

This document outlines the funding received by UNHCR Colombia and identifies its main donors during the first half of 2024. UNHCR receives contributions from donors at three levels:

1. Global level



2. Regional level (Americas)



3. Local level (Colombia)

Only the contributions received in Colombia can be referenced with exact amounts, while the rest are allocated flexibly based on resources raised at the regional level for Latin America by UNHCR's Regional Office for the Americas, located in Panama, and globally by UNHCR's Headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland. Therefore, it is not possible to precisely relate the amount of funds executed by UNHCR Colombia from each donor contributing at the global and regional levels, as their flexible contributions are directed by the Headquarters to the operations that need them the most.

UNHCR receives contributions from **three types of donors: the public sector (countries and governments), the private sector (companies and individuals), as well as funds from other agencies within the United Nations system.** Private donors can give directly to UNHCR or through UNHCR's National Partners.

Here are UNHCR's top donors as of September 2024:

1) Globally, UNHCR's largest donor is the **United States**, followed by the **European Union**, **Sweden**, **Denmark**, **France**, **Japan**, **Germany**, the **Netherlands**, **Norway** and **Spain** for UNHCR, all of which are among the top 10 donors.

Map 1: UNHCR's Top 10 global donors (September 30, 2024)

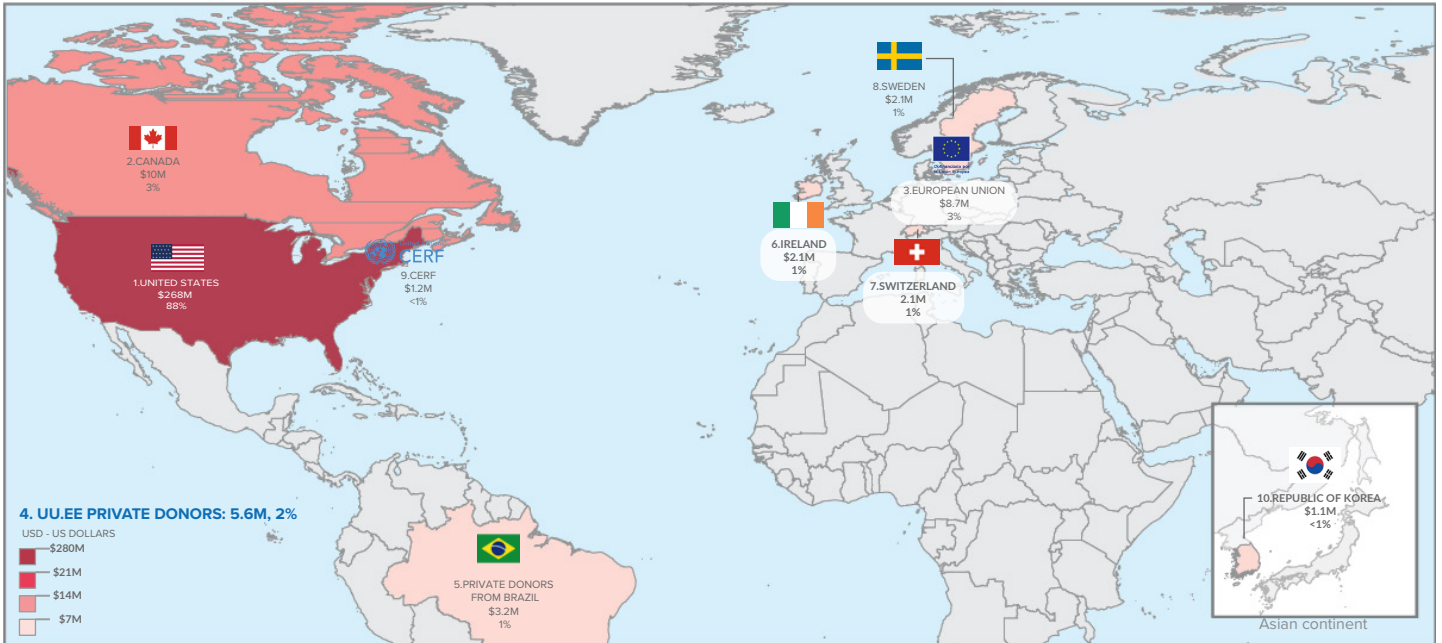

2) At the regional level, the main donors in the Americas are: the United States, Canada, the European Union, private donors from the United States, private donors from Brazil, Ireland, Switzerland, Sweden, the Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF) and the Republic of Korea.

