Context

Belize has a history of protecting refugees, particularly those fleeing violence in neighboring countries. The country is a signatory to the 1951 Refugee Convention and has established a national framework under the 1991 Refugees Act. UNHCR supports the Government in strengthening the asylum system, establishing protection policies, and facilitating durable solutions to assist forcibly displaced people.


In May, Belize's Cabinet approved an extension of the eligibility criteria for the Amnesty Programme, enabling individuals with documentary proof of residence in Belize up to December 2019 to apply for regularization. Previously, this requirement was limited to 2016, but now it allows long-term residents who were previously ineligible to access permanent residency.

Launched in mid-2022, the Amnesty Programme has served as a complementary protection pathway for individuals in need of international protection. Over 12,000 undocumented people, including more than 700 asylumseekers applied. As of 2024, Belize had granted amnesty to 492 asylum-seekers, and UNHCR assisted over 170 with the costs of their permanent residency IDs.

In June, UNHCR, Bella Vista High School, and HUMANA People to People organized a football tournament to honor World Refugee Day. Students from the school, including refugees and asylumseekers, formed mixed teams and played side by side throughout the event, showcasing unity and teamwork.

UNHCR RESPONSE





Humanitarian Assistance UNHCR, HfP, and Humana assisted 19 refugees and asylum-seekers: one received temporary shelter, and 18 received mental health and psychosocial support.




Protection UNHCR's partners, HRCB, HfP, and Humana counselled 74 people on the asylum system and access to fundamental rights.

Advocacy | Belize hosted the National Agriculture and Trade Show (NATS) in Belmopan, highlighting local businesses and innovative products while promoting social, economic,



and environmental initiatives. The Ministry of Immigration, through the Refugee Department, engaged with the public to share information on asylum procedures, immigration policies, and the Amnesty Programme. UNHCR and its partner Humana counseled forcibly displaced individuals and those at risk of statelessness.

Local Integration For World Refugee Day, UNHCR and Humana participated in opening of a new playground in the Bella Vista host community. HUMANA organized a Market Day, where refugees displayed and sold their goods and products, including pupusas, tacos, juices, fruits and vegetables, plants, clothing, and accessories.
