YHF - CERF Allocation Updates:

The CCCM Cluster convened the meeting, beginning with introductions from all attendees. CCCM extended a warm welcome to Haider Al-Shadadi, Head of Branches at the Ministry of Planning and International Cooperation (MoPIC), and Eman Khadabukhash, Manager of the Branches Office. Their participation in the CCCM Cluster meeting marked a significant milestone, following a request from MoPIC to strengthen collaboration between government entities and humanitarian actors in cluster scope and planning.

Haider Al-Shadadi extended a warm welcome to participants and emphasized the crucial importance of coordination with the CCCM Cluster. He conveyed greetings from the leadership of the Ministry of Planning and International Cooperation (MoPIC). He explained that MoPIC is responsible for overseeing the activities of all planning offices in the governorates, as well as managing local development plans. IDPs are a primary category of people MoPIC works with. Through reports from their offices in the governorates, they have identified a significant gap in the response to the needs of displaced populations. While some assistance is being provided, it is insufficient to meet their urgent needs.

He stressed the need for a precise survey of the numbers, needs, and locations of the displaced, especially in light of recent climate changes and floods. He pointed out that the Ministry of

Planning has 20 offices across various governorates of the republic of Yemen, which will facilitate the work of the CCCM Cluster and partners.

The CCCM Cluster expressed gratitude to Mr. Haider Al-Shadadi for his valuable insights. They acknowledged updating IDPs lists, which is currently will be done under the Internal Displacement Solutions Fund.

YHF SA1 for 2024, prioritization methodology, and timeline

CCCM cluster presented parameters for the YHF SA1 for 2024, which include \$30 million under Humanitarian Fund. This is a combined with \$20 million from the Central Emergency Response Fund. Cluster explained that these allocations will be used to address primary priorities, including seasonal priorities (floods, diseases outbreaks), protracted displacement, spot conflicts, and malnutrition.

CCCM Cluster noted that the competition for these allocations will be open to all eligible YHF organizations, with the quality of the submitted projects being the key criterion. Cluster explained that priorities are determined based on the needs identified in the Humanitarian Needs Overview and Humanitarian Response Plan, however, it will be tailored based on discussion and consultations Regional Coordination Team (RCT) in each Hub. CCCM Cluster called upon CCCM partners to participate in RCT consultation discussions, to reflect and update priorities in light of recent developments. He emphasized the need to use the funds strategically to achieve the greatest possible humanitarian impact.

CCCM cluster pointed out that the project implementation period is 12 months, with no extensions allowed. Cluster also highlighted the focus on funding local organizations within this allocation.

Community Led Projects, Flood Mitigation, Taiz (Atturbah) IOM

IOM, presented a project aimed at reducing flood risks in three vulnerable sites: Al-Moniq, Doukhara, and Al-Niqay. This project, designed to benefit both displaced populations and the host communities, involved constructing gabion walls and improving internal drainage channels. The project created over 400 job opportunities and addressed the safety concerns caused by recurring floods.

Challenges in executing the project were also discussed, including the difficulty in finding skilled labor and managing the expectations of local landowners. However, through continuous coordination with local communities and authorities, the project saw significant success in mitigating flood damage and improving access to the sites for vulnerable populations.

Community Led Projects, Road Rehabilitation, Taiz (Maqbanah) NMO

NMO presented a road paving project in Maqbana District, Taiz Governorate. The project targeted displaced persons and the host community, significantly facilitating movement and improving access to services. He highlighted the importance of involving the host community in project implementation to enhance community peace.

Ex. Unit/ CCCM Cluster & Partners challenges and updates

The CCCM Cluster concluded the meeting by encouraging all partners to share their weekly inputs and updates. These updates will be consolidated into a biweekly update letter.

Towards the end of the meeting, participants discussed the importance of involving host communities in future projects to prevent potential tensions with displaced populations. The meeting concluded with a commitment to ongoing collaboration, both at the local and national levels, to address the evolving humanitarian needs in Yemen.