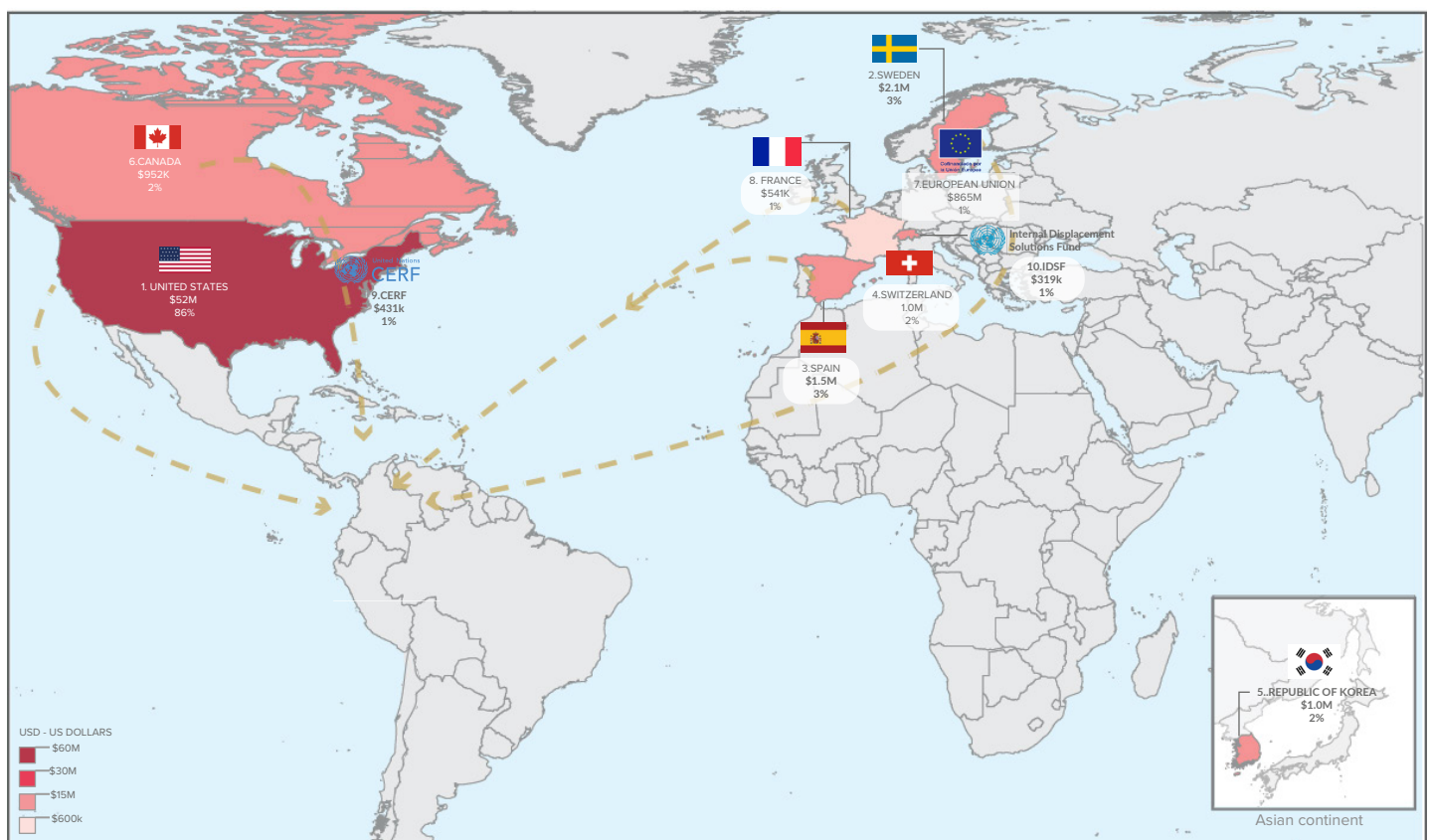
Map 2: Top 10* UNHCR donors in the Americas region (September 30, 2024)



We also recognize, at the regional level, the flexible contributions of donors financing the response to the refugee and migrant situation (R4V) in the Americas: Ireland, private donors from Germany, Luxembourg and the United States.


3) In Colombia, UNHCR's largest donor is the United States, followed by Sweden, Spain, Switzerland, the Republic of Korea, Canada, the European Union, France, the Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF), the Fund for Internal Displacement Solutions (IDSF) and private donors from Colombia.
