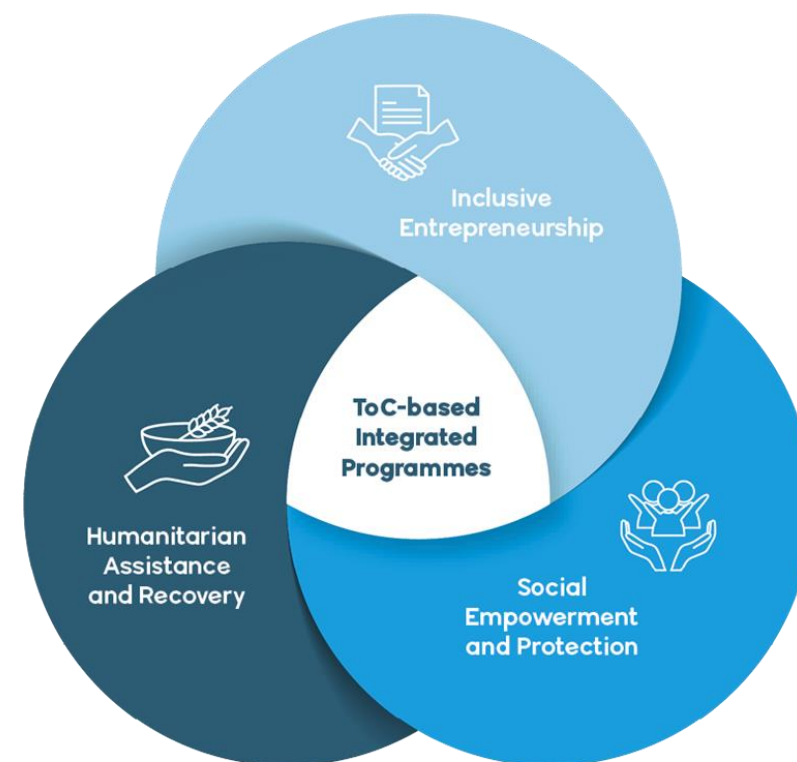


The 3 Programme concepts



The 3 Programme concepts

Dorcas/Tabitha aims at providing an integrated and holistic approach towards the beneficiaries. As an emergency response to the Beirut blast, Dorcas/Tabitha ensured to focus on the Humanitarian assistance and recovery, as well as protection activities. Furthermore, In order to cover the acute needs of the beneficiaries (based on FG discussions and needs assessments) and to enlarge the scope of activities especially in entrepreneurship, a project to support micro-businesses in the affected area was designed.



Beirut blast response

- Few days after the blast that occurred on August 4, 2020, Dorcas/Tabitha with local partners mobilized group of volunteers to conduct a rapid needs assessment
- The findings of the assessment were used to develop an action plan for the response
- Dorcas/Tabitha launched projects to support people affected by the blast



Beirut blast response



The projects aimed to provide people with resources to protect and start rebuilding livelihood assets, provide people with access to basic, safe, and dignified shelter solutions, ensure people are receiving an appropriate response, increase knowledge on the protection subject in focus, ensure that children are receiving specified support to their needs, and support local and national actors with capacity building.



Livelihood Project



- Supporting nano and micro businesses affected by Beirut blast.



