



### Overview of the sector and narrative

#### The Sector Overview:

The WASH sector ensures that refugees and hosting populations have improved, equitable and sustainable access to safe water, sanitation, and hygiene services through the inclusion of services to National systems and innovative approaches to prepare new arrivals and established populations to achieve self-reliance. This is being achieved by implementing the broader water and environment sector refugee response plan (WERRP) which expired in June 2023. The approach is to transition all services to national systems (district local government, water supply utilities area service providers, and communities). The Process of transition to national utility is ongoing with one settlement (Rwamwanja) fully under the management of a national utility, there has been a delay in revising the current MoU with National Water and Sewerage Corporation as well as the new MoU with Northern Umbrella for Water and Sanitation. The water supply transition roadmap developed by the Ministry of Water and Environment has been reviewed and validated by partners. The costed transition roadmap is being reviewed and will be presented in a transition symposium to be held in November 2024. On the other hand, discussions to finalize the signing of transition MoU with Ministry of Water and Environment, Office of the Prime Minister, UNHCR and utilities is in the final stages, it is expected to be signed by October 2024.

#### The Result Analysis:

On average, there has been a reduction in sanitation service level from 65% in Q1 to 64% in Q2. This is attributed to the high rate of new arrivals that outstripped the speed of latrine development in the affected settlements leading to an overall average reduction in sanitation services to refugees and asylum seekers. Access to water supply reduced from 17lpd in Q1 to 16lpd in Q2 due to prolonged breakdown of major water systems in some settlements. WASH partners responded to refugee influxes in Southwest, Northern and West Nile regions. Water access was maintained at an average of 14 lpd in Southwest and in Northern settlements receiving new arrivals. This is within the emergency threshold of 7.5-15lpd. While latrine per persons ratio were kept within the target of 1:50 through construction of 330 emergency latrines. To promote personal hygiene and environmental sanitation amongst the newly arrived, WASH partners deployed community hygiene promoters (Village Health Teams) at a ratio of 593 persons per hygiene promoter against a target of 1:500.

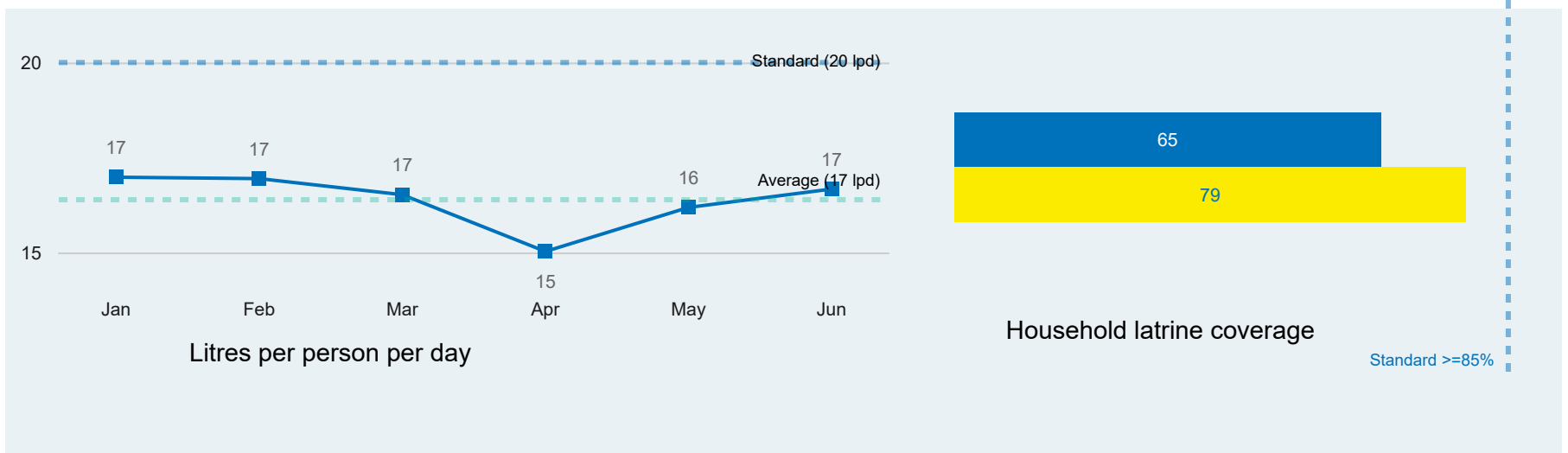
#### The Key Challenges/Opportunities:

Due to aged electromechanical equipment (generators, pumps, and inverters), the frequency of breakdown has increased hence the high cost of operation and maintenance of water systems.

#### The Sector Priorities:

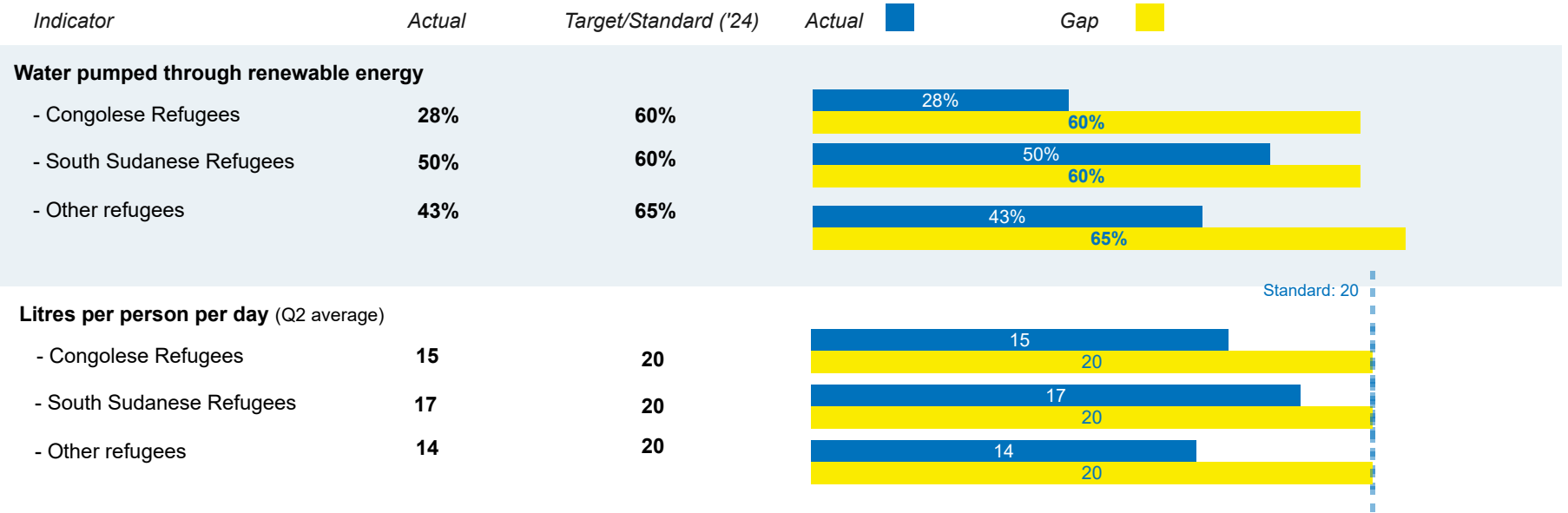
- Replacement of Collapsed boreholes and boreholes with reduced water resources
- Emergency WASH services provision to new arrivals
- Continue with HH latrine construction to increase coverage
- Completion and signing of transition MoU with MWE, OPM, UNHCR and utilities
- Finalization of costed transition roadmap and dissemination at a symposium
