

Inter-agency coordination Lebanon, Q1 2025 At a Glance

Analysis of achievements of the sector during Q1

In the first quarter of 2025, the Food Security Cluster in Lebanon reached a total of 2,364,487 unique beneficiaries through interventions under both the Lebanon Response Plan (LRP) and the Flash Appeal (FA).

Under the LRP, 1,333,724 people were reached with food assistance and livelihood support. Simultaneously, the FA enabled FSAC partners to assist an additional 1,030,763 individuals, ensuring that vulnerable populations affected by sudden-onset or worsening crises were not left behind.

In terms of delivery modalities, cash & voucher assistance played a central role, reaching 1,627,824 people—with 1,153,664 supported under the LRP and 474,160 under the FA. Meanwhile, 734,064 people received support through in-kind food or services -with 177,461 supported under the LRP and 556,603 under the FA.

The Cluster also prioritized livelihood support, albeit at a smaller scale. A total of 2,599 individuals benefited from livelihood interventions, including 311 people through cash & voucher support and 2,288 people through in-kind or services.

The Cluster's activities spanned a range of interventions tailored to the diverse needs of the population. Regular food assistance was provided to 670,291 people, ensuring consistent access to essential food. In addition, 42,778 individuals received hot meals, and 20,995 were supported with ready-to-eat rations, often targeting those in displacement or without access to cooking facilities.

1,627,824 people benefited from food/cash for work/asset for food assistance, and 311 for livelihood. 737 people were reached by capacity-building programs, while 1,551 individuals received other forms of livelihood support, such as vocational training and small business development.

Overall, the first quarter of 2025 marked a significant scale-up in food security interventions in Lebanon, demonstrating the sector's commitment to addressing both immediate needs and longer-term food security challenges.
