

South Sudan Country Refugee Response Plan

January - December 2025

AT A GLANCE

South Sudan grapples with ongoing conflict, inter-communal violence, and extreme food insecurity while hosting 1.8 million internally displaced persons and facing increasing returns. Amid these challenges, the country has also seen its refugee population almost doubled since the onset of the Sudan crisis, hosting 506,198 refugees and asylum-seekers as of November 2024, with a further 150,000 new arrivals projected in 2025.

The 2025 South Sudan Country Refugee Response Plan (RRP) addresses the complex humanitarian needs of these refugees and asylum-seekers alongside host communities across key refugee-hosting areas in South Sudan. With a total financial requirement of USD 467.8 million, the plan mobilises the efforts of 48 partners, including UN agencies, international NGOs, and national NGOs, to deliver critical protection, assistance, and solutions. This coordinated response underscores the ongoing commitment to ensuring the dignity, safety, and resilience of refugees and their host communities.

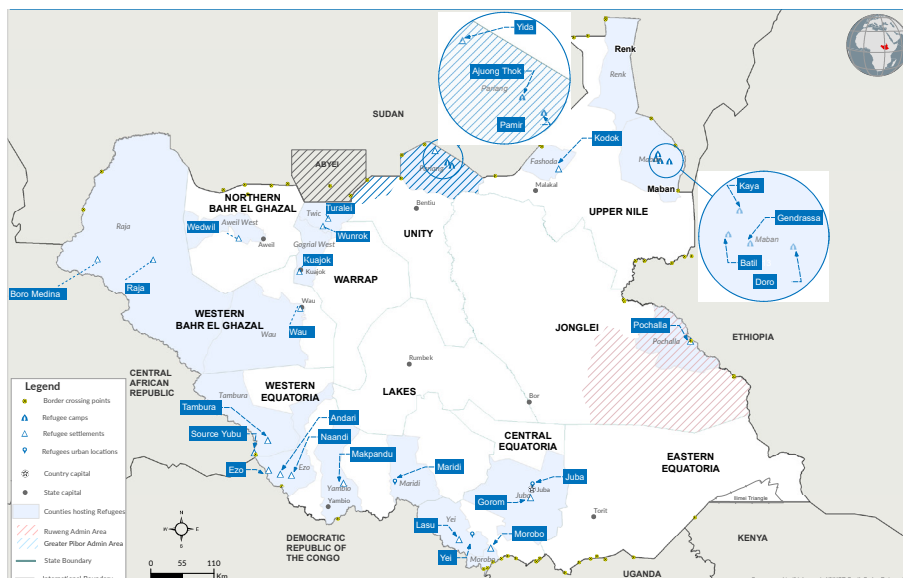

The 2025 RRP adopts a humanitarian-development-peace nexus approach, integrating emergency relief with resilience-building and development-oriented strategies. It includes comprehensive interventions across nine sectors: protection, education, health, food security, livelihoods, WASH, shelter, and basic needs. Cross-cutting priorities such as age, gender, diversity inclusion, and climate action are central to the response strategy.

Grounded in collaboration with the South Sudanese government and guided by the Refugee Coordination Model, the RRP aligns with national systems and broader frameworks like the National Development Strategy and the Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework. This inclusive approach aims to strengthen social cohesion, address root causes of vulnerability, and create pathways for solutions. Recognizing the evolving realities of displacement, the plan introduces a stronger focus on urban refugee programmes to meet the growing demand. As increasing numbers of refugees settle in urban areas, they require tailored support and integration efforts.

OBJECTIVES

- Support South Sudan authorities to ensure access to territory and asylum for all individuals in need of international protection, in compliance with principles and standards, including the principle of non-refoulement and the civilian and humanitarian character of asylum;
- Support South Sudan authorities to provide timely and life-saving protection services and humanitarian assistance for all refugees and asylum-seekers, with a specific focus on the most vulnerable and most at risk ;
- Support South Sudan to build the capacity and resilience of refugees and asylum-seekers, supporting long-term prospects for sustainable development, peace and security, and the attainment of human rights.
