2. Rationale

2.1 Background

The war between Russia and Ukraine began in 2014 and initially focused on the status of Crimea and Donbas. The conflict significantly expanded when Russia launched a full-scale invasion on Ukraine on 24 February 2022, causing Europe's largest refugee crisis since World War II². Since then, more than 8.4 million refugees have reportedly fled Ukraine, with over 4.3 million refugees arriving in Poland³. Till July 04, 1.19 million applied for PESEL (Personal Identification number) and received Temporary Protection status in the country, out of which 49% were women, 6% were men and 45% were children.⁴ The Temporary Protection Directive was invoked by European Commission on 03.03.2022 in response to the mass displacement caused by the conflict. In Poland it gives those who have fled Ukraine after the 24.02.2022 the right to 1 year of legal stay, legal work (without a need for work permit), free medical care and grants assistance through accommodation and meals or assistance in the form of a cash benefit.

Data collected by REACH between 28 February and 25 May indicated that 48% of respondents crossing the border to Poland considered it at their final intended destination; and 51% of those intended to stay in the country as long as the conflict in Ukraine continued⁵.

The overwhelming majority of refugees are residing in the host community; however, little to no information is currently available to response actors regarding their demographic profile, household composition, geographical presence, vulnerabilities, humanitarian needs, movement intentions, or coping capacities. Even less information is available regarding the Collective Sites both in terms of numbers and in terms of HHs composition and their needs. As REACH Border Monitoring shows, only 7% of refugees intended to stay in accommodation provided by authorities⁶. Similar results were reported in Wroclaw, where 8.6% interviewed refugees were residing in collective sites⁷.

2.2 Intended impact

REACH, in partnership with UNHCR, sectoral working groups, and cross-cutting working groups, plan to conduct a Multi-Sector Needs Assessment to ensure these response actors have the necessary evidence base to effectively respond to the needs of Ukrainian refugee households in Poland. Response partners will use this data to inform strategic planning and prioritize key areas and subsets of the refugee population that are found to be most vulnerable. Information regarding movement intentions will also support contingency planning efforts, in the event of various displacement scenarios that depend on how the conflict in Ukraine evolves. Moreover, partner organizations will use the data to 1) plan interventions that target cash and other assistance to those households found to be most in need, and 2) refer refugee households to appropriate service providers, such as job placement and skills training or protection specialists. Data about access to information and preferred means of information dissemination will also support response actors with community engagement, outreach, and improve overall accountability mechanisms.

3. Methodology

3.1 Methodology overview

The assessment will consist of two key stages, namely a desk review of available data about the refugee population in Poland and then a primary data collection. Design of indicators and survey questions will be conducted in consultation with MSNA partners and coordinated through the Information Management Working group, which is led by UNHCR.

Due to lack of complete data on location and profile of refugees residing in Poland, PESEL registration data will be used as a proxy indicator for sampling for non-probability quota sampling for refugees residing in host community. Although not generalizable with a known level of statistical precision, it will still generate indicative findings with high level of representation. For refugees living in Collective Sites, non-probability sampling will be used, based on so far known list of CSs in Poland.

Additional disaggregation of data based on demographic variables will also be considered, such as households with children or households with vulnerable members, if final sample sizes for these population subsets are large enough.

Definitions:

- Collective Site: designated existing facility with infrastructure where basic services are available, a type of accommodation established by the Polish authorities, private entities or NGOs to provide shelter to refugees. The types of facility can include public places (schools, community centers, community centers), religious building, hotel/touristic complex, exhibition center, etc.
- Voivodeship (Województwo): level 1 territorial-administrative unit. There are 16 voivodeships in Poland.

Primary data collection will be conducted through a structured household survey tool, implemented among a sample of Ukrainian refugee households living in Poland. The two strata will consist of refugee households residing in host community (outside the collective sites) and those residing in Collective Sites (CSs). Humanitarian community believes that situation of these two groups is significantly different and therefore should be analyzed independently.

