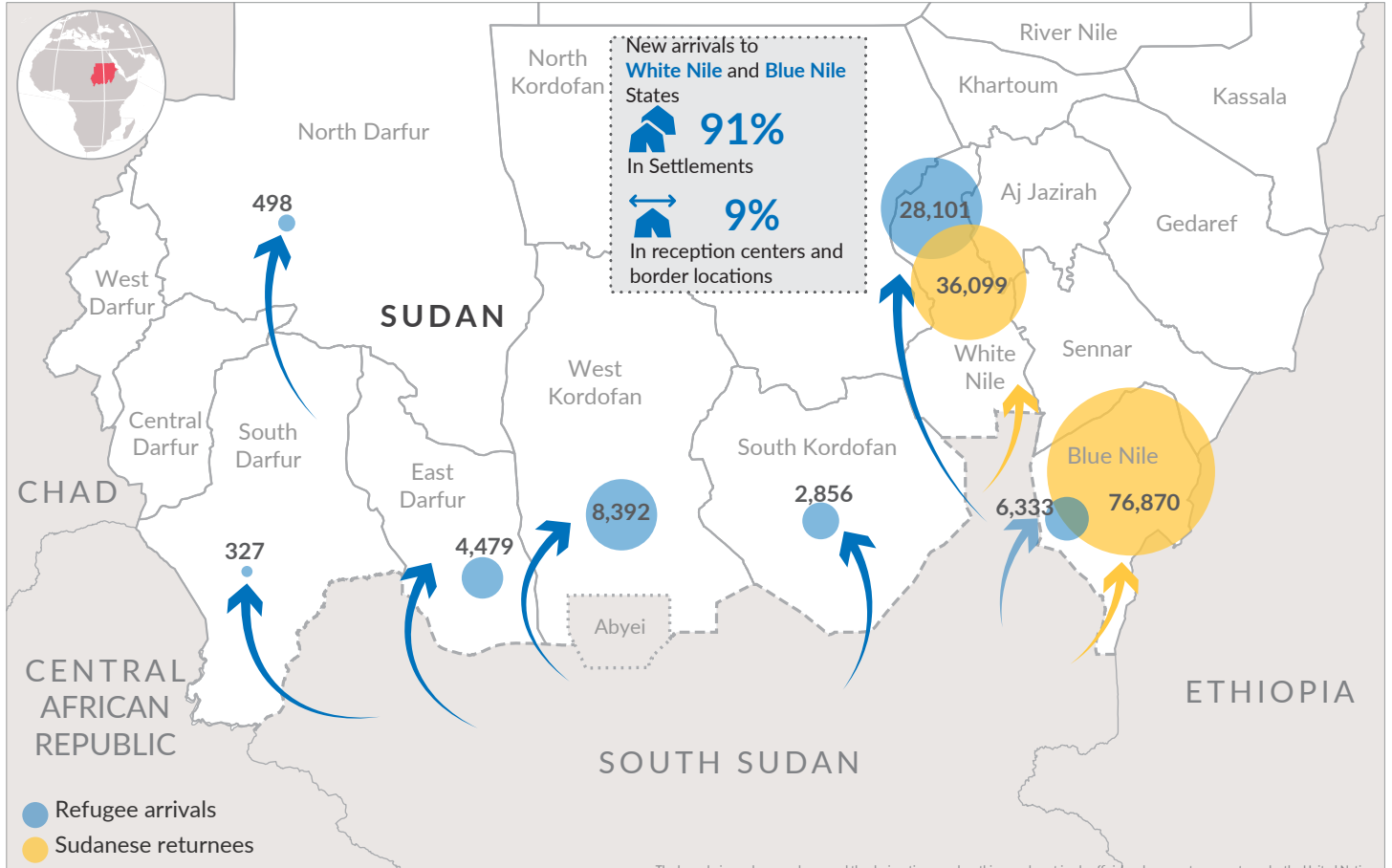
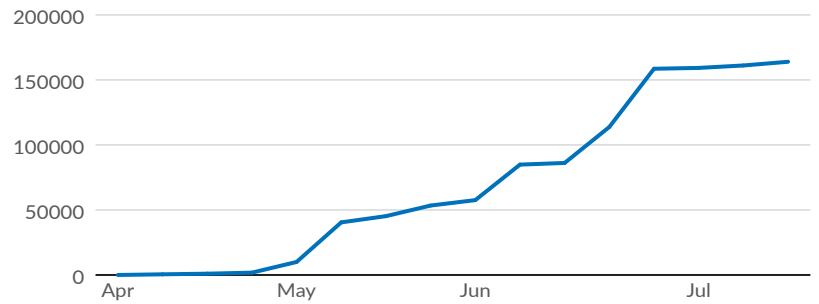
In **White Nile State**, UNHCR constructed communal ventilated improved latrines at the reception center for providing access to sanitation facilities. UNHCR and UNICEF supported the Risk communication and community engagement intervention to mitigate the public health risk of WASH related diseases outbreak. In **Blue Nile State**, 80% of the Refugee Returnees received food for July and the distribution is still ongoing. Health services is provided by WVI, MOH, MSF including cholerae awareness campaign.

Context

Since late February, political instability and rising hostilities between armed groups in South Sudan have led to fresh clashes, particularly in Upper Nile state. This has caused a large influx of people to flee South Sudan to Sudan. Nearly **164,000 people** have entered Sudan during this period. This includes an estimated **51,000 South Sudanese**, most of whom (55%) are in White Nile state. Protection monitoring and movement tracking continues at the Joda border crossing. UNHCR and the Commission for Refugees (COR), have begun conducting registration of new arrivals. The major challenge for refugees new arrivals is lack of adequate land space for appropriate accommodation. Refugee new arrivals have access to WASH and health services at both Joda and the camps. UNHCR provided fuel to State Water Corporation (SWCs) to extend the water service to the reception centers. Shelter is also provided for new arrivals while awaiting transfer to the camps.

Adding to this complexity is the arrival of an estimated **77,000 Sudanese returnees** to Blue Nile State and other **36,000 Sudanese returnees** to White Nile State. UNHCR assistance for returnees is currently provided at final destination in Blue Nile, while the government of White Nile State is providing transportation of returnees up to Blue Nile. Return movements are expected to continue until the rainy season (August to October), when roads become impassable.
