- Effective response of the state to a mass displacement;
- Safe evacuation of IDPs and addressing their humanitarian needs;
- Adaptation of IDPs in host communities;
- Integration and development of IDPs in host communities;
- Support of a safe return to a place of residence.
- Provisions on the collective sites:
  - Phased resettlement of IDPs from CSs and necessary actions to implement thig goal with the involvement of local authorities;
  - Ensuring CSs meet accessibility requirements;
  - Refurbishments and reparation works in CS;
  - Ensuring decent living conditions in CSs for all IDPs;
  - Organising systematic psychological assistance to IDPs residing in CSs;
  - Definition of the concept "collective site" (including location, occupancy and source of funding);
  - Identifying state authorities responsible for establishment and functioning of CSs; Developing a set of action points for IDPs accommodation in CSs and ensuring the proper functioning of CSs;
  - Formation of housing stocks for IDPs.

## **Sub-National updates:**

#### Western hub

- Significant increase in sites charging IDPs for stay coverage of utility bills. Partners agreed to conduct a desk analysis on this issue.
- Need in comprehensive housing solution strategy (dormitories, social housing).
   Many IDPs still reside in non-housing stock (kindergartens, schools, rehab centers, sanatoriums, sports centers, restaurants, houses of culture, and non-residential buildings).
- Identified need for standardized Rules of stay to prevent spontaneous evictions.
- The need to provide in individual case management and PSS.
- Regular data cross-checks with oblast authorities on the number of CCs, occupancy, and availability to host.

### Central Hub

 Odesa: Participation in the OCHA GCM for Odesa - Since the data that were presented by the oblast authorities are different from the data based on Round 7 monitoring, the crosschecking of the data was initiated.

- **Chernivtsi:** As a result of the meeting with the oblast authorities for the same crosschecking exercise of the data was initiated. Cluster meetings on oblast level and bilateral meetings with Cluster partners are organized on the regular basis.
- Vinnytsia: Online Cluster meeting on Central hub took place last week platform for exchange of practices/trends Cluster meetings on oblast level and bilateral meetings with Cluster partners are organized on the regular basis.

### Eastern hub

- **OCHA-led field monitoring mission** to Kharkivska oblast (4 vulnerable hromadas Pisichyn, Liubotyn, Merefa and Vysokyi) took place last week. 4 CS are operating in mentioned hromadas, all covered by latest round of CSM. Assessment of humanitarian response in progress.
- **"Service providers meeting"** pilot ongoing in Kharkivska oblast. Now on the stage of compiling data: poor partners response to the data entry request.
- Frequent data requests from humanitarian actors from other sectors: sub-national data provision and cooperation with other clusters.
- Sub-national cluster meeting, regular oblast-level partners meetings and ad-hoc bilateral partners meetings took place last month.

### IM updates: Presentation of the 2023 5W Dashboard and results of the Q1 reporting:

## Summary of achievement by partners (Jan – Mar)

- The West hub had the highest number of beneficiaries, followed by the East and Central hubs.
- A total of over 75,000 people were reached in Jan, Feb, and Mar.
- Lviv oblast had the highest number of beneficiaries, followed by Dnipro and Chernivetska oblast.
- Partners were present at 17 oblasts.
- CCCM partners covered 491 CSs.

## Take aways from 1st reporting cycle

- A new template for bulk-upload has been developed and shared with partners.
- Bilateral sessions related to ActivityInfo reporting are available with Cluster IMOs (Ukr, Eng) for upon requests by partners.