3.2 Population of interest

The population of interest includes all refugee households who have been displaced from Ukraine to Poland and registered to obtain PESEL number (the national identification number used in Poland) or intend to do so. The assessment will not aim to include refugees who only transit through Poland and plan to settle down in another country. The assessment might include non-Ukrainian refugee HHs fleeing the war, however, due to small number of Third Country Nationals (TCNs) identified during surveys⁸⁹, we anticipate that they will constitute only a minor part of the sample.

The sample will include two distinct population groups: refugees living in host community, outside of the collective sites (CSs), and refugees residing in CSs. Refugees living outside of CSs will cover a variety of accommodation types, including private accommodation, being hosted by family, friends, or by Polish families, among others. The unit of measurement will primarily be the hosted refugee-household level, with specific indicators measured at the individual level through a roster approach.

It is important to note that very little data is currently available regarding the refugee population residing in Poland. Refugees that wish to stay in Poland on a middle or long-term basis need to register to get a PESEL number, which grants them the temporary protection in the country. Persons benefiting from temporary protection may legally stay in Poland for 1 year, they are provided with accommodation, food and medical care, they may work in Poland without a permit and run a business, they are also entitled to social assistance benefits. PESEL registration process is managed by municipal entities, under the supervision of the Ministry of the Interior and Administration in Poland. While there is data available on refugees who applied and were granted PESEL number, it does not reflect the current structure of refugees' localization. The availability of settlement-level data about the exact location of refugee households, as well as age and sex disaggregated data remains unclear. Moreover, challenges in collecting and consolidating this data are expected throughout the implementation of the methodology, largely due to the fluid nature of the crisis, which is still in an emergency phase.

3.3 Secondary data review

The directed review of secondary data was conducted in June 2022 on country-specific literature and programme documents regarding the response on the Ukraine crisis. The review considered NGOs and UN assessments, activity reports, situation reports, official government sources and figures, and also reports from news outlets. Key repositories searched include the UNHCR Operational Data Portal – Ukraine Refugee situation, ReliefWeb, and REACH Resource Centre – Ukraine. Specific NGO, UN, and government websites were also searched, links to which are included in the SDR summary (see Annex 1).

3.4 Primary Data Collection

Method

Household survey

A team of REACH enumerators will collect data in person through household surveys with the Ukrainian head of household or another adult member of the refugee family who agrees to respond on behalf of the head of household. Interview responses will be recorded digitally using Kobo Collect. Data collection teams will primarily be comprised of female enumerators, as the large majority of the adult refugee population in Poland are believed to be women. Interviews will be conducted nationwide. See sampling section below for further details on how data collection locations will be selected.

Sampling

A target sample size of approx. 1200 households is estimated to be interviewed in total.

Strata 1: Households residing in CSs:

To be updated in August, depending on status of Site Monitoring.

For refugees living in collective sites (CS), non-probability quota sampling will be used, based on currently known list of CSs in Poland. The list is not exhaustive and therefore collective sites in the areas with the highest numbers of PESEL registration will be chosen for data collection across all the voivodeships, to ensure nation-wide coverage. To the extent possible, so in regions where list of CSs is available, the sites for data collection will be chosen on a random basis. CSs with a refugee population of less than 20 individuals will be excluded. The number of families will be estimated based on the population size in each CSs (if known) divided by the average family size, which is estimated to be 3.5 members. A sample of

approximately 100 families (with 10% buffer in the event of non-response) will be drawn including the numbers of interviews to be conducted in sites across all 16 voivodships in Poland.

Strata 2: Households residing outside of CSs:

Due to the volatility of the situation and the lack of population data on refugees, a final list of population estimates will be drafted based on the reported number of Ukrainians registering for PESEL number.

Non-probability quota sampling will be employed for refugee households in host communities. Given that non-probability sampling is applied, the sample size for this stratum is set at the relatively high level of approximately 1100 in order to ensure the significance and generalization of the findings. PESEL registration data will be used as proxy indicator for quotas for each admin 1 area (voivodeship), in order for the number of surveys per each voivodeship to correspond with the registration numbers. The process of estimating the number of households will be the same as in CSs, which will divide the number of registered refugees in each voivodship by the average family size which is 3.5 members.

