Review of previous Action Points:

Done, WFP confirmed the process is aimed at mapping the beneficiaries lacking Identification Cards, and advocate for solutions to address it. WFP is not allowed to use the biometric data and through such process they are trying to mitigate the risk of redundant data and duplications. There will also be a follow- up round where IDPs can report missing IDs to ensure no one is excluded due to verification. WFP confirmed they are not aiming to exclude any IDP as a result of this verification process.
5	CCCM cluster will provide a one- pager guide on establishing the flood reporting committees.	Pending

Flood/outbreaks; tracking, referrals, and response in the IDP sites

The CCCM cluster presented their flooding dashboard and highlighted a critical gap i.e. a lack of reported responses for flood incidents. This creates a blind spot – it's unclear if no interventions are planned, or if a response is simply not being reported. To address this, the cluster highlighted the need to close the loop, to enable for escalating the unmeet gaps.

CCCM cluster partners advocated for adding a "Planned" status in the incidents form for planned interventions currently listed as "Pending" while in reality it is "Planned". This distinction clarifies that action is planned, not neglected by CCCM partners.

No significant increase in the cholera cases, week 22 showed a decrease in the cholera cases, based Early Warning System (EWS) report issued by the ministry of health and health cluster.

CCCM cluster mentioned a slight modification for the cholera tracker form to include more outbreaks. This comes based on a request from UNICEF to CCCM cluster, as UNICEF referred that they can provide more support and advocacy to health units that they are funding to target IDPs. CCCM cluster highlighted that UNICEF is looking to more collaboration with CCCM, though providing awareness sessions and trainings to site community committees to role out future compaingsn, but also to receive information and updates for the CCs.

Ex. Unit/ CCCM Cluster & Partners challenges and updates

ExU highlighted there is a threat from the landowner, ExU identified a new land for IDPs to move, and requested CCCM cluster to carry out a MCLSA. CCCM should some constraints on the resources of establishing a new camp. CCCM also highlighted that cluster referred the case to HLP working group, CCCM cluster will follow up with HLP WG coordinator to understand the status of the MCLSA request.

For Aden, two buildings in Aden were emptied from IDPs, and delivered to authorities and local administration in the districts, i.e. Ammar Bin Yasser School, and juvenile bulding, however there is some damages in the bukdings which requires some fixations and rehabilitation. CCCM cluster mentioned there is a an activity under CCCM which is the decommissioning, however there is no clear guidelines on how to conduct the decommissioning and which parties are involved on the decommissioning. There was a perliminary discussion took place between the SNFI, WaSH and CCCM cluster on the decommission but there is no further follow up took place.

AP: CCCM cluster will follow up with the national CCCM cluster on the decommissioning guidelines and will feedback the group.

ExU referred to some issues took place because of the CaSH Assistance under the CCY. The IDPs who wasn't targeted, complaint against ExU FPs in the sites to districts managers, where ExU received letter to change these FPs. ACTED mentioned that there was a clear process which explains criteira for IDPs to release in miss understanding.

ACTED highlighted that the CaSH team differs from the CCCM team, and that CCCM team is stopped from accessing Al Buriqah and the CCCM team is stopped from accessing the IDPs sites in Al Buriqah.

CCCM cluster suggested that ACTED CCY should do further sensitization for the criteria. ExU highlighted that they are reaching the head of the district to address both ExU and ACTED access issues.

AP: ACTED to give updates from the CCY, and ExU to advocate on higher levels to allow the access for ACTED and ExU FPs.



In Marib, the ExU has allocated extensive tracts of land for IDPs as a charitable contribution, stipulating the construction of permanent shelters. The ExU has successfully constructed 16 villages, providing housing for 3,500 households. With additional land available, the ExU is seeking assistance from humanitarian partners to further develop more villages. The CCCM cluster has indicated that this initiative aligns with durable solutions for IDPs, however budling cities is not in line with the humanitarian funding that partners are receiving now, this however will be of interest topic in other forums composing development actors.

NRC and BCHR reviled of plans to build semi-permanent structures for IDPs in Marib during the scope of this year,

IDSF kickoff meeting was done yesterday, 29th of May.

The ExU expressed concern that while donors, including the United Nations, prioritize Durable Solutions (DS) for IDPs, the urgent humanitarian needs are being overlooked. They requested clarification on the strategy for delivering CCCM services in the coming years, particularly in light of reduced funding for both CCCM and broader humanitarian programs.

The CCCM cluster is planning consultations with partners to develop a transition strategy in light of funding reductions. This will involve bilateral discussions with both individual CCCM partners and the Executive Unit (ExU) to collaboratively determine the cluster's strategy for the coming period.

The CCCM cluster plans to restructure the CCCM Master List. This will involve separating sites with fewer than 20 households into a dedicated sheet or, whenever possible, merging them with nearby locations.

CCCM cluster mentioned there will be coming YHF standard allocation on June, the nature of funding is still not clear, and is likely to be an ABA interventions, without specifying the amount allocated for each sector.

The GWQ project in Al Haimah, Al Hudaydah Governorate was closed by OAOWC. The OAOWC justified the rejection because that the project's activities wouldn't directly support the relocation of IDPs from Al Haimah to Al Khoukha, which was their priority.

The CBWG is working on adapting the global CCCM package to the Yemeni context. The ExU emphasized the value of the previous package, with its detailed modules and topics, compared to the current, more generic format. The CBWG clarified that the translation focused on accurately conveying the existing modules without modification. However, the contextualization process will involve incorporating additional information and adapting the content to the current situation, drawing on both past experiences and on-the-ground realities.
