Review of previous Action Points:

1	CCCM Cluster will follow up with CCCM Governorate FP on the implementation of contingency planning specific for their governorate.	Al Hodaidah, Taiz WC/ Taiz City, Lahj : done. Aden, Aldhaleah, Hadramout, Shabowah; pending.
2	Health Cluster to share health service mapping with contacts of the focal point in health facilities and partners working in districts to facilitate referrals between CCCM and health actors.	Done , the Health Cluster share the service mapping, along with the RRT FPs, however, awaiting to receive health facilities contact information for head of Health offices at the district level with CCCM cluster.
3	ExU to convene a dedicated Task Force to design and implement an IDP tracking mechanism. DTM, Protection cluster, and CCCM should participate. ExU will lead the initiative.	Pending , ExU is awaiting to have a baseline data which they will get following the implementation of the IDPs profiling exercises.
4	ExU Main Office to support in advocating for the cleaning fund's commitment and on securing necessary resources for the solid waste disposal initiative in Alrebat IDP site.	Meeting was conducted, cleaning fund complaint about the existence of human excrement among the solid waste which they cannot dispose. It was agreed on conducting awareness sessions and cleaning camping prior to securing necessary resources for the solid waste

		disposal initiative in Alrebat IDP site. Tayabah foundation is committed to do the cleaning camping, however awaiting confirmation from their donor, UNICEF.
5	CCCM Cluster partners to share a document highlighting the main CCCM achievements and activities during 2023.	Ongoing Received from DRC, IOM, FMF, NMO.
6	GWQ will coordinate with humanitarian cells, Adel Al Masaudi, to determine the availability of ESKs and report back.	Done, Humanitarian cell mentioned that they don't have stocks and they response only on shocks or sudden incident.
7	ExU together with CCCM, Protection cluster and other key actors to redefine the criteria for identifying internally displaced persons (IDPs) in the current protracted context.	CCCM engaged with the ExU, and protection cluster who mentioned, instead of re defining the displacement criteria which is already clear, which obsolete either by death, migration, or the announcement of the end of the war, IDP description is associated with IDPs rights upon their return. Thus, we need to work on case by case by providing guidance on the best practices to address the issues that service providers face. ExU mentioned that displacement does not give the status of entitlement, which means not all IDPs are entitled for humanitarian assistances.
8	NRC to reach out to Dr. Ahmed Al Ansari, ExU IM, to cross-check new arrivals to NRC managed sites in Abyan against the existing records of IDPs within the governorate.	Pending
9	CCCM Cluster will contact FSAC coordinator to address this documentation issue and ensure all eligible IDPs receive the food support.	Ongoing , CCCM cluster talked to FSAC cluster, FSAC is trying to schedule a meeting with WFP which not yet scheduled due to some conflicting priorities. Worth to mention PC has escalated this topic at national level, where WFP requested that IDPs can raise their concern through WFP channels. CCCM/FSAC and Protection will meet with WFP next Sunday.

Cholera cases tracking, referrals, and response

The CCCM Cluster presented the Early Warning System (EWS) report issued by the Health Cluster, indicating that Aden and Lahj, followed by Taiz, are among the governorates significantly affected by cholera cases. The CCCM Cluster emphasized the critical importance of monitoring cases in IDP sites, stressing that timely reporting is essential for an effective cholera response.

The CCCM Cluster highlighted the importance of prioritizing the awareness sessions and cleaning campaigns, to be conducted by WASH service providers or CCCM partners in the absence of WASH service providers. CCCM cluster shared soft copies of the awareness messages prepared by health ministry and health cluster, for hard copies, CCCM will check with UNICEF, health and wash cluster once needed and required by the partner.

Additionally, the CCCM Cluster urged all partners to adhere to the established referral pathways in coordination with the Health and WASH Clusters. To facilitate efficient reporting, the CCCM Cluster developed a cholera matrix, enabling partners to report Acute Watery Diarrhea (AWD) cases through an online Excel sheet. This tool was discussed and adapted during the meeting to fit the current dynamics and context. The reporting will occur weekly on Thursdays; however, in the event of a sudden outbreak, immediate reporting is required. This tool will help in highlighting the hotspot IDP sites, where a prompt intervention is needed by health and Wash partners.