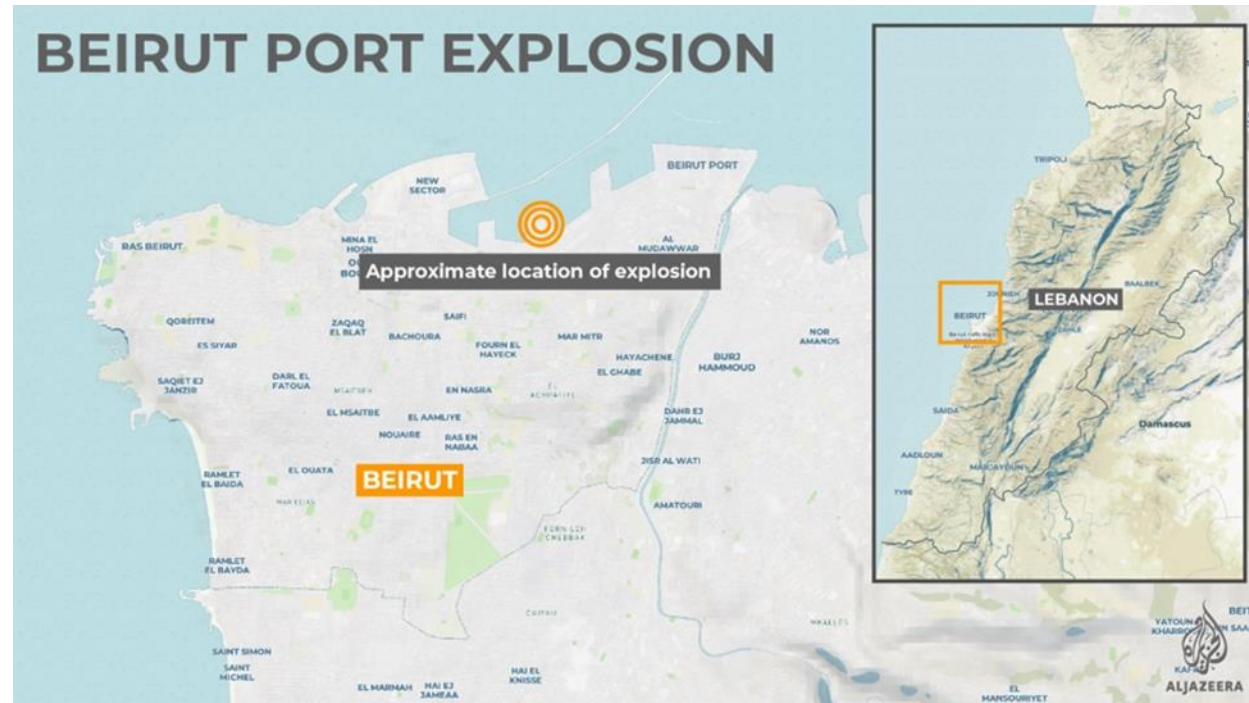
Overview of the livelihood Project

The newly launched project is a livelihood intervention that will support mainly nano and micro businesses that were affected by the blast. The project will support local businesses/MSME's, technicians, craftsmen working in local value chains, fresh graduates' technicians and youth specialized in digital services, women and youths specifically in the area of Bourj Hammoud and Achrafieh.

The project will strengthen the economic resilience of a group of selected entrepreneurs. It has an emphasis on youth and will prioritize women owned/led businesses.



Geographical area



Achrafieh neighborhoods in need (Karm el Zeitoun, Geitaoui, Gemmayze, Sioufi, Mar Mikhael and others) and **Nabaa-Bourj Hammoud**.



Activities

June, 2022 till October 31st, 2023 (16 months)

- 40 **MSME** to be supported with tools/equipment/raw material
- 10 experienced **technicians** to be supported with tools
- 10 fresh graduated **youths form technical schools** to take training on life skills and entrepreneurial skills + tools package + coaching
- 40 **women** to learn sewing skills and eco cooker fabrication, apprenticeship, and getting sewing machines
- Digital services to 20 beneficiaries from all above categories
- 20 **youths** to learn B.A.F.A certificate (or related certificate)
- A summer camp to be done for 60 **children**



What's an Eco-cooker or Wonderbag?



What's an Eco-cooker or Wonderbag?

The livelihood project will support 40 women, 10 each 3 months, for a period of one year, to learn sewing and how to produce an ecocooker or “wonderbag”.

Apprenticeship will be provided for interested beneficiaries.

Furthermore, each women will receive a sewing industrial machine to be able to start her own business at home.