Primary data will be collected as follows:

- In large settlements (Warsaw, Krakow, Poznan, Wroclaw, Lublin and others), respondents will be interviewed by enumerators at locations where Ukrainians are most likely to attend such as aid distribution centers, PESEL registration venues, schools, public parks, etc. The Assessment Officer, in collaboration with the Field Officers, will draft a list of this locations, which will be shared with the enumerators. The locations will be randomly selected at the beginning of each day of data collection. Enumerators will be instructed to interview every third individual encountered in order to ensure some degree of randomization of the respondents.
- For all the settlements outside these major urban areas, the Assessment and Field Officers will conduct a community mapping exercise in order to identify potential locations to interview Ukrainian families. Same as in large settlements, due to lack of information of location of refugees, there will be locations most often attended by Ukrainians. Enumerators will be instructed to travel to those locations and interview every third individual encountered in order to ensure some degree of randomization of the respondents.

3.5 Data Processing & Analysis

A data cleaning SOP will be generated prior to the start of data collection, built off of the Minimum Standard Data Cleaning Checklist developed by IMPACT HQ, to guide data checking, cleaning, and consolidation processes, as well as indicator-specific parameters. Data cleaning will be carried out by the data officer (DO) on a daily basis. The dataset will be verified through manual data checks and data cleaning, particularly during the initial days of data collection.

The MSNA Assessment Officer and Field Officer will hold daily morning briefings with the enumerator team to review data collection procedures and flag any issues from field spot checks and data cleaning checks. Specific data that are deemed inconsistent will be highlighted and shared with the relevant enumerator for clarification/rectification. These inquiries will be logged in a shared spreadsheet in which focal points for each base will provide responses. All changes will then be made and logged by the AO/DO. All issues raised during data collection will be addressed during the concurrent data cleaning phase and recorded in a log that enables retracing of cleaning steps.

Data analysis: Prior to data analysis, a framework will be developed and agreed upon with all sectoral partners, to identify the priority indicators to be cleaned and analyzed before the full dataset is cleaned and analyzed. Analysis will be carried out using R Studio statistical software for both the priority and the full analysis. Once the data analysis has been carried out, the dataset will be made available to external partners to enable use of data for further analysis. A full data analysis framework outlining the level of analysis feasible with each indicator will be included as an annex to this TOR.

Analysis will be conducted at the national level for all population groups: refugee households in CSs and refugee households in host communities. Additional analysis, including disaggregation by households with children versus households without, households with vulnerable members, etc. will be conducted for priority indicators agreed with UNHCR and other relevant partners, if possible. Depending on the final sample size for disaggregated subsets of the population, it will be noted whether these findings can be considered statistically generalizable or if they are to be considered indicative only.

Background

The war between Russia and Ukraine began in 2014 and initially focused on the status of Crimea and Donbas. The conflict significantly expanded when Russia launched a full-scale invasion on Ukraine on 24 February 2022, causing Europe's largest refugee crisis since World War II. Since then, more than 8.4 million refugees have reportedly fled Ukraine, with over 4.3 million refugees arriving in Poland. Till July 04, 1.19 million applied for PESEL (Personal Identification number) and received Temporary Protection status in the country, out of which 49% were women, 6% were men and 45% were children. Data collected by REACH between 28 February and 25 May also indicated that 48% of respondents crossing the border to Poland considered it at their final intended destination; and 51% of those intended to stay in the country as long as the conflict in Ukraine continued.

Methodology

This secondary data review list was completed by conducting a search of available information on the refugee situation in Poland. Data was considered since the onset of the crisis in late February 2022. The review considered NGO and UN assessments, activity reports, situation reports, official government sources and figures, and also reports from news outlets.

Key repositories searched include the <u>UNHCR Operational Data Portal – Ukraine Refugee situation</u>, <u>ReliefWeb</u>, and <u>REACH Resource Centre – Ukraine</u>. Specific NGO, UN, and government websites were also searched, links to which are included throughout this document.
