

### **OUR VISION**

In a context of conflict, persecution, and climate-driven displacement, but also one of innovation and resilience, UNHCR envisions a region where refugees, internally displaced and stateless persons are protected; where solutions are found to help millions of people lead more dignified lives.

### THE REGION TODAY

The region remains vulnerable to armed conflict, political and socio-economic instability, and climate induced disasters creating new waves of displacement and exacerbating existing humanitarian needs. The EHAGL Region faces four major Situations, the Sudan, South Sudan, Somaila and Burundi, and is also affected by the DRC Situation. At the regional level, UNHCR works with regional economic communities, UN sister agencies, NGOs and others to support protection and solutions with and for refugees and internally displaced persons (IDPs).

UNHCR continues to work with development partners to mainstream forcibly displaced populations into development planning and sustainable responses, promoting inclusion and solutions from the start.

New partnerships with the private sector, as well as progress on the localization agenda, also contribute to sustainable responses, which is anchored in efforts to enhance the resilience and self-reliance of displaced populations and their host communities.

Resettlement needs remain significant. Onward movement of refugees from their first countries of asylum requires a regionally harmonized approach. A route-based approach will be applied in response to mixed movements of refugees and migrants, promoting more humane and effective responses, and delivering better outcomes for people on the move, affected communities and States.

Over the next three years, UNHCR will consolidate and enhance its efforts to provide protection, assistance and solutions for forcibly displaced and stateless populations, and promote improved responses to forced displacement in the region, in line with the priorities of Member States, and in collaboration with a wide and diverse range of stakeholders.








### Implementation of Global Refugee Forum pledges

with a focus on transitions from camps to settlements, inclusion and empowerment for women and girls, and strengthened cooperation and solidarity with displaced populations and affected host countries.



#### Transformative partnerships

with diverse public and private stakeholders to leverage financing, influence, and expertise in support of protection and solutions.



### **Evidence-driven advocacy and communications**

to advance rights, inclusion, and development opportunities for forcibly displaced and stateless persons.




### **Data-informed responses**

Systematic provision of critical, comprehensive and coherent information and data to inform programming, policy and advocacy.

### **KEY TRENDS IN THE REGION**

**20%** of the forcibly displaced persons are Refugees

**80%** of the forcibly displaced persons are IDPs

**44%** of the refugees are of working age

**91%** of Refugees are hosted by 5 countries (Uganda, Ethiopia, Sudan, Kenya and South Sudan)

91% of the IDPs are located in 3 Countries (Sudan, Somalia and Ethiopia)

**29%** of the refugees are employed

22% of the UNHCR's global persons of concern are hosted in **EHAGL** region

15% higher employment rate for refugees in urban areas than in the camps

**62%** of the refugees live in poverty