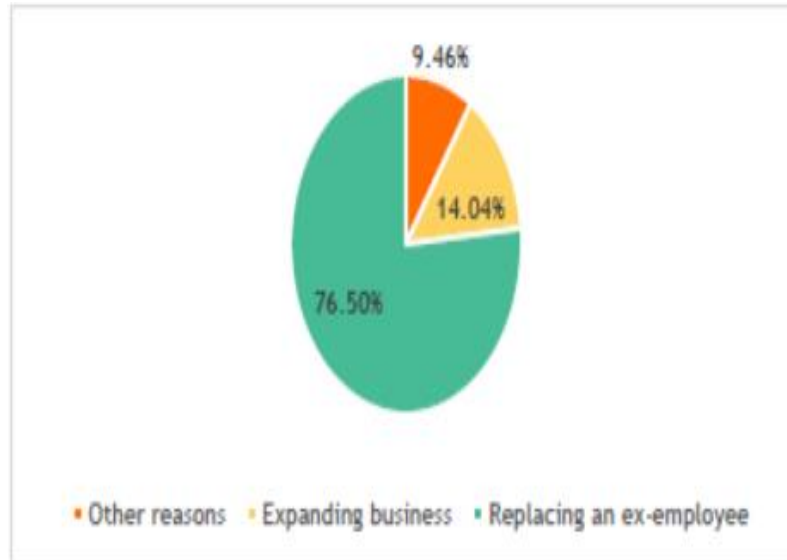

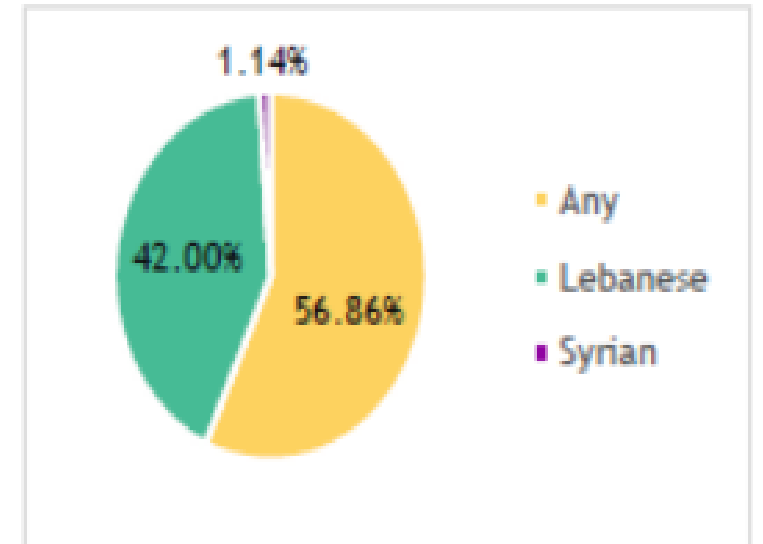

Summary

- Enhancing the supportive environment for girls and boys living in BML by integrating livelihoods and CP outcomes in order to achieve a CP goal.
 - In particular, WVLC will aim to support caregivers to build adequate and resilient livelihoods through income generation activities to prevent negative coping mechanisms such as child labor
- Cash transfer assistance on a monthly basis in the short term to allow HH to engage in the trainings without loss of income
- Support caregivers, local actors and faith leaders to apply and promote positive CP measures that ensure a safe environment for girls and boys in BML

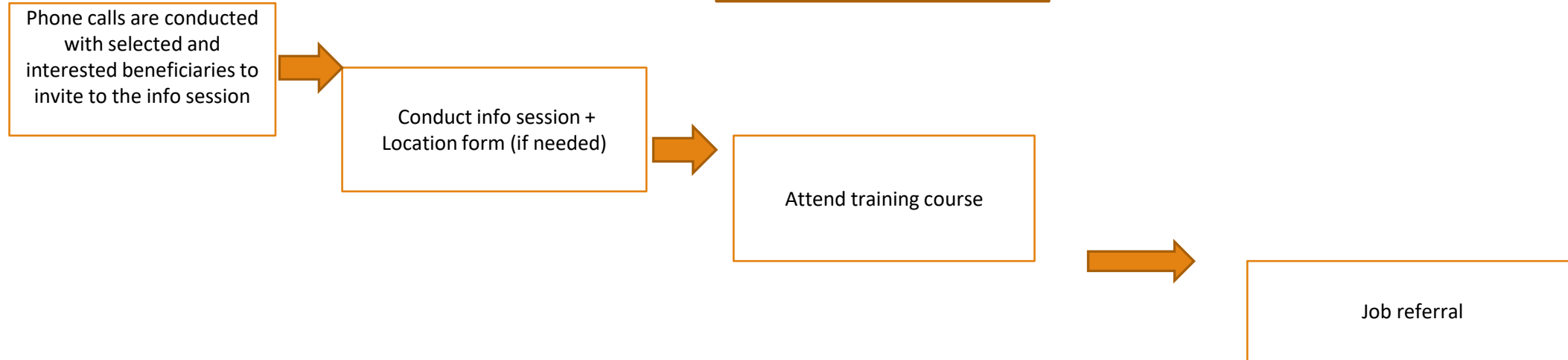

Outcome 2

2 . Positive CP measures that ensure a safe environment for children

- Partner with Community Based Organizations (CBOs), scout groups, Faith Based Organizations (FBOs), and/ or faith leaders in BML
- Train partners/ Facilitators on Caregivers Tool Box, which includes gender equality, Child Labour (worst forms of child labor) and Child Marriage topics and additional identified CP topics
- Register willing caregivers targeted under the livelihood component to be part of the caregivers toolbox activity
- Conduct workshop with partners on Qudwa approach and initiatives and support them in developing plans for implementation

Outcome 3

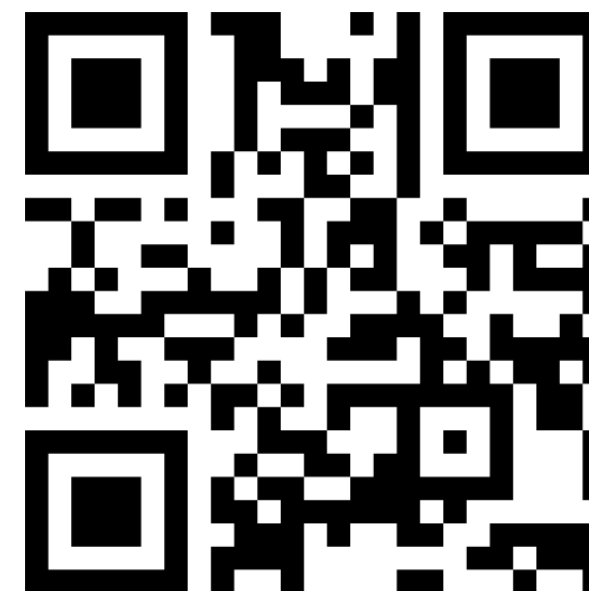
3 . Girls and Boys aged 6-18 years old are provided with skills to protect themselves from violence, abuse, neglect and exploitation

- Identify children and youth from CBOs, FBOs, and scouts to join the children councils
- Conduct meetings with children to form councils
- Conduct capacity assessment for the children
- Conduct trainings and meetings based on the needs that arose from the capacity assessment highlighting child labour risks
- Children councils plan for CP community initiatives to enhance the protection of children in the community (ex. Child labour prevention)
- Implement the community initiatives (one initiative per child council)