The CCCM Cluster also shared the Rapid Response Team (RRT) contact list, allowing partners to directly refer cases to health facilities.

Flood response

CCCM cluster is using MET Rainfall Assessments in the early warning for coming rains and floods.

CCCM mentioned that there is currently no clear plan for the 2024 YHF flood response from OCHA.

Despite good collaboration between ExU and CCCM partners on reporting and coordination, there have been inconsistencies in flood figures reported, particularly in Hadramout. To address this, CCCM is seeking partner input on how to unify reporting practices. These discrepancies create confusion among stakeholders like clusters, service providers, and donors.

ExU and partners suggest establishing dedicated committees at flood-prone sites. These committees would comprise representatives from CCCM partners and ExU FPs. This Committee should be well trained on how to conduct the assessments, it would ensure accurate flood damage reporting. ACTED successfully piloted this approach in three frequently flooded locations.

In addition, CCCM cluster favors a governorate-level committee for improved coordination during flood events. This committee would involve CCCM partners, ExU, and at least two deployed FPs responsible for on-site damage assessments. To implement this approach, the CCCM cluster will provide a one-pager guide on establishing these flood reporting committees.

While ExU acknowledges the reporting efforts on flood incidents and damage, they emphasize the need for stronger advocacy to secure a more robust response.

CCCM Clusters sites shared the flood severity, and flood mitigation matrix to CCCM partners, CCCM cluster is requesting to priorities providing feedbacks to the matrix shared by the cluster partners.

AP: CCCM partners to provide feedback to the flood severity matrix shared by the cluster partners.

CCCM cluster capitalize on the good work done by CCCM partners on reporting flood reports, however there is lack on providing or reporting the response data. CCCM heightened the importance of this reports as it aim for further advocacy and that cluster is much depending on it for strategic decisions.

Ex. Unit/ CCCM Cluster & Partners challenges and updates

CCCM cluster

The CCCM cluster informed partners about a recent MoPIC meeting involving all clusters, UN agencies, and organizations. Two key points emerged:

- **Monitoring and Evaluation with Authority Involvement:** There will be a focus on improving monitoring and evaluation processes, with greater collaboration between humanitarian actors and local authorities.
- **Early Warning Committee:** A committee led by Civil Defense, MoPIC, and OCHA will be established to provide guidance and coordinate early warning systems. The CCCM cluster requested OCHA's inclusion of CCCM and ExU in this committee, as IDP sites are highly vulnerable to floods and rains.

Follow-up details on these action points are pending, but the CCCM cluster will provide updates once available.

ExU reported on the flood response across Hadramout, Al Mahrah, Abyan, Shabwah, Al Jawaf, Taiz, and Ad Dali governorates. While most responses were done through the RRM, some areas in Hadramout, Shabwah, and Al Jawaf received assistance from BCHR and YRCs. Unfortunately, no response has yet reached Ad Dali governorate.

ExU highlighted coordination challenges with certain partners, including HA and BCHR, who haven't yet submitted their sub-agreements with ExU.

DRC is launching a new partnership initiative with national CCCM partner, NMO. DRC piloted this in Lahj, where DRC will provide a grant for the national partner to manage the sites, mainly for the soft activities.

SHS reported difficulties conducting site maintenance in Aksharkha, Al Khazan, and Al Mudalal IDP sites due to unresolved HLP issues. Specifically, the lack of land agreements for these sites is hindering maintenance activities. ExU will investigate this matter further with their FPs to find a solution.

AP: ExU will follow up with their FPs on HLP issues in Shabwah IDP sites.

DRC requested the CCCM cluster's assistance in contacting the health cluster to identify cholera treatment centers specifically located in Aden.

AP: CCCM cluster to request the health cluster to provide the CTC/DTC mapping.

DRC expressed concern regarding the lack of support from the cleaning fund in Lahj, despite their significant efforts mobilizing IDPs. They believe the cleaning fund should play a more active role in garbage collection. DRC sought support from the Aden ExU to facilitate their engagement with the Aden cleaning fund. However, ExU informed them that the cleaning fund structures in Lahj and Aden differ.
